- In 2020, Quade remained neutral in the presidential primary between Sanders and Joe Biden. (Kansas City Star, 3/5/20)

Support For President Joe Biden & VP Kamala Harris

- Following Biden's 2020 presidential victory, Quade thanked him and Harris for "bringing us back to a space of safety." (Crystal Quade, Twitter, 11/7/20)
- In 2021, Quade posted a photo of her and Biden wearing masks. (Crystal Quade, <u>Twitter</u>, 12/8/21)

In 2021, Quade praised Biden's \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan and called his \$2.2 trillion

More Government, More Spending

Single-Payer Health Care



• In 2016, Quade stated her support for a Bernie Sanders-style \$60.7 trillion single-payer health care system that was even too radical Joe Biden. (Mobilize Missouri, "Survey Responses" Page, Accessed 9/22/16)

ObamaCare's Medicaid Expansion

- Quade has been an outspoken supporter of ObamaCare's Medicaid expansion. While she has
 denied expansion would require a tax hike, she said it could be funded by scaling back a \$114
 million/yr. business tax break. (Springfield News-Leader, 10/31/16 and 11/4/16; The Associated Press, 1/15/20)
 - Despite Quade's support for Medicaid expansion, she voted "present" in 2022 on a bill to approve \$4.6 billion to expand the program. (Springfield News-Leader, 2/11/22)

• In 2023, Quade criticized the Republican-led legislature for saving up a nearly \$6 billion surplus, and she proposed spending as much as \$5 billion of it. (Mexico Ledger, 10/25/23)

COVID-19 Response

- Early in the COVID-19 pandemic, Quade said, "In my opinion, it's better to overreact." In the months that followed, she called on the Parson administration to take heavy-handed actions that included shutting down businesses, imposing a statewide mask mandate, restricting indoor gatherings, spending over \$100 million, mandating that employers pay sick leave, expanding welfare programs, building hospitals, forbidding evictions, and furloughing non-violent prisoners. Going Easy On Criminals

- In 2019, Quade voiced support for a liberal criminal justice plan that sought to relax cash bail requirements for criminals and restore voting rights to convicted felons. (Rolla Daily News, 2/12/19)

Rampant Crime In St. Louis

Curbing Gun Rights

Extreme On Abortion

NOTE: During abortion debates, Quade has said she was sexually abused by her biological father.

LGBTQ+



18. Mother and Father first met in Harrison, Arkansas, and began dating when they were only sixteen. After six months, Mother became pregnant. The couple had many fights and subsequently stopped dating after Mother's pregnancy. Father moved to Springfield, Missouri, for about six months. After the birth of their first child, the couple reunited and married in June of 2004. The couple then moved to Springfield.

The fighting continued and the couple separated in October of 2006. Mother took the children and returned to Arkansas. Father remained in Springfield.

Father and Mother had a tumultuous relationship during their marriage. Mother had 19. anger problems after the birth of Aydin because she felt insecure about her body image. Mother resented Father's relationship with someone else during the time they had been separated prior to Aydin's birth. Mother resented Father viewing what she termed as pornography. Father testified that due to Mother's religious upbringing, Mother's interpretation of what was actually pornography had a very low threshold. In September of 2004, Father and Mother began arguing. The fight escalated into Mother throwing objects at Father. Father attempted to restrain Mother and she bit Father left with Aydin. Mother traveled to Father's mother's home and confronted his mother about keeping Aydin. During a physical altercation, Mother bit Father's mother. In late November of 2004, Mother saw Father's ex-girlfriend while she was shopping, went home and punched one hundred and fifty holes in the wall. The holes in the wall spelled "I HATE YOU." It was during this fight that Mother had a knife, which she pointed at herself. At the time, Mother was pregnant with Naomi. The altercation calmed for a period of time, then began again. Mother began hitting Father. Father picked up Aydin and headed out the door. Mother started screaming at him and ran out into a busy intersection. Narrative:

On 02/16/2017 I was dispatched to 1612 N. Jefferson in reference to a missing juvenile. Call notes stated a 13 year old male named Aydin Waterland with Asperger's syndrome had left his home on foot after a fight with his sister.

Upon arriving I contacted Aydin's father, Kevin Waterland and Aydin's step-mother, Crystal Quade Waterland. Kevin stated his son, Aydin had run away from home at 1530 HRS. Kevin explained three days prior (02/13/17) he had gotten onto Aydin for not doing his share of work around the house. Since the argument they had, Aydin had avoided talking to Kevin. Aydin's behavior was not normal for him and Aydin was having trouble at school with some other juveniles. Kevin's phone rang, it was Tara Lackey, Aydin's mother. According to Kevin, he and Tara have shared custody of Aydin. Tara lives in Jasper, Arkansas and the relationship between Tara and Aydin is not great. Kevin updated Tara on the search of Aydin and my arrival/involvement.

Crystal stated Aydin has Asperger's and is high functioning. Aydin's Asperger's is present in social settings and personal interaction with others. Crystal explained today she and Kevin were at work. Aydin walks home from Pipkin with his sister to their house where his grandmother watches him and his sisters until Kevin and her are home. Their grandmother lives at 1612 N Jefferson as well. Aydin does not leave the house alone. Today Aydin; Aydin's sister, Naomi Waterland; and a friend of Naomi's were walking home to 1612 N Jefferson. Naomi's friend saw a knife in Aydin's pocket and told Naomi. Naomi saw the knife as well. Once they made it home Naomi confronted Aydin taking the steak knife to school in front of their grandmother. Aydin got mad at Naomi and shoved her. Their grandmother told Aydin to stop. Aydin got mad and stormed out of the house without his phone, wallet, or coat. In the past when Aydin would become upset he isolates himself in the house and eventually returns. Aydin had never left the house before when he was upset. Aydin is also afraid of the dark. When Kevin and Crystal arrived home they checked the house, areas the family frequencies, and areas Aydin was familiar with: Washington Park, Grant Beach Park, Pipkin Middle School, Central High School, Bissett Elementary, Cox North ER, Big Mamma's on Commercial Street, and their former house at 3200 W Lynn. They contacted Aydin's friends to see if they had seen or heard from Aydin. No one had They were unable to locate Aydin. Once it got dark and he did not return they called 911 to report him missing at 1955 HRS.

I contacted SGT Ramey at 2016 HRS to make him aware of the missing juvenile.

At 2010 HRS, a call from came the Boy's and Girl's Club Henderson Unit (835 W. Calhoun in Grant Beach Park) to the phone Aydin uses. As Crystal attempted to contact the Henderson Unit, Kevin drove to the location to see if Aydin was trying to contact them. Kevin contacted staff and no one had seen Aydin.

Crystal stated they had searched the house and an adult had been home since Aydin left at 1530 HRS. She gave consent to search the house again for him. I conducted a thorough search of first, second, and third stories. Officer McKinsey conducted a search of the basement. Other officers arrived and started to search the garage and yard. As they started, dispatch informed SGT Ramey a Greene County Deputy had located Aydin. Officers completed the search of the garage and yard but waited to continue searching beyond the house until the juvenile Greene County had located was verified as



Aydin.

Greene County Deputy Rear, (DSN 987) located Aydin at 2050 HRS, walking in the area of State Highway WW and farm road 145. He brought Aydin to 1612 N Jefferson. Deputy Rear said he had seen Aydin before walking along the road however, when he went to contact Aydin, Aydin had taken off running. When Deputy Rear arrived Crystal and Kevin confirmed the juvenile was Aydin.

Aydin had dirt on his knees and some light scratched on his arms. Aydin was hard to follow in his explanation of what had happened. Aydin stated he had gotten upset and walked out. He went toward the railroad tracks, through the woods, to the gas station, down the road, through a field, and then he followed the road. He thought he was in trouble so he wanted away from Springfield. Aydin stated he was having problems at school with another juvenile by the name of Ethan. Aydin said some sixth graders had told Ethan he had said things about Ethan. So now Ethan was following Aydin around school and Aydin felt he needed the knife to protect himself. Kevin and Crystal were going to contact Aydin's counselor and develop some avenues for Aydin to express himself when he is stressed.

Later I hotlined this information and spoke with operator 29370 about the incident as well as the alleged bullying that lead up to Aydin running away.

Jumping To The Front Of The COVID-19 Vaccine Line

In January 2021, Quade Alerted Fellow Legislators And Staff To Get COVID-19 Vaccine Shots That Were Intended For Elderly And Frontline State Employees. "A slew of Missouri lawmakers swarmed the Capitol Plaza Hotel Wednesday to get their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine alongside other state workers. There was just one problem: it wasn't their turn. The hotel clinic was supposed to be vaccinating critical workers in the state's public safety and transportation departments as well as other employees currently eligible for shots based on their age or risk factors. Lawmakers, for their part, aren't scheduled to become eligible until the next tier of the rollout. But on Wednesday



morning, House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, and her staff started hearing that the clinic was accepting all comers. Quade went over, confirmed the rumors and quickly sent an email to her caucus and their staffers letting them know about the availability. 'All staff, including us, capitol plaza hotel,' she wrote in a clarifying text message. 'No appointments needed. Must have ID. The line is decently long but it's moving fast.' ... In an interview later in the afternoon, Quade conceded she had made a mistake, saying she did not intend to break any rules. She said she asked vaccinators at the clinic whether or not she was eligible to be immunized and they said she was. Many other lawmakers and state employees appeared to be in the same boat, she said. 'It was amazing how many people were there that weren't from (eligible groups),' she said. 'There were so many people in line.' Quade said her efforts to spread the word also came from a basic desire to protect her caucus and staff working in a building that attracts hundreds of people from all over the state each week, many of whom do not wear masks or observe other precautions. ... 'We're in this place where so many people still refuse to wear masks with staff who are some of the lowest-paid in the country,' Quade said. 'It's a chaotic mess.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 2/3/21)

• Quade, Who Received A Shot, Claimed She Was Confused By The Vaccine Rollout Efforts. "Rumors the state had made doses of the COVID-19 vaccine available to lawmakers and their employees set off a scramble on Wednesday that resulted in numerous lawmakers receiving shots not intended for them. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said Wednesday she heard from a senator that shots would be available, and said she alerted other Democrats via email and group text message. Overseeing A "Toxic Culture"

In 2021, Staffers Who Worked For The Quade-Led House Democrats Accused Her And Other Officials Of Promoting A "Toxic Culture" And Turning A Blind Eye In Their Response To An Investigation That Accused Then-State Rep. Wiley Price Of Threatening An Aide To Cover Up His Sexual Encounter With An Intern. "In a rare sign of rebellion, legislative aides who work for Missouri House Democrats are accusing their party's leaders of doing more to protect a fellow lawmaker than employees. The group of staffers, who requested that their identities be withheld for fear of retribution, are upset with how Democrats handled a House Ethics Committee report accusing state Rep. Wiley Price of harassment and retaliation against an aide who reported an alleged violation of House rules barring sexual relations between lawmakers and interns. The House voted 140-3 last week to censure Price, D-St. Louis, after a Republican-led effort to expel him failed to receive the necessary 2/3 majority. Only one Democrat voted in favor of expelling Price. The staffers, who work for Democrats from across the state as well as the demographic and ideological spectrum, detailed their concerns in an article submitted to The Independent this week. They say they were compelled to make their feelings public because of a 'toxic culture' in the Capitol that 'turns a blind eye to abuses of power when it's politically expedient.' Subsequent interviews with House Democratic staff

not involved with the op-ed mirrored its sentiment. 'We work tirelessly in an already toxic environment to support the Democratic Caucus when it needs us,' the legislative staff wrote. 'But when we most needed them, where was their support? Strategically absent.' ... The House Ethics Committee, made up of five Republicans and five Democrats, voted unanimously last month to recommend censuring Price. The committee concluded that he lied during a legislative investigation of an alleged sexual encounter with an intern and threatened the legislative assistant who reported the encounter." (Missouri Independent, 1/22/21)

- The Staffers Singled Out Quade For Criticism. "When the ethics committee released its report, Republican leadership quickly issued a statement declaring that they stood behind the findings and that Price would face punishment. Quade responded to the findings with a statement saying that 'the next step will be for the full House to evaluate the evidence and determine appropriate action.' The staff called Quade's statement 'milquetoast.' When the House took up the committee's report for debate last week, Democrats ended up defending Price from an attempt by Republican lawmakers to go beyond the ethics committee's recommended punishment of censure and instead to expel him from the House. Ultimately, the GOP couldn't muster the two-thirds majority needed for expulsion, and Price was censured 140-3, with eight Democratic members voting 'present.' The Democratic staffers who reached out to The Independent said watching the debate unfold last week 'was like watching an episode of the Twilight Zone.' They wrote: 'People who we admire actively let us down, and people for whom we have no warm feelings rushed to our defense. It is shameful that the Democratic Caucus, a group that consistently claims the mantle of championing dignity for working people, should be so complicit in worsening an already toxic environment for their own employees.' Quade said last week's debate 'certainly didn't go in any way how we expected it to go.' Democrats didn't know that the GOP were going to push to expel Price until an hour before the debate began, Quade said. 'As you can guess we were all very blindsided by it,' she said. 'We had folks prepared to talk about the need for censure, and it was going to be a very different conversation. We didn't say the things that we wanted to say that day.' Instead, Quade says Democrats were forced to defend the recommendation of the committee. 'It was about the future of that committee,' she said. 'It was about ensuring that folks have a place to go that is respected and trusted when they have concerns, and respecting the work that those individuals on the committee did for nearly a year.' When the committee unanimously voted to censure but not expel Price, she said, 'I had to trust that they did their due diligence.' In their submission to The Independent, the staff called Democrats' defense of the process 'empty platitudes,' especially when compared to the public statements made that day by Republicans. 'In fact,' they wrote, 'if the thesis of the Democrats was 'we need to respect the process,' that of the Republicans was 'we need to respect staff.'" (Missouri Independent, 1/22/21)

'It makes me sad that folks feel betrayed,' Quade said when asked about the reaction of Democratic staff. 'That is the first feeling that I have. It makes me feel sad.'" Three Days After Quade Was Criticized By The Aides, Her Caucus Kicked Out Price. "Missouri House Democrats on Sunday kicked out a member of their caucus as punishment for threatening a staffer and lying during an ethics investigation. House Minority Leader Crystal Quade in a statement said the caucus voted out Rep. Wiley Price, of St. Louis. Price was accused of having sex with an



intern in January 2020, which he denied. A House Ethics Committee investigation found he retaliated against his staffer after she reported the allegation. The committee also found that Price lied while under investigation." (*The Associated Press*, 1/25/21)

5% Pay Hike

In January 2021, Quade Voted "Present" On A Measure To Reject A 5% Pay Hike For Herself. "Top state officials are getting a raise this year. For the first time since 2007, state legislators did not pass a resolution blocking the pay hikes recommended by an independent commission, clearing the way for a 5% bump for lawmakers and statewide officials over the next two years. By July 2022, the governor will make \$140,596, up nearly \$6,800 from the current rate and good for 29th-highest among his peers in other states. Missouri state senators and representatives will move to \$37,711 per year, an increase of roughly \$1,800. The increases will cost around \$420,000 through the next two fiscal years. ... McDaniel, R-Deering, urged his colleagues to pass his negating resolution, arguing that it would be wrong to spend more money on themselves when people are hurting back home. ... Ultimately, the resolution to reject the raises fell 11 votes short of the two-thirds majority required. ... Fishel and Democrat Crystal Quade voted 'present,' meaning they did not take a side." Criticism Of Term Limits

Quade Has Voted Against Term Limits, And She Criticized Them As "Extremely Detrimental"

In May 2019, Quade Voted Against A Resolution (SJR 14) To Impose Term Limits On All Statewide Elected Officials In Missouri. "Amendment 1 would impose two-term limits on all of Missouri's statewide elected officials. Only the governor and treasurer are term-limited in statewide office in Missouri. ... The amendment that began as SJR 14, sponsored by Sen. Tony Luetkemeyer, was approved by the Senate in 2019 on the final day of session. Luetkemeyer said the amendment would 'ensure there is always a fresh perspective in government.' 'Amendment 1 brings consistency to our state's term limits by ensuring that all statewide elected officials are subject to the same limitations imposed on the governor, treasurer, and legislature,' Luetkemeyer told the Missouri Times." Money and special interests! Until Citizens United is overturned, I do not believe we will ever completely beat this. A sometime unpopular opinion- I believe term limits as we have them in MO are extremely detrimental. Legislators can serve 8 years in the house, it is constant campaign season. This is a multi fold issue. When it comes to policy- the institutional knowledge rests with the lobbyists. We have Reps who max are here for 8 years and staff that are vastly underpaid so turn over is high. Whenever you need to know any history about legislation- the lobbyists are the ones. With that their influence on policy is huge. On the campaign side, it costs so much to run for office. When elections are every two years, and you have legislators always looking to their next office because of limits, money is prevalent.

How do we stop it? Help elect people who believe it is a problem. Elect people who are there to their job and not constantly working on the next office. Support policy changes that impact campaign finance reforms. Pay attention to the money- who pays for the lobbyists, which bills move, and how much those Reps are receiving in contributions. Then work to change who you send here.





In May 2022, Quade Voted Against A Resolution (SCR 25) To Call A Convention Of The States To Propose A Federal Constitutional Amendment To Impose Term Limits On Members Of Congress. "SCR 25 - This concurrent resolution applies to the United States Congress, under the provisions of Article V of the United States Constitution, for the calling of a convention of the states for the limited purpose of proposing an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that limits the number of terms that a person may be elected to the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate." (Missouri State Senate, SCR 25, 2022 Legislative Session; Missouri State House Journal, SCR 25, 5/10/22, Overall Vote: 82-66, Quade Voted No)

In March 2023, Quade Claimed Term Limits Gave Lobbyists Too Much Power In Jefferson City. "...Quade, a Springfield Democrat, said Clean Missouri did not result in significant changes in the way business is conducted in Jefferson City. While the measure banned lobbyist gifts, there are still workarounds, she said. And term limits mean that lobbyists still hold remarkable sway in the Capitol. 'I don't feel like there's any difference in terms of how much influence a lobbyist has on a member,' she said. 'The reality of term limits makes it so that all institutional knowledge and, quite frankly, influence that comes with expertise lies with lobbyists, because they're the only ones who've been here for 20 or 30 years.'" Opposition To A Voter-Approved Plan To Ban Lobbyist Gifts

In May 2020, Quade Criticized And Voted Against A Proposed Constitutional Amendment (SJR 38) To Ask Voters To Overhaul "Clean Missouri" By Banning Lobbyist Gifts And Overhauling The Redistricting Process. Voters Later Approved Amendment 3. "A new version of 'Clean Missouri' is steps away from reappearing on November's ballot following a committee vote in favor of the issue last Thursday. The proposal, Senate Joint Resolution 38, sponsored by State Sen. Dan Hegeman, R-Cosby, would alter changes made to the state constitution by voters during the November 2018 election, including revisions to the redistricting process in Missouri. The original Clean Missouri constitutional amendment passed by 62% statewide and empowered a non-partisan state demographer to oversee redistricting. It also put in strict limits on lobbyist gifts and lowered some campaign contributions for state lawmakers, among other things. The proposed changes would remove the state demographer from that role and put redistricting power back in the hands of Missouri House of Representatives and Missouri Senate commissions. Additionally, it would eliminate lobbyist gifts entirely (the current Clean Missouri cap is \$5) and change the limit on Missouri Senate campaign contributions from \$2,500 to \$2,400. ... Quade, who is not on the House General Laws Committee, spoke in opposition, criticizing the attempt to undo the changes before they were actually put into practice. The committee voted 9-4 for the resolution immediately after testimony concluded. 'It is disappointing, but not surprising, that Republican leadership has chosen to prioritize blatantly partisan legislation to overturn voter-approved redistricting reforms instead of focusing on the public health threat and economic devastation from COVID-19,' Quade said in a statement." • In April 2019, Quade Voted Against A Predecessor To SJR 38 That Also Included Language To Ban All Lobbyist Gifts. "Legislation walking back voter-approved redistricting alterations gained initial approval from the Missouri House. The Republican-led effort was criticized as a move to 'overturn the will of the voters' and referred to as 'childish.' Yet, supporters stood their ground, arguing it's an 'improvement' on the so-called Clean Missouri amendment and is 'better, more comprehensive' ethics reform. On Monday, the chamber pass HJR 48, sponsored by Rep. Dean Plocher, with a 104-49 vote. The legislation, which heads to the Senate, would ban all gifts from

Gas Tax Hikes

Quade Repeatedly Voted In Favor Of Increasing The Gas Tax

In April 2017, Quade Voted For A Rejected Amendment To Ask Missouri Voters To Increase The Gas Tax By 34%. "The Missouri House of Representatives on Wednesday rejected a proposal to let voters decide whether to raise the state's gasoline tax by nearly 6 cents a gallon in 2018. The measure failed 51-103. Voting against the issue were three Northeast Missouri legislators -- Craig Redmon, R-Canton; Jim Hansen, R-Frankford; and Lindell Shumake, R-Hannibal. The proposed tax hike was introduced as an amendment to Redmon's House Bill 694, which won initial approval Wednesday



allowing the state to tax propane-fueled vehicles. The amendment called for raising the fourth-lowest fuel tax in the country from 17 cents - set in 1996 - to 22.9 cents per gallon, which would have put the rate above the national average of 21.09 cents per gallon, according to the American Petroleum Institute." In May 2018, Quade Voted For A Voter-Rejected Measure (HB 1460) To Increase The Gas Tax By 59%. "SaferMO.com is a campaign committee dedicated to the passage of Proposition D — which was sent to the voters by the General Assembly through HB 1460. The measure is asking Missourians to approve a 10 cent fuel tax increase, the creation of an 'Emergency State Freight Bottleneck Fund,' and exempting Olympic winnings from state income taxes." In May 2021, Quade Voted For A Parson-Signed 74% Gas Tax Hike (SB 262). "Quade praised Democrats for playing decisive roles in passing a prescription drug monitoring program and establishing a state sales tax for online retailers. No one took credit for the gasoline tax, led by Senator Dave Schatz, R-Sullivan. However, Quade said it was an example of poor policy decisions by the Republicans. 'We have to go to things like regressive taxes and increasing the (gasoline) tax to repair roads and bridges,' Quade said. 'We have to do that because the Republican majority refuses to fix it through policy. The gas tax increase was not the solution, it was a band-aid. We supported it because it absolutely had to get done. People are begging for infrastructure help and we don't want to be liable when bridges collapse.'" In December 2017, Quade Estimated Her Failed Bill (HB 1699) To Impose An Online Sales Tax Would Generate \$358 Million/Yr. "Missouri would also take a step toward collecting sales tax on online transactions under Eigel's bill, which calls for the Department of Revenue to join the Streamlined Sales & Use Tax Agreement. Previous estimates for similar legislation put additional revenue just from taxing e-commerce at between \$108 million and \$210 million. Rep. Crystal Quade, a Springfield Democrat who has pre-filed similar legislation, says total additional revenue for her bill is estimated to be about \$358 million." (Springfield News-Leader, 12/11/17)

In November 2019, Quade Called For Imposing An Online Sales Tax. "She [Quade] then added that she thinks the state should be looking for new funding sources for education, like a sales tax on online purchases the state doesn't currently enforce." (Springfield News-Leader, 11/10/19)

In May 2021, Quade Voted For A Parson-Signed Bill (SBs 153 & 97) To Impose An Online Sales Tax. "In legislative jargon, it's called the Wayfair fix. What it means is a change in state law that makes online retailers liable to the state for sales tax on purchases delivered into Missouri. And Thursday, House and Senate negotiators agreed on a compromise bill based on the Supreme Court's 2018 ruling upholding South Dakota's tax law. The Senate voted 25-4 at 2:15 a.m. Friday to approve the bill. The House followed suit early Friday afternoon, sending it to Gov. Mike Parson on a vote of 145-6. If signed by Parson, Missouri would be the last state with a sales tax to adopt a law capturing revenue from out of state sales. ... The major differences between the House and Senate were over provisions intended to offset the estimated \$80 million to \$120 million collecting the tax will add annually to the general revenue fund." 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HB 2401 — TAXATION

SPONSOR: Quade

This bill includes several provisions relating to taxation.

Beginning January 1, 2026, aircraft at least 25 years old and used for noncommercial purposes shall be assessed at 32.2% of its true value in money.

Beginning January 1, 2025, taxpayers shall use the personal income tax table described in the bill to identify the amount of tax owed.

Beginning with the 2026 calendar year, the income tax brackets in such table shall be adjusted annually by the percent increase in inflation, according to the Consumer Price Index. In addition, this bill removes all future income tax rate reductions based on future triggering events, as described in the bill.

Beginning January 1, 2025, the corporate income tax shall increase from 4% to 4.5%.

Beginning January 1, 2026, the purchase of retail food shall be exempt from sales and use tax. Also beginning January 1, 2026, any local sales or use tax currently imposed on retail food shall be annually reduced in equal increments of 1.5% over a period of years until it reaches zero, at which point there shall be no further local sales or use tax imposed on retail food.

Beginning January 1, 2026, a sales tax exemption shall no longer be granted on the purchase of either:

(1) All materials, replacement parts, and equipment purchased for use directly upon, and for the modification, replacement, repair, and maintenance of aircraft, aircraft power plants, and aircraft accessories; or

(2) Any new or used aircraft sold or delivered in this State to a person who is not a resident of this State or a corporation that is not incorporated in this State, and such aircraft is not to be based in this State and shall not remain in this state more than 10 business days.

Additionally, this bill sets an expiration of December 31, 2025, for all current in-lieu watercraft taxes on a boat or vessel documented by the United States Coast Guard.

The provisions of this bill shall be submitted to the voters of this state for approval or rejection in November 2024.
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Capping Property Tax Hikes

In March 2024, Quade Voted "Present" On A Resolution (HJR 78) To Freeze The Assessed Values Of Homes To Curb Rising Property Taxes. "The Missouri House of Representatives has taken a significant step towards addressing concerns over rising property taxes with the passage of HJR 78. The bill, sponsored by State Representative Jeff Coleman, proposes a Constitutional amendment aimed at providing relief to homeowners burdened by escalating property tax rates. HJR 78, which received strong support in the House, seeks to freeze the assessed value of residential properties maintained as primary residences at their most recent assessment value, starting January 1, 2025. This measure aims to alleviate the financial strain on homeowners, particularly seniors, who face the risk of losing their homes due to soaring property taxes. The passage of HJR 78 comes in response to the escalating issue of soaring property assessments in Jackson County, which has sparked widespread discontent among citizens grappling with unexpectedly high property valuations. Recent



data highlights that property assessments in Jackson County have resulted in increased assessed valuations for approximately 238,000 residential parcels, totaling over \$2.6 billion. Consequently, thousands of residents have lodged appeals seeking adjustments to their property valuations." Quade: "State revenues are going to continue to be impacted by the ongoing implementation of state tax reductions that were approved in Senate Bill 509 in 2014. "Irresponsible," "Fantasy," "Short-Sighted"

In March 2019, Quade Decried "Years Of Irresponsible" State Tax Cuts And Claimed They Were Rooted In "Fantasy." "House Democrats already have an idea of why the state isn't seeing more revenue growth: 'years of irresponsible Republican' tax cuts, according to House Minority Leader Crystal Quade. 'The trickle-down theory that cutting taxes produces more tax revenue has always been a fantasy and reality is about to smack us in the face,' Quade, D-Springfield, said." In August 2020, Quade Called Years Of Republican-Backed State Tax Cuts "Short-Sighted." Some Democratic lawmakers pointed out that this all came several years after the GOP-controlled Legislature cut taxes - which they warned at the time could lead to longer-term consequences. In May 2018, Quade Voted Against A Greitens-Signed Bill (HB 2540) To Slash The Top State Income Tax Rate By 7%. "Missouri Republicans hoping to cut taxes got a bill across the finish line Thursday night, less than 24 hours before the end of the state's legislative session. The Missouri House voted 101-40 Thursday night to again cut individual income taxes. ... With a signature from Gov. Eric Greitens, it will become law. Missouri's top individual income tax rate is set to gradually drop from 6 percent to 5.5 percent under current law if state revenue meets targets. The bill lawmakers passed Thursday would knock another 0.4 percent off the tax rate, bringing it eventually down to 5.1



percent. ... Quade, D-Springfield, asked that the bill be sent back for a new fiscal note, arguing it had not been updated since the Missouri Senate removed an earned income tax credit for working families. "With a 126 to 21 vote, a bill that would allow Missourians to get the trade-in credits of multiple vehicles toward the sales tax of a new car passed the state House of Representatives. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said she wasn't surprised half of her party voted in favor of the bill. 'Frankly, since the Governor has called the special session, our issue hasn't been with the specific bill itself. It's been the fact that we're spending tens of thousands of dollars on an issue that's not an emergency, and we have true emergencies we should be talking about,' Quade said." Helms, a Republican, called those measures 'common sense, fiscally responsible incentives' that will lure manufacturers and their jobs from China, which currently dominates the industry. ... Helms' plan was tacked on to a separate bill on the House floor May 4 by a vote of 98-38. All Greene County lawmakers present voted in favor except for House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, the lone Democrat from Springfield. She said she voted no because the idea hadn't been properly vetted. 'It sounds like a good idea in theory, but when you're making policy, it's important to do your research,' she said. ... • The Quade-Opposed Bill (HB 1710) Also Included Provisions To Shield Property Owners From Property Tax Hikes. The proposal ... needs one more vote in the House before it heads to an uncertain fate in the Senate. Under the plan, the amount of the rebate would be based on a tax filer's total annual income tax bill for 2021. If someone has paid the state \$500 or more, they would receive the full credit. If someone has paid \$15, they would receive a \$15 check. Married couples who file jointly could receive as much as \$1,000. The overall cost of the plan is \$1 billion, plus \$2.5 million for the Missouri Department of Revenue to process the checks. ... In March 2023, Quade Opposed Legislation (HBs 816 & 660) To Further Slash The State's Income Tax And Business Tax Rates. "The Missouri House of Representatives has passed a tax cut bill, sending it to the state Senate for consideration. House Bills 816 and 660, which were combined and amended prior to passage, would lower the top individual tax rate from 4.95% to 4.5%. It would also lower the corporate tax rate from 4% to 2%. The measure passed the House on Thursday in a 111 to 48 vote. The tax cuts were opposed by minority Democrats in the chamber. Speaking to reporters, Democratic House Minority Leader Rep. Crystal Quade said this 'may be the largest, most irresponsible thing' legislators could be doing at the moment." (The Center Square, 3/24/23)

Failed Attempt To Suspend A Budget Balancing Rule

In April 2022, Quade Tried To Suspend A Rule That Required Increased Spending To Be Offset By Cuts In General Revenue. "The Missouri House is inching toward its final version of the state's spending plan that will leave \$1.8 billion in general tax revenues on the table and shrink the governor's recommended budget. The chamber's \$46.1 billion budget, for the fiscal year that begins July 1, includes funding for infrastructure, higher education and Medicaid expansion. But the House's proposed plan reduced Gov. Mike Parson's recommendations for increasing teachers' salaries and boosting the state's retirement system. Parson had proposed a \$47.3 billion budget with a \$1.5 billion general revenue surplus, which Rep. Cody Smith, a Carthage Republican and chair of the House Budget Committee, raised to \$1.8 billion. ... Republicans blocked several Democratic attempts to increase funding, insisting that the money be saved for a rainy day. The majority of amendments proposed by Democrats were rebuffed due to a House 'balancing rule,' that requires cuts in general revenue to offset other increases. House Minority Leader Rep. Crystal Quade, a Springfield Democrat, tried unsuccessfully to suspend that rule at the start of debate." (Kansas City Star, 4/6/22)

• Additional Details: "Though Rowden said the Senate will consider the House's work on the budget, ultimately the Senate will have greater say in some of it, as the House left an estimated \$1.8 billion in unallocated general revenue funds on the table, as well as more in federal funding. This comes after a failed effort to suspend a House rule that requires any proposed new or increased funding in general revenue be accompanied by a cut somewhere else. ... Quade, D-Springfield, proposed the rule suspension early in Tuesday's debate over the budget. 'This rule was originally intended as a one-time restriction and an extraordinary circumstance that no longer exists,' Quade said. House Republicans criticized the motion, including Rep. Dirk Deaton, R-Noel,

Defense Of Earmarks

In June 2024, Quade Said Lawmakers Should Be Required To Identify The Earmarks They Requested, And She Was "Proud" Of Her Work Securing 8 Earmarks Valued At \$45.8 Million. "...Quade of Springfield, a candidate for governor, said lawmakers 'absolutely' should have to identify the earmarks they seek. The Independent identified eight earmarks targeted to her district, totaling \$45.8 million, for items ranging from \$250,000 for the Springfield Sports Commission to \$15 million for an alliance of health care providers to expand medical training. 'I'm proud when I'm able to bring money home to my district,' Quade said. 'I wouldn't ask for something I was ashamed of that I didn't think Missourians would be happy with that money going towards.' The transparency of requiring earmarks to have sponsors, Quade said, would help Missourians understand the legislature." (Missouri Independent, 6/27/24)

Quade's "Bridge To Nowhere"







In May 2023, Quade Advocated For An \$8 Million Earmark For A 562-Foot Footbridge In Springfield That Had Been Closed Since 2016 Due To Structural Problems. She Claimed It Was A "Huge Tourist Attraction." "The FY 2024 state budget has finally made it through the Missouri legislature and now awaits final approval by Governor Mike Parson. 'We received around \$86.6 million for Springfield projects provided that the governor signs the budget that we sent him,' said Missouri State Representative Crystal Quade, the House Minority Leader from Springfield. 'We're very excited about what we've been able to do.' Missouri lawmakers approved a record \$51 billion budget for the 2024 fiscal year, which is more than a billion dollars more than Governor Parson proposed, and he still has the right to line-item veto parts of the legislature's approvals. That's what he did last year with funding for Springfield's Jefferson Avenue Footbridge on Commercial Street, closed since 2016 after structural problems were discovered in the historic landmark built in 1902. But after the governor vetoed \$5 million for repairs last year, the legislature has put \$8 million back in this year's budget, and State Rep. Quade believes it can survive. 'That is a huge tourist attraction, and tourism dollars have a high return on investment,' Quade said of the 562-ft. steel multi-arched cantilever bridge that was the first of its kind in Missouri. 'When people come to Commercial Street, they shop at our stores, they stay at our Airbnbs, and they eat at our restaurants. That's a huge thing for the north side and downtown, and I just really believe the governor recognizes the return on investment that it will have." (KYTV, 5/10/23)

In May 2024, The Springfield Daily Citizen's Steve Pokin Questioned Why The State Was Directing Millions Of Dollars To The Shuttered Footbridge. "Has the train left the station for the historic Jefferson Avenue Footbridge? The latest cost estimates for renovating and then re-opening the 562-foot footbridge ranged from \$8.5 million to \$10.8 million. It appears the City Council plans to approve the \$10.8 million renovation. It will include the removal of lead-based paint and construction of elevators at both ends of the bridge to make it accessible to all. Most of the cost will be paid by a state grant of roughly \$7.8 million. ... I'm not sold on the idea that renovating the footbridge with public funds is a wise investment. ... I moved here in 2012 and soon visited the footbridge and was surprised that there were stairs — not bicycle ramps. It was not accessible to all. Current plans call for the construction of elevators. The footbridge was ordered closed for safety reasons in 2016. City inspectors found many serious problems. ... What I'm saying is that I want my elected officials to be reasonable people who care about history but who also consider the cost-benefit of the footbridge today and in the years to come. The fact it's been closed for over eight years now hasn't stopped people from taking selfies there. And I don't think it's kept residents on the north side of the bridge from finding their way to Commercial Street." (Steve Pokin, Springfield Daily Citizen, 5/28/24)

COVID-19 Spending

In March 2020, Quade Responded To The Onset Of The COVID-19 Pandemic By Calling On Lawmakers To Mandate Paid Sick Leave, Cover Hospital Visits For The Uninsured, And Increase Funding For Local Health Agencies. "...Quade, D-Springfield, went first, calling for widespread emergency action to protect Missourians from a disease experts expect will infect large swaths of the American population. 'We need to be, as a state government, taking the roles of leaders,' Quade said. She said lawmakers could start by: Mandating paid sick leave at companies with more than 50 employees for the next six months; Covering hospital visits for people without health insurance for the next month; Increasing funding for county public health departments. Quade said the hospital coverage alone could help keep hundreds of thousands of Missourians who lack coverage from putting off treatment because they can't afford the bill. And she said paid sick leave, long a



progressive priority, is important now to keep people from spreading the virus. 'We have a lot of folks who need to pay their bills,' she said, 'and they will continue to go to work with symptoms and spread this.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 3/13/20)

Quade, D-Springfield, blasted that as a failure of leadership. 'Since this started,' she said, 'I've heard nothing but 'We need to wait,' and 'Let's have someone else deal with it.' She noted that Republican-led states Arizona and Georgia weren't taking that approach and spending \$55 million and \$100 million of their own money to fight the virus. 'Missouri is always the last to do things,' she said. 'This is not the time to wait.' Republicans nevertheless rejected her amendment sending \$20 million in federal poverty assistance money to local health departments." (Springfield News-Leader, 3/18/20)

COVID-19 Unemployment Benefits

In May 2021, Quade Criticized A Parson Administration Decision To Cut Federal COVID-19 Unemployment Benefits To Encourage Recipients To Get Back To Work. "...Parson on Tuesday announced the state is cutting off all federal pandemic unemployment benefits in an attempt to push people back to work. Parson said those extra federal benefits will end for Missourians June 12. Roughly 53,500 Missourians received extra weeks of unemployment aid thanks to federal aid in the last week of April, according to the latest available data. Another 37,000 people who otherwise wouldn't qualify for regular unemployment help also claimed aid, according to a state labor department spokeswoman. That includes independent contractors, farm workers and people who are self-employed. Missouri's unemployment rate hit 4.2% in March, down from 4.3% in February. Parson said business owners in Missouri are struggling to fill jobs as the economy continues to recover from the coronavirus pandemic. He said he hopes cutting the federal aid will push people back to work and address labor shortages. ... Quade in a Tuesday statement said the free market, 'not some federal boogeyman,' is mostly to blame for the labor shortage. She said workers will return if they're offered more money, especially for jobs where the risk of exposure to COVID-19 is higher. 'If companies provide a livable wage, applicants will respond,' she said. 'The notion that Missourians are refusing to work so they can temporarily collect \$300 a week is an offensive right-wing myth.' Missouri is the latest of several states — Arkansas, Mississippi, Montana and South Carolina — ending the \$300 federal benefit that is on top of state benefits." (The Associated Press, 5/11/21)

State Welfare Reforms



In March 2018, Quade Criticized And Voted Against Two Bills (HB 1443, HB 1486) To Ban Welfare Recipients From Buying Alcohol, Cigarettes And Pornography And Require Them To Comply With Work Requirements. "House members approved new restrictions and penalties for individuals who use two welfare programs on Thursday, despite impassioned arguments the move will create unfair financial hardships for those who rely on the funding. HB 1443, sponsored by Rep. John Eggleston, R-Maysville, bars cash withdrawals at ATMs for individuals relying on Temporary Assistance for Needy Families and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. It also sets penalties for TANF recipients who purchase prohibited items such as alcohol and cigarettes. If the bill, which still requires Senate approval, becomes law, first-time offenders would face a 3-month ban from the program, while 3-time offenders would face a 5-year ban. ... The bill, approved 100-46, also would add pornography to items prohibited for purchase. ... Much of the debate on the House floor and in a committee hearing earlier this week centered on a provision that would bar TANF recipients from making cash withdrawals at ATMs or in stores that provide cash-back services. According to Rep. Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, prohibiting TANF recipients from using ATMs would bar low-income families from some vital cash-only businesses, such as laundromats. ... Earlier this week, a House committee approved a separate bill, HB 1486, which would penalize SNAP recipients in Missouri who fail to comply with federal work requirements. ... Under federal law, able-bodied adults without disabilities or dependents are required to work 20 hours per week to qualify for SNAP. Some educational training and volunteer work also qualify for benefits. HB 1486 would bar individuals for three months the first time they knowingly violate the work requirement. The second violation would cause a six-month disqualification and the third would result in a two-year ban. 'Your bill hurts children,' Quade told Kelly, the bill's sponsor, during debate earlier this week. According to Quade, barring individuals from SNAP would hurt children in low-income families who receive breakfast and lunch at school for free through a USDA program." In February 2020, Quade Stated Her Opposition To Medicaid Work Requirements. "Despite another negative court ruling, the sponsor of a plan to require Medicaid recipients in Missouri to get jobs said he will continue pressing forward with his proposal. For the third time in three years, Sen. David Sater, R-Cassville, is sponsoring a plan requiring people who receive health care benefits under the Medicaid program to work, attend school or volunteer in order to maintain the coverage. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said Missouri Democrats oppose adding work requirements. She said meeting the state's tight deadlines for returning existing paperwork already is 'an extreme burden.' 'You're adding additional paperwork: having to go in, make copies of things, have transportation to get to the centers to make copies and mail things in additional costs,' she said. 'Every place that we've seen work requirements across the country, they have not done what the Republicans are hoping they do.'" (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 2/18/20)

Continued Welfare For People Who Get Jobs

In 2016, Quade Campaigned In Support Of Legislation To Allow Missourians On Welfare To Continue Receiving Benefits Even After They Got A Job. Quade: "We cannot punish low-income Missourians who are trying to better their financial futures by cutting them off when they find any small measure of financial success. Too many families in Missouri are barely hanging on, and our



current system is not incentivizing their efforts to succeed. We must pass common-sense legislation in order to solve this community-wide issue. Incremental changes in support that logically follow a family's ability to pay will give families the opportunity to prosper and work their way out of poverty. I implore us to look into the cliff effect and its impact on Springfield's poverty rate. We need elected officials who understand and work for families like the ones I have met these hot summer days. • Quade Repeatedly Pushed "Cliff Effect" Legislation Until Gov. Parson Signed Such A Bill (HB 432) In 2021. "After a yearslong campaign, legislation supported by Rep. Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, was signed into law this week by Gov. Mike Parson. House Bill 432 includes a provision addressing the 'cliff effect,' a term referring to a disproportionate loss in government assistance when a person receives a pay raise at work. The provision creates a pilot program in Greene and Christian counties to taper public benefits so that recipients will not lose them when they reach certain income levels. 'Too many parents are caught in the trap of needing help to pay for child care so that they can go to work,' Quade said in a July 14 Facebook post. 'To add to that, our system is structured so that if you take a small pay raise it can put you over the threshold and you can no longer get assistance. You are then forced to choose between a better- paying job or a job promotion and literally being able to go to work at all.' The bill was sponsored by Rep. Hannah Kelly, R-Mountain Grove. The legislation for the 'protection of vulnerable persons' includes provisions related to restraint policies in schools, sheltered workshop wages and government assistance, according to House.Mo.gov. TAX DOLLARS FOR STADIUMS

In May 2019, Quade Voted For A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 677) To Give Up To \$70 Million In Tax Dollars To Professional Sports Franchises For Stadium Repairs. "HB 677 — Expanding Cronyism through Taxpayer Subsidies to Numerous Sports Leagues and Franchise Owners ... This bill expands cronyism by forcing taxpayers to award up to \$70 million in corporate welfare to billion-dollar franchises for renovations and expansions of sports complexes. Under the bill, existing subsidies are extended—without voter approval—for facilities used by NFL, MLB and NHL franchises located in Missouri. Additionally, new subsidy programs are created to create new facilities and expand the subsidies to include smaller venues. Additionally, new subsidy programs are established to benefit new facilities and additional, smaller venues. ... The House passed the bill on May 15, 2019 by a vote of 88-57 and the bill was signed into law." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, Accessed 1/8/25; Missouri State House Journal, HB 677, 5/15/19, Overall Vote: 89-58, Quade Voted Yes)

In August 2024, Quade Was Open To Discussing Taxpayer-Funded Incentives For Stadiums In Kansas City. "One issue that could end up facing the upcoming governorship is the fate of the Chiefs and Royals in Kansas City. Jackson County voters in April rejected a sales tax measure that would have helped fund a new baseball stadium and improvements to Arrowhead Stadium. ... Quade said while she's not totally sold on possible state incentives to keep both teams in the state, she's open to discussion. 'I'm not saying that I would vote yes, for that, or no, it would depend on what the parameters are,' Quade said." (KBIA, 8/1/24)

In October 2024, Quade Said It Was "Completely Reasonable" To Also Discuss Taxpayer-Funded Incentives For Busch Stadium. Q: "The Cardinals want state subsidies for a redevelopment of Busch

Quade: "I think that it is completely reasonable that the Cardinals are having that conversation, considering the almost-year-long conversation we've been having with the Chiefs and Royals. I think, from a business standpoint, absolutely. They want a piece of the pie, too. I will say for the stadiums in general: First and foremost, we've been really behind the 8-ball in this conversation as a state, particularly with Kansas City and St. Louis. Kansas has already put together a package. They had a special session to put together a proposal. I think that we absolutely need to get the ball rolling, and having a special session, now in almost January. Hopefully one of the first conversations we have next year is around what we are going to do, if anything, about our stadiums." (St. Louis Business Journal, 10/24/24)

TAX CREDITS FOR HOLLYWOOD LIBERALS

This bill remodels the motion picture tax credit program such that film producers can receive up to 50% of the qualifying expenditures that they accrue back in incentives for producing movies in Missouri. The bill also expands the list of industries that can receive incentives under this program. For example, producers of virtual reality content and video games may now qualify for these incentives. CPAC opposes the subsidization of the entertainment industry and opposed this bill." HCS HBs 133 & 583 -- ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY JOBS ACT (Hudson)

COMMITTEE OF ORIGIN: Standing Committee on Economic Development

This bill creates the "Entertainment Industry Jobs Act".

Beginning January 1, 2024, a qualified taxpayer shall be allowed a tax credit equal to 30% of the aggregate amount the taxpayer invested and expended as a rehearsal expense or tour expense.

Such investments and expenses are defined in the bill, but with respect to a single employee, aggregate payroll expenses shall not include that portion of an employee's salary that exceeds \$2 million in the aggregate for a single tour.

Any unused tax credits as specified in this bill may be transfered or sold by a qualified taxpayer under certain conditions. Otherwise, tax credits specified in this bill may be taken beginning with the tax year in which the qualified taxpayer has met applicable investment requirements.

The aggregate amount of tax credits awarded in a fiscal year shall not exceed \$8 million.

LOW-INCOME HOUSING TAX CREDITS

In May 2019, Quade Called On Gov. Parson To Restart The State's Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Program, Which Critics Deemed A Handout To Wealthy Developers. "Before the 2019 session kicked off, Parson made it clear that he wasn't going to restart the low-income housing tax credit unless lawmakers overhauled the program. ... The Senate and House could not agree on a final bill to pare down and restructure the program before the end of Friday. And if Parson sticks to his guns, that means the state low-income housing tax credit will have remained frozen since December 2017.



Some lawmakers want Parson to reverse himself, contending that keeping the incentive dormant hurts the state's ability to cultivate housing for the poor, elderly and disabled. 'Should he waver? I think he should,' said House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield. 'We have people who need help. And this program may not be perfect, but it's better than nothing — which is what we have right now.'" (St. Louis Public Radio, 5/20/19)

Implementation of Medicare for All would require enormous tax increases, report author Charles E. Blahous of the Mercatus Center concludes. Blahous states 'the initial federal obligations would be in the ballpark of \$10,000 annually per person. Even if M4A fully liberated Americans from all their current health care expenses, ... a family of four might still strongly object to having to send an additional \$40,000 to Washington each year on top of their current tax burdens." COVID-19 Vaccine Mandates

In October 2021, Quade Blasted A Parson Executive Order To Ban The State From Enforcing President Joe Biden's COVID-19 Vaccine Mandate. "...Parson on Thursday said his administration won't help enforce President Joe Biden's federal COVID-19 vaccine mandate in some limited instances. Parson's executive order bans his administration from enforcing the mandate or penalizing noncompliance, but only when people refuse coronavirus vaccination for religious or medical reasons. ... Florida's Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis on Thursday announced the state is suing the Biden administration over the vaccine mandate for federal contractors, and Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt on Wednesday said he plans to sue, too. Parson's executive order also directs his administration to comply with any lawsuits Schmitt files against the federal vaccine mandate. ... Quade said in a statement that Parson's order is generally toothless. 'The governor's executive order appears carefully crafted to do absolutely nothing — except promote the attorney general's latest frivolous lawsuit at taxpayer expense,' she said. 'If these two put as much energy into fighting the pandemic as they do into fighting those fighting the pandemic, Missouri would be in a much stronger position.'" (The Associated Press, 10/28/21)

In February 2022, Quade Voted Against Two Bills (HB 1686, HB 2358) To Shield Missourians From COVID-19 Vaccine Mandates. "The Missouri House has given first-round approval to two bills designed to protect Missourians from mandates that would take away their right to decide whether to receive a COVID-19 vaccination. House members approved HB 1686 to make it clear that public entities such as government agencies and public schools cannot require a COVID-19 vaccination as a condition of employment. It also prohibits fines or other penalties based on an individual's vaccination status. Additionally, it reaffirms an employee's right to raise a religious objection to receiving a vaccination. ... The House also approved HB 2358 & 1485 to clearly affirm the right of an employee to receive an exemption from a COVID-19 vaccine requirement if the employee



requests one based on certain sincerely held beliefs. The bill clarifies the religious exemption includes theistic as well as non-theistic beliefs. The bill would require an employer to provide reasonable accommodations for the request unless clear and convincing evidence proves it would cause an undue hardship or be a direct threat to other employees or customers. ... HB 2358 & 1485 also ensures an employee who is injured, disabled, or killed due to an employer-required COVID-19 vaccination would be compensated." Following Anthony Fauci's Recommendations

In May 2020, Quade Criticized Republicans For Not Adhering To The Fauci-Led CDC's Mask Recommendations. Quade: "Democrats came back to do the work of passing legislation that would help Missourians during this crisis, despite the rampant disregard for the governor's own order regarding social distancing and refusal by many Republican members to adhere to the CDC's recommendations of using masks. Unfortunately, it turns out the true goals of the Republicans are quite different than what were stated, as they seem to have little interest in discussing COVID-19 at all." (Rep. Government Overreach In Missouri

In April 2020, Quade Ripped Gov. Parson For Not Issuing A Stronger Statewide Stay-At-Home Order. "As Missourians in every corner of the state continued to get sick from the coronavirus outbreak, Gov. Mike Parson bent to reality on Friday and announced a statewide stay-at-home order that will take effect Monday. ... 'The order is not at all what was advertised and what health care professionals and Missouri residents had been demanding for weeks,' said Missouri Rep. Crystal Quade, a Democrat from Springfield and House minority leader. 'It is so riddled with exemptions that it differs little from the weak and ineffective social distancing directive the administration previously issued.'" (Kansas City Star, Editorial, 4/3/20)

In August 2020, Quade Criticized Parson For Letting Cities, Not The State, Make Decisions On COVID-19. Q: "What is your opinion of the state's response to the coronavirus outbreak thus far?" Quade: "I have been very vocal since March regarding COVID-19 and what I hoped our leaders would do. I believe in the beginning the legislature and the governor should have: directed more funding for testing mechanisms and our county health departments; provided PPE for our front line workers; declared grocery store employees essential workers; provided additional funding for grant programs for our small businesses; provided adequate support for our Department of Labor to deal with unemployment claims; and made some bold decisions regarding the early shutdown. Instead, the governor bucked the decisions to the cities, and we have seen a steady increase in those who have contracted and died from COVID-19." (Springfield News-Leader, 8/25/20)

In December 2020, Quade Said It Was Not Too Late For Parson To Issue A Statewide Mask Mandate Or Restrict Indoor Gatherings. "Quade said it's not too late for the governor to implement a mask mandate or to limit indoor gatherings. 'The way that we get back to normal, the way we support our small businesses and the way that we protect ourselves and our loved ones is by listening to the White House Task Force and implementing some of the things that folks are begging us to do,' Quade said." In March 2021, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 75) To Restrict The Ability Of Local Governments To Shut Down Businesses, Churches And Schools. "House Bill 75, sponsored by Rep. Jim Murphy, R-St. Louis, was passed out of the Senate Health and Pensions Committee the same day it was heard



Wednesday. The bill would restrict the length of local health orders and require approval by the local governing authority for extensions. ... Under the bill, a health order could only be enacted for 15 days. From there, with approval, it could be extended for an additional 15 days. After the first 30 days, an order could be extended for three additional 10-day periods if approved each time by a two-thirds vote of the local governing body. Any subsequent 10-day extensions would require a unanimous vote. 'House Bill 75 does a simple thing,' Murphy said. 'It says that health departments need to protect our health. Legislators need to protect our liberties, and they can't work independent of each other. There needs to be oversight.'" In May 2021, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 682) To Rein In Government Overreach That Occurred During The COVID-19 Pandemic. The proposed reforms include stating emergency powers must be narrowly tailored to serve a compelling public health or safety purpose, requiring legislative approval for orders to continue after 30 days, prohibiting government entities from forcing a person to quarantine if they haven't tested positive for a contagious disease, and establishing civil and criminal liability protection for individuals and business owners. ACU believes that many of government's reactions to COVID-19 have done more harm than good, supports efforts to combat abuse of power by government officials and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 3, 2021 by a vote of 102-50." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri; Missouri State House Journal, HB 682, 5/3/21, Overall Vote: 102-50, Quade Voted No)

In March 2022, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1713) To Ban Government Orders To Shut Down Religious Gatherings. "HB 1713 — Religious Freedom Protections ... This bill nullifies orders that shut down religious gatherings save in a few exceptional circumstances. For example, these orders still stand when a gathered group is in imminent danger from problems like floods, fires, terrorist threats, or other immediate disasters. CPAC believes it is vital to the preservation of First Amendment liberties that religious gatherings not be wantonly impeded by the government and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 97-32 but the bill was not taken up by the Senate." Then-AG Eric Schmitt Anti-Mask Mandate Efforts

In August 2021, Quade Said Schmitt's Lawsuit To Stop School Districts From Enforcing Mask Mandates Jeopardized The Lives Of Missouri School Children. "...Schmitt filed a lawsuit Tuesday that seeks to stop school districts from enforcing mask mandates, requirements aimed at slowing the spread of COVID-19. The action drew a rebuke from President Joe Biden, who finds such lawsuits 'unacceptable,' his press secretary said Tuesday. The lawsuit names Columbia Public Schools along with the district's Board of Education and board members, but is a class action lawsuit that 'would apply to school districts across the state that have a mask mandate for schoolchildren,' said Chris Nuelle, a spokesman for Schmitt. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat, said in a statement that schools may be forced to close if Schmitt's lawsuit is successful and outbreaks occur. She also noted that Schmitt is running for U.S. Senate in 2022. 'This lawsuit might help Schmitt win a Republican U.S. Senate primary, but it puts the lives and education of Missouri children in jeopardy,' Quade said." (The Associated Press, 8/24/21)

In December 2021, Quade Criticized Schmitt's Ongoing Effort To Block The Local Enforcement Of Mask Mandates. "But even with a surge in cases in the Show-Me state that is virtually certain to



increase during the winter and holiday season—not to mention the looming threat of the Omicron variant—Pemiscot and New Madrid are among at least half a dozen local health departments that say they have halted their COVID-19 response in the wake of a scathing Dec. 7 letter from Attorney General Eric Schmitt demanding they pull back from pandemic safety. ... Critics say Missouri is setting itself up for even more trouble—and pointing the finger at a cynical play for votes in a Republican Party that sometimes seems to be doubling down on pandemic death. 'Attorney General Schmitt is using his office as a tool for his campaign at the expense of not only taxpayer dollars, but at the risk to the health and safety of every Missourian,' State House Minority Leader Crystal Quade told The Daily Beast on Friday. 'Whether it's asking adult vigilantes to submit photos of school children wearing masks or threatening school boards and health departments, the Attorney General is clearly trying to score political points with the far right.' 'Schmitt's standing in the GOP primary shouldn't be the factor that puts the health and safety of Missourians at risk,' she added." (The Daily Beast, 12/10/21)

In January 2022, Quade Accused Schmitt Of Trying To Bully Springfield School Leaders To Not Impose A Mask Mandate. "Despite the looming threat of legal action from ... Schmitt, Springfield school leaders are seeking a temporary return to required masking. ... Citing the uptick in COVID cases and school closures, State Rep. Crystal Quade, a Democrat and parent from Springfield, said the lawsuits filed by Schmitt prevented many districts from 'taking reasonable and entirely lawful steps to protect their students from a highly contagious disease, steps that became necessary in part because Schmitt bullied them in dropping their mask mandates.' She added: 'Eric Schmitt's stunning abuse of power is making countless Missouri kids sick and preventing schools from keeping their doors open.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 1/23/22)

In January 2022, Quade Filed Failed Legislation To Reimburse School Districts For Their Legal Battles With Schmitt Over Mask Mandates. "...Quade of Springfield filed legislation providing full reimbursement to local public school districts for legal expenses incurred defending against frivolous lawsuits filed by Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt. The local public school districts would only get the reimbursements if the courts rule in favor of them. 'Local public school budgets are already stretched thin because of the pandemic,' Rep. Quade said. 'They shouldn't have to foot the bill for Eric Schmitt's shameful campaign stunts.' She says she is trying to protect Missouri schools. 'We're trying to make sure that these public education dollars are reserved for public education. So for our students, for our teachers to make sure that our kids are getting what they need.' Forty-five mask-requiring school districts in Missouri face lawsuits from Attorney General Schmitt." (KYTV, 1/26/22)

Masking Hypocrisy

In May 2020, Kansas City Star Editors Took Quade And Other Democrats To Task For Being "Dangerous And Selfish" In Their Decision To Not Wear Masks During The Legislative Session. "We've been giving Republican officials many well deserved whacks for failing to wear masks to protect others from COVID-19. That behavior is dangerous, selfish and shows a lack of leadership. Well, guess what? Many Democrats in the Missouri House also went increasingly maskless during the legislative session that ended last Friday, and that too was dangerous and selfish. They also revealed just a big hole in the ground where their example-setting and brain-using were supposed to be. Photos posted on the public Missouri House Democrats Facebook page show members on and off the floor with masks either nowhere to be seen or worn uselessly around their necks. ... There's a video clip of Minority Floor Leader Crystal Quade, of Springfield, masklessly testifying on the last day of the session about the failure to take action on COVID-19." In July 2020, Quade Stated Her Support For A Springfield Mask Mandate After She Was Photographed At The State Fair Not Wearing A Mask. "At the Cattlemen's Steak Fry in Sedalia, there were ribeyes on the grill, speeches and, despite urgings from Parson and state Health Director Randall Williams in other places, hardly a mask to be seen. ... Quade of Springfield was also there, as were several other Democratic lawmakers. The event came at the end of a week where Missouri recorded 3,918 new COVID-19 infections, testing showed positive rates are double their low of May 29 and daily deaths increased by 40%. ... Quade said she wore a mask into the building and while interacting with volunteers working at the event. She can be seen in several photos without a mask. 'I did take it off while eating and at various times throughout the event,' Quade said. Quade said she supports a proposed ordinance in Springfield requiring masks in public settings. She also said she supports requiring masks for entry into state facilities like the Agriculture Building at the fairgrounds. 'If the numbers stay the same, I would say yes,' she said." In October 2020, Quade Criticized President Donald Trump And Gov. Mike Parson For Not Wearing Masks After They Tested Positive For COVID-19. "...Trump tested positive for COVID-19 nearly ten days after Gov. Mike Parson and his wife tested positive for the virus. ... Parson's isolation is winding down, but lawmakers said they aren't surprised he or Trump tested positive. 'So, my first thought is, I hope it's okay but then also, not shocked because of the way they both have been handling the virus,' House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, said. 'I hope for both of them that they recover very quickly, but I hope they both are able to look at it through a perspective of somebody that can't.' ... 'These are two candidates who have not really been taking this seriously, who have been seen without masks, who have been criticized frankly for their handling of the coronavirus, then I do think there could be some detriment on the campaign trail,' Quade said. 'I have to say it's been frustrating, both the president and the governor trying to pivot talking about coronavirus to law and order.' ... 'Simply saying, 'Oh you just have to get over it' is disgusting,' Quade said responding to Parson's statement." (KTVI, 10/2/20)

COVID-19 Liability For Missouri Businesses, Healthcare Providers And Schools

In November 2020, Quade Opposed A Legislative Effort To Shield Businesses, Healthcare Providers And Schools From Being Sued Over COVID-19. "Missouri lawmakers plan to protect businesses, healthcare providers, and schools from being sued over COVID-19. Governor Mike Parson expanded the call for the current special session two weeks ago to now include COVID liability protection. If passed, it would stop people from suing businesses over COVID. ... Quade said some businesses have put their employees at risk. 'Over and over, Governor Parson has stressed the need for personal responsibility in fighting COVID-19. But for businesses that negligently put their employees and customers at risk, he doesn't want them to have to take any responsibility at all. While providing protections for businesses that follow the rules and take the necessary steps to keep people safe might be warranted, a blanket exemption that also shields bad actors from legal liability will encourage reckless behavior and make a crisis that already has spun out of control far worse.'" In May 2021, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (SB 51) To Shield Businesses And Health Care Providers From COVID-Related Lawsuits. "...The Missouri House sent a sweeping bill that would shield businesses from most COVID related lawsuits to the governor's desk. Despite an attempt to kill Senate Bill 51 in the final minutes of the session, it was passed out of the House by a vote of 97 to 57 Friday. ... Senate Bill 51, sponsored by Sen. Tony Luetkemeyer, R-Parkville, would shield businesses and healthcare providers from most COVID-related lawsuits, unless a high standard of proof could be met. Residents would have up to one year to pursue legal action in instances of



medical malpractice and two years in cases of product liability or after an alleged exposure, like claiming the virus was contracted on a business's premises. It also offers explicit exemptions for religious organizations unless the plaintiff 'can prove intentional misconduct.'" Increased Teacher Pay

In April 2024, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (SB 727) To Increase Minimum Teacher Pay By \$15,000 And Expand Charter Schools And School Choice Opportunities. "The Missouri House of Representatives on Thursday sent a pair of omnibus education bills to Republican Gov. Mike Parson for approval. Senate Bill 727, passed by an 82-69 vote, increases the amount of tax credits for the Missouri Empowerment Scholarship Accounts program, allows charter schools in Columbia and increases minimum teacher pay from \$25,000 to \$40,000. ... Democrats weren't unified against the bill, but Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, said her caucus remains committed to improving public education. 'I really saw this bill as a moving of public money to private institutions,' said Quade, who's running for her party's nomination for governor. 'I can tell you everyone in our caucus wants to have robust discussions around education reform. Charter Schools

In March 2017, Quade Voted Against A Failed Bill (HB 634) To Expand Charter Schools. "...House leadership this week turned attention to education and passed a bill that could allow charter schools to open in Springfield. Currently, these independently operated schools are only authorized in St. Louis and Kansas City. House Bill 634, sponsored by Rep. Rebecca Roeber, R-Lee's Summit, was debated for several hours Wednesday and Thursday. Dozens of amendments were proposed and three were adopted before sending the measure to the Senate on an 83-76 vote. Springfield-area representatives voted for the bill with the exception of Rep. Lynn Morris, R-Nixa, Rep. Mike Moon, R-Ash Grove, and Rep. Crystal Quade. ... The bill would allow charter schools to operate in any school district, but there are several caveats, including the requirement that the state foundation formula be fully funded." (Springfield News-Leader, 3/19/17)

In November 2019, Quade Opposed Allowing Charter Schools To Open In Springfield, And She Called For Greater Scrutiny Of Such Schools In Kanas City And St. Louis. "Next, lawmakers were asked whether they support allowing charter schools, which take public money but are run by the private sector, to open in Springfield. ... Quade disagreed, saying that not only did she oppose allowing charter schools into Springfield without a public vote, which she said she thinks would shoot down the idea, she wants greater scrutiny for existing charter schools in Kansas City and St. Louis." In December 2019, Quade Sponsored A Failed Bill To Require A Public Vote Before New Charter Schools Could Open. "If they can't stop the [charter school] legislation again this year, they'll propose amendments requiring charters to get approval from often hostile local school boards or voters themselves before opening. Quade, the House minority leader from Springfield, said her bill requiring a public vote would ensure people actually want charter schools before they open their doors. ACU supports improving educational outcomes and reducing costs through school choice and ensuring equal treatment for both charter and public schools and supported this bill. School Choice

In November 2019, Quade Stated Her Opposition To School Choice. "Next, lawmakers were asked whether they would support allowing people to make tax-deductible donations to help pay for children to attend private schools. ... Quade answered the question with one word: 'No.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 11/10/19)

In August 2020, Quade Pledged To Oppose School Choice Legislation. Q: "What will you do as a legislator to improve educational outcomes for Missouri students?" ... Quade: "If re-elected, I will be trying to stop legislation such as expansion of charter schools and ensuring they are subject to the same standards of accountability, transparency and respect for the rights of students, parents and staff as traditional public schools. I will also oppose tax-credit schemes to move public money to private schools, push to reinstate collective bargaining rights for all education employees to promote school environments where educators and students can excel and protect retirement systems so we can recruit quality educators." In May 2021, Quade Spoke And Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 349) To Create ESAs To Allow Missouri Parents To Send Their Children To The School Of Their Choosing. "Lawmakers gave final approval Thursday to the creation of Education Savings Accounts in Missouri, a major success for Republican leaders who had made doing so one of their top priorities. The bill barely made it out of the House earlier this year but ran into little resistance in the Senate. It now goes to Gov. Mike Parson for his signature. House Bill 349 - sponsored by Rep. Phil Christofanelli, R-St. Peters - allows families to apply for a state-supported scholarship, known as an Education Savings Account, to send their children to private school or cover other educational expenses. ... Quade ... has consistently opposed such legislation. 'I always vote against anything that pulls taxpayer dollars away from public institutions to private individuals,' Quade said." Open Enrollment

The bill ... would give school districts discretion over whether to participate in the transfer program and how many transfers to allow each year. Students transferring to a new school district would be counted toward that district's average daily attendance, which is used to calculate the distribution of state aid among districts. The bill advanced to the Senate by a vote of 82-68, despite vocal opposition from House Democrats as well as a lack of unanimous support from Republicans." In March 2023, Quade Voted Against An Open Enrollment Bill (HB 253) "The Missouri Legislature's top open enrollment advocates both say they feel optimistic about passing legislation this session -- but possible changes to the flagship bill in the Senate could sink it. House Bill 253 would create a voluntary open enrollment program that would allow public school students to transfer from their home district to any other public school district that has opted into the program. Students may leave a district that has not opted in for another district that has, but the percentage of students who can transfer out of a district in any year may not exceed 3 percent of that district's enrollment the previous year. Rep. Brad Pollitt, R-Sedalia, is the sponsor of HB 253, which he characterized as a 'well-crafted, moderate parent choice bill.'" In March 2023, Quade Described Open Enrollment Legislation As A Means To Expand Charter Schools. Quade, D-Springfield, argued the open enrollment bill 'is going to open a Pandora's box.' Quade described Pollitt's bill as the first step toward legislation she believes would be more harmful to public schools, like the expansion of the state's charter school system. She argued that the expansion of charters, which currently are only allowed in St. Louis and Kansas City, is unwarranted considering their low performance on the annual performance report. But charters scored on par or better than traditional schools in the latest round of testing. Kansas City charter schools scored an average of 71.4% on the MSIP 6, compared to the Kansas City Public Schools' 70.7%. St. Louis charter schools earned an average of 71.3%, compared to St. Louis Public Schools' 63.9%." (Missouri Independent, 3/13/23)

In January 2024, Quade Voted Against An Open Enrollment Bill (HB 1989). "The first bill passed by the Missouri House of Representatives in the previous two legislative sessions followed a similar path in 2024, clearing the lower chamber and then stalling in the Senate until it ultimately failed to reach a



final vote. The bill, HB 1989, was referred to as 'open enrollment,' as it would allow participating school districts to accept students from other districts." (KFVS, 6/4/24; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1989, 1/31/24, Overall Vote: 86-73, Quade Voted No)

The First Trump Administration's School Choice Efforts

In January 2020, Quade Said She And Other Democrats Were "Completely Opposed" To The Trump Administration's Efforts To Divert Tax Dollars From Public Education. "When asked about [Trump Education Secretary Betsy] DeVos's comments, ... Quade said she did not hear the secretary's speech but has concerns. I will also oppose tax-credit schemes to move public money to private schools, push to reinstate collective bargaining rights for all education employees to promote school environments where educators and students can excel and protect retirement systems so we can recruit quality educators." Banning Public Schools From Spending Tax Dollars On Politics

In May 2021, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (SB 86) To Ban Public Schools From Spending Tax Dollars On Politics. "SB 86 — Prohibiting School Districts from Engaging in Political Electioneering and Expanding School Choice ... This House substitute version of this bill would protect taxpayers by ensuring their tax dollars are not used for political purposes and expands school choice opportunities. Under the bill, school districts, their employees, officers, and agents would be prohibited from expending public funds to support or oppose the nomination or election of any candidate, the passage or defeat of any ballot measure, committees supporting or opposing candidates or ballot measures, or to pay off debts or obligations of a candidate or committee incurred for the purposes list above. Additionally, this bill improves educational outcomes for families by expanding public and private school choice. ACU supports protecting taxpayers by ensuring public resources are used for their directly intended purposes, supports improving educational outcomes through school choice and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 84-67 and an amended version of the bill was later signed into law." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, Accessed 1/10/25; Missouri State House Journal, SB 86, 5/11/21, Overall Vote: 84-67, Quade Voted No)

Private Sector Regulations

Opposition To Cutting Red Tape For Missouri Businesses

In May 2019, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1158) To Direct A State Agency To Help Small Businesses Navigate Its Web Off State Regulations. "HB 1158 — Assisting Small Businesses in Navigating the Government Permitting Process ... This bill is designed to strengthen economic opportunity by assisting small businesses in navigating labyrinthine regulatory regimes. Under the



bill, the department of natural resources would be directed to identify any permits required and to work alongside small businesses with 25 employees or fewer to complete the permit applications. If government fails to provide such assistance, DNR would be directed to reduce the permit application fees by the amount the small business paid for DNR permit assistance. ACU supports reducing regulatory burdens which reduce competition and entrepreneurship, supports providing small businesses assistance in meeting stringent regulatory requirements and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. COMMITTEE OF ORIGIN: Standing Committee on Local Government

MUNICIPAL REGULATION OF HOME-BASED BUSINESSES

This bill prohibits municipalities from restricting the operation of a "home-based business" or otherwise requiring a person to apply for or obtain a permit, license, variance, or other prior approval to operate a home-based business. The bill establishes a list of factors that qualify a residential property for use as a home-based business.

Municipalities can establish reasonable regulations on a home-based business if the regulations are narrowly tailored for specified purposes, including protecting public health and safety. A municipality that enacts a regulation bears the burden of proving by clear and convincing evidence that the regulation complies with this bill.

In May 2022, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 1662) To Ban Local Governments From Regulating Home-Based Businesses. "HB 1662 — Freedom to Work from Home ... This bill prevents local governments from banning telephone sales, thereby shutting down those who work from home. It also prevents local governments from making restrictions on the hours of operation of home-based work. CPAC supports the ability of individuals to conduct legal business on their own private property and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 13, 2022 by a vote of 94-43 and the bill later became law." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, 1/8/25; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1662, 5/13/22, Overall Vote: 94-43, Quade Voted No)

In April 2023, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 268) To Create A Regulatory Relief Office In The Department Of Economic Development Designed To Help Businesses. "A plan to offer new businesses some regulatory relief has made its way to the Missouri Senate. On April 11, 2023, the Senate Economic Development and Tax Policy Committee heard testimony on HB 268, which creates the Regulatory Sandbox Act. ... HB 268 would create the Regulatory Relief Office within the Department of Economic Development. Businesses that apply for the program could receive a waiver from certain state laws or regulations during a 2-year period. Missouri's regulatory sandbox would apply to all industries." (MO Chamber Of Commerce, Press Release, 4/14/23; Missouri State House Journal, HB 268, 2/27/23, 116-34, Quade Voted No)

Massive Fee Hikes On Small Business Owners

In March 2020, Quade Voted Against A Resolution (SCR 38) To Block A State Agency's Attempt To Impose Fee Hikes Of Up To 140% On Small Businesses. "SCR 38 — Reining in a Runaway State Agency and Blocking Enormous Fee Increases on Businesses ... This resolution helps prevent the state Department of Natural Resources from inappropriately extending its regulatory powers and blocks the imposition of enormous fee increases for 'hazardous waste generators.' Under existing law, the Hazardous Waste Management Commission under the DNR is permitted to promulgate



rules to establish registration fees for individuals and businesses which contribute to waste considered hazardous; additionally, the legislature has the authority to reject increases in such fees. In 2019, the HWMC proposed increasing fees by as much as 140%. These increases were reportedly pursued by the HWMC in order to expand its regulatory authority to include permitting, inspection, and enforcement currently conducted by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. ... ACU opposes arbitrarily driving up business costs in order to expand the regulatory authority of government and without providing the necessary explanation of service expansion benefits and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on March 4, 2020 by a vote of 101-42 and the resolution became law. Opposition To Restricting Eminent Domain

In April 2019, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1062) To Ban Utility Companies From Seizing Private Property For Power Line Projects. "HB 1062 — Protecting against Private Entity Eminent Domain Abuse ... This bill would strengthen property rights by prohibiting private utility companies from being granted eminent domain powers to seize private property for the construction of above-ground merchant power lines that do not benefit Missourians. The bill is in response to wind and solar companies which are attempting to use the power of eminent domain to construct transmission lines to sell their power to lucrative markets on the east coast. ... ACU supports strengthening property rights, supports the use of eminent domain only as a last course of action for projects of substantial public benefit and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on April 18, 2019 by a vote of 115-35." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1062, 4/18/19, Overall Vote: 115-35, Quade Voted No)

- In January 2020, Quade Voted Against A Similar Bill (HB 2033). "HB 2033 Protecting against Private Entity Eminent Domain Abuse ... This bill would strengthen property rights by prohibiting private utility companies from being granted eminent domain powers to seize private property for the construction of above-ground merchant power lines that do not benefit Missourians. The bill is in response to wind and solar companies which are attempting to use the power of eminent domain to construct transmission lines to sell their power to lucrative markets on the east coast. ... ACU supports strengthening property rights, believes eminent domain should only be used for projects providing substantial public benefit, with vigilant oversight, and with just compensation for property owners and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on January 27, 2020 by a vote of 118-42." Specifically, this bill requires that before the Public Service Commission issues an approval for a merchant line, an entity must provide the PSC with a resolution of support passed by the county commission in each county through which the merchant line will be built. The bill is in response to wind and solar companies which are attempting to use the power of eminent domain to construct transmission lines to sell their power to lucrative markets on the east coast. ... The House passed the bill on February 25, 2021 by a vote of 123-33." Tort Reform



In 2017, Quade Voted Against Several Greitens-Signed Tort Reform Bills (HB 339/714, SB 31, HB 452, HB 153). "...Greitens has signed legislation that the Property Casualty Insurers Association of America says will help improve the legal climate in that state. According to PCI, SS/SCS/HCS/HB339 and 714 is comprehensive insurance tort reform legislation that will help curb the abuses associated with section 537.065 and the time-limited demand settlement process. ... Other tort reform bills signed by Gov. Greitens include: SB31, which makes changes to the collateral source rule (paid v. billed damages) so parties can only introduce evidence of the actual cost of the medical care rendered, instead of the value of those costs rendered. ... HB 452, which says that, with certain exceptions, no healthcare provider shall be liable for the negligence of another entity or person who is not an employee of the healthcare provider. HB153, which creates a higher standard for expert evidence, improves the reliability of expert witness testimony, and puts Missouri in line with a majority of states regarding the standard used for expert testimony." "SB 608 — Protecting Businesses from Criminal Conduct outside their Control ... This bill establishes the 'Business Premises Safety Act' to protect businesses from overzealous plaintiffs' lawyers and frivolous lawsuits. Specifically, the bill declares a business has the duty to guard against only criminal acts that 'they know are reasonably likely to occur,' and removes language from previous law that could hold a business legally liable if they acted merely with 'negligence.' ACU opposes frivolous litigation that drives business and consumer costs and enriches trial lawyers and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 17, 2018 by a vote of 106-28. (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, Accessed 1/5/25; Missouri State House Journal, SB 608, 5/17/18, Overall Vote: 106-28, Quade Voted No)

In March 2020, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 2049) To Close Lawsuit Loopholes That Were Often Exploited By Trial Lawyers. "HB 2049 — Reducing Lawsuit Abuse by Closing Lawsuit Loopholes ... This bill would help prevent lawsuit abuse in liability claims by improving transparency in claim negotiations and clarifying the rights of liability insurers. Under existing law, plaintiffs and named defendants are permitted to negotiate liability without consent of insurers that nevertheless binds insurers in terms of payouts under the policy. Under this bill, insurers would no longer be bound by such agreements unless they consent in writing. The bill would also permit insurers to intervene in a lawsuit after an agreement is reached without their consent. ACU supports combatting lawsuit abuse which drives up consumer and business costs by raising insurance costs and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 5, 2020 by a vote of 90-57." Advocate For Big Labor

During Quade's Failed 2024 Gubernatorial Campaign, She Pledged To "Continue To Advocate For Strengthening" Labor Unions, And She Stated Her Commitment To Defeat Paycheck Protection And Right To Work Legislation. Quade: "As somebody who has worked closely with labor throughout my time in the House, I will continue to advocate for strengthening our labor unions across Missouri. ... Additionally, as governor, I'll put my foot down against anti-worker legislation like paycheck deception and whatever the next attempt at passing Right-to-Work looks like. I'll restart the prevailing wage report database, prioritize contracts that invest in Missouri's workforce, and I'll hold anti-labor politicians responsible for their attacks on working Missourians and will continue to support making Missouri a better, safer, and stronger state for working Missourians." Dan Brown's SB 19, the right-to-work bill, officially became law Monday, making Missouri the 28th state in the country to adopt such a policy. The official signing of the bill came at the Capitol in the governor's office where nearly all of the pro-right-to-work Republican legislators flanked Greitens, most notably Brown and Rep. Quade supports it, arguing that increasing the minimum wage would help families stay afloat. Missouri voters will decide on the measure, called Proposition A, on Nov. 5. It would gradually raise the minimum wage from \$12.30 an hour to \$15 an hour in 2026. ... Quade is in favor of the measure, saying in a statement that she supports 'anything we can do to help working Missourians put food on the table, pay their bills, and support their families.' 'Whether that's an increase in the minimum wage to ensure working Missourians are able to keep up with inflation, or making sure workers can accrue paid sick leave, Missouri workers need our support,' she said. Opposition To Pro-Farming Legislation

Bill Reiboldt, HB 1614 would leave the regulation of seeds and chemical fertilizers to agencies that have expertise in agriculture. The legislation prohibits any political subdivision from adopting or enforcing any regulation relating to seeds, chemical fertilizers and soil conditioners — though there was talk of soil conditioners being excluded in the final version of the bill." In a briefing Thursday, commissioners decided against joining a pair of Springfield city councilmen in objecting to the law, saying it wasn't worth damaging relationships with lawmakers who backed it. The law has broad support among Republican legislators and the agricultural industry groups who wanted to eliminate local regulations on big farms known as CAFOs that are stricter than what the state enforces." This bill helps protect the private property rights of agricultural facilities from extremist animal rights organizations and out-of-state inspection entities. The bill is in response to states such as California, which require inspections of facilities for the sale of agricultural products into the state, which has led to unauthorized seizures and harassment orchestrated by animal rights groups. This bill ensures that unless requested by the owner of the facility, no other entity may inspect the grounds or facilities to enforce or carry out the laws or administrative rules of another state. ACU supports strengthening privacy and property rights and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on May 4, 2021 by a vote of 102-46 and the bill was signed into law." Foreign-Owned Farmland

In 2023, Quade Sponsored A Failed Bill (HB 707) To Halt Future Purchases Of Missouri Farmland By Foreign Countries. "...Quade is the sponsor of House Bill 707. This bill would halt future purchases by foreigners or foreign companies after August of this year." (KYTV, 2/16/23)

Photo ID

In September 2016, Quade Ripped Photo ID Legislation As A "Farce." Quade: "Here is what I know: We cannot make it more difficult for our citizens to vote. ... I won't argue the difficulties many low income seniors face obtaining a picture ID or the statistics that people of color are disenfranchised when these laws take effect. What I will talk about is what I know to be true in my district. People are struggling. The last thing we need is to make it even harder for their voices to be heard. If we make it even more difficult to vote, we are denying the working poor their right to a voice in our process, which defies the very bedrock of our hard-earned American political system. The people who will be affected by this law are our veterans, senior citizens, parents and neighbors. They deserve to cast their ballot. We must recognize voting discrimination as it is happening. We cannot accept this farce:

In March 2021, Quade Voted Against Photo ID Legislation. (HB 738). "HB 738 — Strengthening Election Integrity Through Voter-ID and Numerous Other Reforms ... This bill implements numerous reforms to strengthen election integrity and combat vote fraud. Most notably, the bill requires a voter to present a photo-id when casting a ballot but permits a provisional ballots to be cast with any documentation currently allowed for voting. Additional notable reforms include audits of voter registration lists, limits on mail-in ballots, and a prohibition on payments for the solicitation of voter registration. ACU supports efforts to strengthen election integrity and ensure that all legal ballots are counted, and that no illegal ballot is counted, which disenfranchises eligible voters and supported this bill. The House passed the bill on March 25, 2021 by a vote of 109-48." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, Accessed 1/8/25; Missouri State House Journal, HB 738, 3/25/21, Overall Vote: 109-48, Quade Voted No)

In April 2021, Quade Charged That Photo ID Legislation Was An Attempt By Republicans To "Combat Voting By Minority Groups." "...Quade, D-Springfield, accused Republicans of enacting legislation that would disproportionately harm black Missourians and other people of color. ... 'No one, not even Republicans if they're being honest, really believe that the push for a strict voter ID law and other voting restrictions are intended to combat voting fraud,; Quade said. 'The reality is such measures are intended to combat voting by minority groups that don't support Republicans.'" (Missourian, 4/6/21)

In September 2021, Quade Called Republican-Backed Election Proposals, Which Included Photo ID Legislation, "Voter Suppression." "...Ashcroft is pushing the GOP-led Legislature to enact a series of changes to state voting laws. His wish list, released Monday, includes requiring a photo ID to cast a ballot, as well as a requirement that county-level election officials purge their voter rolls. ... While his blueprint may find favor among the Republican majorities in the House and Senate, Democrats say the move is a continuation of the debunked election fraud claims made by former President Donald Trump. 'Voter suppression will not improve elections but instead call their legitimacy into question. Every legal Missouri voter should be able to cast a ballot and have confidence their vote will be counted. The secretary of state's proposals would do more to prevent voting than to prevent fraud,' said House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 9/14/21)



In March 2022, Quade Voted Against A Proposed Constitutional Amendment (HJR 94) To Require Photo ID To Vote. "HJR 94 — Requiring an ID to Vote ... This resolution proposes a state constitutional amendment that would require voters to provide election authorities with a government-issued photo ID to vote. Under the amendment, a person without a photo ID could still cast a provisional ballot. CPAC supports reasonable efforts to maintain ballot integrity and supported this resolution. The House passed the resolution on March 10, 2022 by a vote of 97-36 but the resolution was not taken up by the Senate." In May 2022, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Photo ID Bill (HB 1878), Calling It "The Biggest Disappointment Of This Legislative Session." "Missouri voters will be required to show photo identification to vote in November's midterm elections if Republican Gov. Mike Parson signs a 58-page election bill into law. House Bill 1878, sponsored by Rep. John Simmons, R-Washington, will require persons seeking to vote to show photo identification. If they don't have photo identification, they can cast a provisional ballot and return before the polls close at 7 p.m. with photo identification. Or, the ballot will be counted if the person's signature matches the signature on file with the election authority. ... House Democrats decried the legislation. 'I would say the biggest disappointment of this legislative session for us was that bill passing the finish line,' House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield, said. 'And it wasn't just the photo ID provisions. It was banning ballot drop boxes. It gave even more subpoena power to the Secretary of State.'" Federalizing Missouri's Elections

In July 2021, Quade Called On National Democrats To Passe The "For The People Act" And The "John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act," Both Of Which Would Effectively Federalize Elections And Allow Automatic And Same-Day Voter Registration. "At a Springfield vigil pushing federal voting rights legislation and honoring civil rights icon John Lewis, ... Quade warned that Missouri Republicans could restrict voting rights in the Show-Me State if Congress doesn't act. 'For the past five years that I've been in Jefferson City, legislators continue to tell us that voters don't know what they're talking about and so then what we see every year is legislation moving through the process to restrict access to voting. We have to stop it,' the Springfield Democrat told several



dozen rallygoers at the First Unitarian Universalist Church on Saturday. 'Fortunately, these bills have not crossed the finish line, but I promise you they're not going away. We're going to see more legislation in January about voter ID at the ballot, making it harder to get to the ballot box, and harder to hold folks like me accountable.' In May, Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft called for a special session this summer to pass some election reforms like ones passed by many Republican-controlled states since the 2020 election. In reaction to President Donald Trump's false claims of election fraud, many of these bills have restricted early and by-mail voting. So far, Governor Mike Parson has not called a session for that purpose. Quade likened these proposals to voter suppression and called on national Democrats to pass the 'For the People Act' and 'John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act' to stop these bills in Republican-controlled states like Missouri." Voter Fraud

In April 2019, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 269) To Give The Missouri Secretary Of State Greater Authority To Investigate Voter Fraud. "Missouri's Secretary of State would see his investigative powers expand under a bill given preliminary approval by the House. On Wednesday, the lower chamber perfected HB 269, filed by Rep. Dan Shaul. The measure would give the state's top election official subpoena power when investigating voter fraud and other election irregularities. '[Let's] give the tools to the Secretary of State so he can be another set of eyes on voter fraud,' Shaul said during debate. ... Supporters of the legislation said that the measure gives the appropriate enforcement authority to the Secretary of State. They noted that the subpoena power only involves the production of documents and physical items." During A 2020 Reddit AMA, Quade Stated Her Support For Ranked Choice Voting. (Reddit, Quade AMA, 2020)



In May 2023, Quade Voted Against A Resolution (HJR 66) To Prohibit Ranked Choice Voting In Missouri. "HJR 66 — Prohibiting Ranked-Choice Voting in Missouri ... This resolution prohibits



elections officials from conducting elections through a process of ranked-choice voting. Ranked-choice voting is a system of voting wherein, in some circumstances, the individual who places second in the election can win the election by having votes from other losing candidates assigned to them. CPAC opposes this consequence and supported this resolution. The House passed this resolution on May 5, 2023 by a vote of 102-44." Initiative Petition Reform

In March 2021, Quade Said House Democrats Would Oppose Any Attempt By Republicans To Reform The Initiative Petition Process. "Also in the House, representatives made changes to the election and petition process, like requiring photo IDs to vote, something Democrats oppose. 'We're seeing these attacks against the initiative petition process, and that's something we have been opposing since we've been here,' Quade said. The legislation passed requires organizations to get 10% of all registered voters' signatures in each congressional district for petitions to change the state's constitution. It also would require two-thirds approval from voters to pass an amendment on the ballot. 'This is a way for them to hold us accountable,' Quade said. 'When they're asking us to do something and we say no as a body, this is a way they can get things done. When we do things, they don't like, this is a way they can hold us accountable, so any change to access for citizens to hold their government accountable, we are going to oppose.'" (WDAF, 3/12/21)

In April 2021, Quade Claimed Republicans Had "Essentially Given The Middle Finger To Missouri Voters" In Their Attempts To Reform The Initiative Petition Process. "House Joint Resolution 20 would require 10% of voters in all 8 congressional districts and increase the amount of votes needed to pass from a majority to two-thirds. House Bill 333 increases the petition filing fee to \$500. Both bills have passed the House and are waiting for Senate approval. 'Every single year that I have been here, my colleagues have essentially given the middle finger to Missouri voters,' House Minority Leader Crystal Quade said. 'They are making the initiative petition process harder. They are making it so that those with only absorbent amounts of money can actually get something passed.'" (KTVI, 4/1/21)

In February 2022, Quade Called Republican-Backed Initiative Petition Reform Legislation "A Slap In The Face To Voters." "Another measure passed by the House on Thursday would make it more difficult to amend the Missouri Constitution, as voters did in 2020 when they expanded Medicaid. Republican proponents argued that it's now too easy to change the constitution, while Democrats said Republicans are trying to block voters from enacting policies they disagree with. 'This is a slap in the face to voters,' ... Quade said. The latest proposal would require signatures from voters in all 8 state congressional districts in order to put a constitutional amendment on the ballot and would ramp up the threshold to amend the constitution to a 2/3 vote." In February 2023, Quade Criticized And Voted Against An Initiative Petition Reform Measure (HJR 43). "A resolution creating a steeper challenge to change Missouri's Constitution was panned by Democrats as limiting the voice of the voter on Thursday, while Republicans praised its protection of the state's founding charter. ... Both parties met with reporters and commented on House Joint Resolution 43, sent to the Senate on Thursday. It passed 106-50. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said the legislation goes beyond targeting any initiative petition to legalize abortion in Missouri. 'I think this has to do with the fact that, year after year, for well over a decade, the voters have voted for progressive issues at the ballot box,' Quade said. 'The Republicans in Jefferson City don't like that. They don't like the voter's voices being heard and abortion is part of that conversation. But I really think this is about the past decade in our state.'" (The Center Square, 2/2/23)



In April 2024, Quade Criticized And Voted Against Another Failed Initiative Petition Reform Measure (HJR 86)."The GOP-led House on Thursday amended a proposed constitutional amendment that, if approved by voters, would raise the vote threshold needed for all constitutional amendments going forward. The heart of the proposed amendment would raise the percentage of votes needed to enact voter-directed constitutional changes. Currently, the constitution is amended with a simple majority statewide vote. Under the Republican proposal, amendments also would need a majority of votes in five of the state's eight congressional districts to pass. House lawmakers on Thursday added a provision to the amendment to ban noncitizens from voting — which they already can't do — setting up a showdown with the GOP-led Senate. ... Quade told reporters Thursday that the measure would take 'away the citizens' ability to, in my opinion, hold the Legislature accountable.' 'Missouri citizens have used the ballot initiative whenever the Legislature has gone too far or not done enough,' Quade said. 'Whether that was for passing Medicaid expansion and stopping right to work, legalization of medical and recreational marijuana; the list goes on and on.'" (The Associated Press, 4/25/24)

Border Security

In February 2024, Quade Criticized Gov. Mike Parson For Proposing To Send National Guard Troops To The Border, And She Backed A Failed Biden-Harris Immigration Deal. "...Parson late Sunday said he plans to put 'boots on the ground in Texas, criticizing President Joe Biden's handling of immigration issues at the southern border with Mexico. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat, criticized Parson in a statement, arguing that he should be focused on issues in Missouri such as the hundreds of jobs lost after an aluminum smelter recently closed in the southeastern part of the state. 'I bet the 500 folks in the bootheel that lost their jobs a couple weeks ago would rather have the governor focusing on that, instead of wasting taxpayer money to fly to TX for a photo op,' Quade, who is running for governor, said in a text message. There is a federal bipartisan negotiated bill on the table for the members of Congress. Our governor should be focused on Missouri and saving those jobs.'" (Kansas City Star, 2/5/24)

Trump-Era Homeland Security Officials Blasted The Quade-Backed Immigration Deal As A
"Disaster For Border Security" That Would Lead To "More Mass Illegal Immigration." "Multiple

be a 'disaster' for border security despite claims from supporters that it would help stem the
migrant crisis. 'The bill negotiated by three Senators and President Biden funds and facilitates

In July 2024, Quade Reversed Course On Parson's Deployment Of Troops To The Southern Border, Noting That She Voted To Fund The Effort. She Also Reiterated Her Support For The Failed Biden-Harris Immigration Deal. "Quade from Springfield, one of the leading Democratic candidates for governor, cited immigration as a top issue for voters in a statement to *The Star*. She pointed to her support for money backing Parson's deployment to the southern border. 'Immigration is an important issue that is on the top of a lot of people's minds- and there is no denying there is a problem at the border,' Quade said. 'When Governor Parson sent troops to the southern border, I voted to ensure they had funding from the state.' Quade added, however, that she was disappointed that a bipartisan border deal died in Congress, saying it 'fell victim to folks in DC playing politics with our border security. Something that we know all too well here in Missouri.' She said as governor she would use the Missouri National Guard's counter-drug task force in coordination with federal agencies 'to keep Missourians safe.'" (Kansas City Star, 7/11/24)

<u>Illegal Reentry</u>

In May 2017, Quade Voted Against A Greitens-Signed Bill (SB 34) That Included Provisions To Criminalize When Deported Illegal Immigrants Reenter Missouri. "...Greitens and the General Assembly have delivered the Blue Alert system. With a recent increase in violence against police officers, Greitens signed SB 34, which would establish the Blue Alert system, similar to the Amber Alert system used for missing children. ... The Blue Alert system would notify the public in the event of a law enforcement officer being injured or killed. ... But SB 34 also creates a new crime in the Show-Me State: illegal reentry. What this means is that if a person is deported from the U.S. for committing a crime and then returns and commits a felony, they could be tried for illegal reentry as well as the felony. The crime of illegal reentry will carry a Class C felony designation, with a punishment of three to seven years. It also adds museums for children under the age of 18 to the list of public places which a sex offender is banned from." In-State Tuition For Illegal Immigrants

In May 2019, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 3) To Ban Public Colleges And Universities From Providing In-State Tuition To Illegal Immigrants. "But it only came together after a tense fight over 4-year-old language in the higher education funding bill barring public colleges from using state money to offer in-state tuition to undocumented immigrants. ... Holsman, D-Kansas City, made a successful bid to strip out the language in a House-Senate conference committee Tuesday with the assistance of Sen. Lincoln Hough, R-Springfield, Sen. Mike Cunningham, R-Rogersville, and Democrats on the panel. In a later interview, Hough said he thinks the decision to provide in-state tuition should be left up to the schools. But House Republicans rejected the move Thursday morning on a near party-line vote, arguing state dollars should go toward helping legal residents first, and the Senate ultimately backed down in the face of Friday's 6 p.m. deadline to pass the budget. ... Quade, D-Springfield, was the only local representative to favor lifting the restriction." In March 2023, Quade Voted For An Amendment To Provide In-State Tuition To Illegal Immigrants. "Forcing Taxpayers to Provide Illegal Immigrants with In-State Tuition Rates at Public Colleges and Universities. The Weber amendment #5 to the Higher Education and Workforce Development appropriations bill. This amendment makes individuals who are residing within the state unlawfully eligible for in-state tuition rates at Missouri colleges and universities if they graduated from a Missouri high school. Oppose is the Limited Government Position as this amendment not only forces taxpayers to subsidize the higher education costs of individuals residing in the country unlawfully, but also limits opportunities for legal residents to enroll in competitive state colleges. Banning Illegal Immigrants From Voting In Missouri

In May 2018, Quade Voted Against A Proposed Constitutional Amendment (HJR 100) To Require That Only U.S. Citizens Be Counted For Reapportionment. The Measure Required Voter Approval. "The Missouri House has given initial approval of a proposed constitutional amendment that, upon voter approval, would alter reapportionment standards. ... Within the resolution, only U.S. citizens would be counted as part of the population used in reapportionment — redistricting. It also lays out that reapportionment officials can only accept compensation appropriated by the General Assembly. 'Each person's vote should have the same weight,' said Plocher. '...we have all heard of the premise of one person, one vote. Therefore, for reapportionment purposes, HJR 100 simply says, you must be a United States Citizen.' Supporters argued that counting those who are not U.S. citizens when drawing districts — which should be as equal in size as possible — puts more weight behind some people's vote as compared to others." In December 2019, Quade Dismissed A Republican Legislator's Resolution To Ban Illegal Immigrants From Voting In Missouri, Saying Existing Language Already Banned The Practice. "An Ozarks lawmaker raised eyebrows this week when he filed a bill to solve a problem some say doesn't exist. If passed, the resolution from Rep. Curtis Trent, R-Springfield, would ask voters to make a one-word change to the Missouri Constitution. Rather than saying 'all' U.S. citizens who are 18 or older can vote, Trent wants it to say 'only' U.S. citizens who are 18 or older can vote. In a news release, Trent said the change is necessary to 'make absolutely clear that U.S. citizenship is required to vote.' He said cities including San Francisco and Chicago and some towns in Maryland currently allow noncitizens to vote in some local elections and warned that efforts are afoot to introduce the idea in other states. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said no one in her caucus had any interest in allowing noncitizens to vote. 'The existing language already guarantees voting rights are only for citizens,' she wrote in a text message. 'I have not been told about any efforts to change that, other than Rep. Trent's bill to add language.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 12/17/19)

In April 2022, Quade Voted Against A Proposed Constitutional Amendment (HJR 131) To Ban Illegal Immigrants From Voting In Missouri Elections. The Measure Required Voter Approval. (Missouri State House, HJR 131, 2022 Legislative Session; Missouri State House Journal, HJR 131, 4/6/22, Overall Vote: 97-45, Quade Voted No)



HCS HJR 131 -- ELECTIONS (Shaul)

Upon voter approval, this proposed Constitutional amendment clarifies that only citizens of the United States are eligible to vote. The resolution requires that voters cast a single vote for each office or issue. Additionally, it requires that the plurality winner of any political party primary election be the only candidate for that political party on the ballot at the General Election.

The resolution also requires the use of paper ballots and voting records which are preserved for use in any election audit. Voting machines will be tested and certified as secure under federal standards prior to each election.

The resolution has ballot language submitted by the General Assembly under Chapter 116, RSMo.

In February 2023, Quade Called An Initiative Petition Reform Measure That Included Provisions To Ban Illegal Immigrants From Voting "Deceptive." "The Missouri House passed legislation this week aimed at making it harder to amend the state constitution through the initiative petition process. The Republican-backed bill would increase the threshold needed for voter approval of a proposed constitutional amendment from a simple majority to 60%. But the change needs voter approval, and the first bullet point in the summary crafted by Republican lawmakers that would be placed on the statewide ballot doesn't mention initiative petitions at all. Instead, it asks Missourians whether the constitution should be amended to 'allow only citizens of the United States to qualify as legal voters.' That one line dominated House debate this week. 'We know it's put in there to be deceptive to voters,' said House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield. ... Republicans are trying to trick Missouri voters with the citizenship language, Quade said, but it won't work. She noted voters rejected similar proposals in Arkansas and South Dakota by overwhelming margins. 'We know all across the country, 'she said, 'where they have tried to go after the ballot initiative process, voters are with us in saying that they want to continue to have a voice in democracy.'" Crime

Relaxing Cash Bail Requirements And Restoring Voting Rights For Convicted Felons

In February 2019, Quade Backed A Failed Democrat Criminal Justice Plan That Sought To Relax Cash Bail Requirements For Criminals And Restore Voting Rights To Convicted Felons. "Members of the House Democratic Caucus and the Missouri Legislative Black Caucus outlined legislation to strengthen and reform the criminal justice system in Missouri by correcting practices that disparately punish the poor, removing obstacles that make it harder for people who've served their time to become productive citizens and ensuring the rights of children are protected in legal proceedings. 'Maintaining a strong criminal justice system means addressing its weaknesses,' said House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield. 'If we truly want to address crime in our state, we must end counterproductive practices that come down harder on poor defendants and make it more difficult for past offenders to find jobs and contribute to society.' In his recent State of the Judiciary address to lawmakers, Missouri Supreme Court Chief Justice Zel Fischer announced new rules the court is instituting to avoid jailing people awaiting trial who are neither a danger to the public nor a flight risk but simply too poor to afford cash bail. The Money Bail Reform Act of 2019, House Bill 666, sponsored by Missouri Legislative Black Caucus Chairman Steve Roberts, D-St. Louis, would codify many of the reforms being implemented by the court. ... House Bill 508 sponsored by state Rep. Bruce Franks, D-St. Louis, would restore voting rights to people with felony convictions who have been released from prison but remain on probation or parole." Mandatory Sentences And Cracking Down On Violent Crime



In January 2020, Quade Called Gov. Parson's Call For A Crackdown On Violent Crime "A Lot Of Lip Service." "While Democrats have called for more restrictions on gun ownership and greater flexibility for cities to impose their own gun rules, the Republican governor made clear that's not his plan. ... Parson instead called on lawmakers to provide more protection for witnesses of crime, increase mental health resources and ramp up laws against violent crime. Those proposals likely have a better shot at passing in a Legislature where gun rights are fiercely defended. ... Quade described Parson's ideas on how to combat violence as 'a lot of lip service.' 'We're not seeing actual proposals that will make any serious change,' she said." (The Associated Press, 1/15/20)

In January 2020, Quade Said Her Caucus Generally Opposed Tougher Sentencing Laws. "A measure sponsored by Sen. Doug Libla, R-Poplar Bluff, would toughen sentencing guidelines for people with certain prior convictions: drug trafficking, armed criminal action or violent crimes. They would face three to 10 years in prison, while people with other felony convictions would still face the current seven-year maximum. The bill targets those already legally barred from owning firearms. ... Representatives of law enforcement and prosecuting attorneys testified in support of the measure. Darrell Moore, executive director of the Missouri Association of Prosecuting Attorneys, said cities are seeing repeat offenders who continue to carry guns. ... Meanwhile, two other Republican proposals would increase prison time for armed criminal action, or the use of a deadly weapon to commit a felony. Separate measures sponsored by the committee chairman, Sen. Tony Luetkemeyer, R-Parkville, and its vice chairman, Sen. Bob Onder, R-Lake Saint Louis, would raise the minimum sentence from three to five years for a first conviction and even higher for subsequent offenses. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said her members generally don't support tougher sentencing laws. 'There are laws that we can pass now that will keep firearms out of the hands of criminals,' Quade said. 'We also believe that strong gun rights for those who act responsibly can and must coexist with commonsense laws to keep guns out of the hands who don't." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 1/22/20)

In A June 2020 Letter To Gov. Parson, Quade Called On Him To Veto A Bill (SB 600) To Create Mandatory Sentences For Violent Crimes And Crack Down On Violent Street Gangs. Parson Later Signed The Bill Into Law. "Although reforming the criminal justice system will take years, there is one action you can and should take right now to keep the situation from getting worse, and that is to veto Senate Substitute for Senate Bill 600, legislation that seeks to take a significant step backward from the important sentencing reforms Missouri has adopted in recent years. SB 600 is precisely the wrong bill at precisely the wrong time and signing it into law would send precisely the wrong message to the thousands of Missourians marching for reform throughout our state. However, a veto would demonstrate your commitment to a fair criminal justice system that demands just punishment for crimes but doesn't impose harsh vengeance merely for the sake of being vengeful." • During A June 2020 Protest In Springfield, Quade Reiterated Her Opposition To The Bill And Complained, "There Are Not Enough People Making Laws Who Are Black." "Thousands of people poured into downtown Springfield on Saturday demanding justice for George Floyd and freedom for all black Americans from generations of discrimination. ... Imari Stout, who helped organize the demonstration, noted the same thing in an interview, saying that people have to get involved in down-ballot contests that get little attention but can have significant impacts on everyday life. 'Get out and vote for the elections that are not being streamed on your Instagram,' Stout said. 'There are people being elected to office and put in chairs to make decisions that do not represent us or our communities.' ... Quade, D-Springfield, echoed the sentiment, noting that last month the legislature's Republican majority passed a criminal justice bill expected to



- increase the prison population by thousands despite little evidence it will help cut down on violent crime. 'The only way we change that is we change who we send to Jefferson City,' Quade said. 'There are not enough people making laws who are black.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 6/8/20)

Violent Crime In St. Louis And Kansas City

In September 2019, Quade Attacked Gov. Parson's Decision To Send State Troopers To St. Louis To Fight A Violent Crime Wave That Resulted In The Murders Of More Than A Dozen Children. "...Parson is sending highway patrol troopers and other state workers to St. Louis as part of an effort to fight the surge of violent crime that has included the killings of more than a dozen children in the region so far this year. The Republican governor on Thursday announced an action plan that takes effect Oct. 1. Parson said the total cost of the state's commitment, including the 25 state employees who will work in the St. Louis region, is up to \$4 million. ... Troopers will patrol interstate highways and assist with U.S. Marshals Service and Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives that focus on violent criminals. The state is also providing investigators to help with federal crime cases and social workers to assist crime victims. Parson said his plan also includes \$2 million in state funds for services to help crime victims. ... St. Louis has long had one of the nation's highest murder rates, and the 144 homicides so far in 2019 are on pace to top last year's total of 186. Particularly troubling this year is the fact that 11 of the victims were children, and two other child deaths are still being investigated as 'suspicious.' ... Parson's plan addresses violence in St. Louis County, too. St. Louis County has recorded 37 homicides this year, one fewer than the same time a year ago. ... Quade of Springfield said Parson's plan 'does nothing for Kansas City or rural areas affected by increases in gun-related suicides and local violence.' Quade, in a statement, said the proposal fails to address 'Missouri's dangerously weak gun laws.'" (The Associated Press, 9/19/19)

• Quade Feared Parson's Plan Would "End Up Being Little More Than A Public Relations Campaign." "...Parson announced Thursday that the state on Oct. 1 will begin deploying about 25 employees, many of them highway patrol troopers, 'to get more boots on the ground' to try to help reduce violent crime in St. Louis. ... Quade, D-Springfield, complained in a news release that Parson's plan doesn't include strengthening Missouri's 'dangerously weak gun laws.' In July 2020, Quade Criticized Parson For Calling A Special Session To Address Violence In St. Louis And Kansas City To Focus On "Tough-On-Crime Rhetoric That Will Solve Nothing." "Missouri lawmakers will reconvene later this month to consider ways to stem the escalating violence that has become especially deadly in St. Louis and Kansas City, Gov. Mike Parson announced Wednesday. The special session that starts July 27 will be singularly focused on violent crime. But unlike some other states that are considering police reforms in the wake of racial injustice protests, Missouri lawmakers will focus on measures that could strengthen laws and put more people behind bars. ... Quade of Springfield, a Democrat, accused Parson of 'tough-on-crime rhetoric that will solve



nothing.' 'Diminishing the voice of Black communities, who are disproportionately affected by both the pandemic and the epidemic of gun violence, will not make Missouri safer,' Quade said in a statement." (The Associated Press, 7/15/20)

- Quade Said The Special Session Should Focus On Police Reform, Not Cracking Down On Violent Crime. "...Parson called this special session because the state is on track to set record homicide numbers this year. ... Quade from Springfield said the governor's provisions will only fill prisons. 'Yes we want to deal with violent crime, but if you look at the call for the special session, none of these things that he's talking about deals with crime before it happens.' 'It's a combination of what can we do better to make sure our law enforcement officers have the resources they need but then also what could we be doing better to make sure our citizens are protected and there is accountability,' she said." Five of the six ideas Governor Mike Parson had for decreasing violent crime in Missouri passed out of the State House. If passed by the Senate and signed into law, endangering the welfare of a child will be serious felony, it'll be illegal to sell or hand a gun to a kid to avoid an investigation or arrest, but okay to give a minor a gun without parents' permission. Judges can use testimony from a witness who was intimidated by a defendant, and the state will set up a witness protection fund." (KYTV. 8/25/20)

In October 2024, Quade Accused Republicans Of Making St. Louis "The Boogeyman" Due To Its Crime Problems. Quade: "First and foremost, specifically because we're talking about the St. Louis region, St. Louis has been made out to be the boogeyman. And it's quite wild because it's one of the biggest economic drivers of this entire state of Missouri. By 'boogeyman,' obviously we talk a lot about the increase in crime. But I like to partner that with a conversation, that the state has not been doing much to support the lack of 300 police officers in the city of St. Louis. We could go back and forth on that. But to answer your question: Anything that the city has tried to do to move itself forward, we see the legislature go and undo that. Like the vote of the people wanting to increase the minimum wage: the very next year, Jefferson City said, 'No, you can't do that.'" (St. Louis Business Journal, 10/24/24)

Former St. Louis Circuit Attorney Kim Gardner

In August 2020, Quade Attacked Republicans For Pushing Legislation, Which She Called A "Vendetta," To Bypass Gardner, Who Had Failed To Prosecute Several Murder Cases During A Spike In Violent Crime. "...Quade said, 'When Gov. Mike Parson initially called this special legislative session, it was clear his purpose was not to address violent crime but to change the subject from his disastrous leadership during the COVID-19 pandemic. Today, the session took a more sinister turn as the governor seeks to carry out a political vendetta against the only elected African-American woman prosecutor in Missouri.' Gardner won the August 4 primary with more than 60% of the vote. ... 'By now trying to strip her of the prosecutorial discretion and authority enjoyed by every other



prosecutor in the state, the governor attacks democracy itself,' Quade said. 'Lawmakers must not become co-conspirators in the governor's politically motivated abuse of power.'" (St. Louis American, August 2020)

In February 2023, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 301) To Allow The Governor To Appoint A Special Prosecutor In Crime-Ravaged Cities Like St. Louis. Lane Roberts, would allow the governor to appoint a special prosecutor in regions with high homicide rates. Republicans touted the package as a multi-faceted response to crime across the state, particularly in St. Louis City, which was in earlier versions of the bill specifically targeted with a special prosecutor." Democrats say Republicans are playing politics. 'I feel like the folks on the other side of the aisle

Opposition To The Death Penalty

In 2016, Quade Stated Her Opposition To The Death Penalty. Q: "Do you support the use and continuation of capital punishment?" Quade: "No." (Mobilize Missouri, "Survey Responses" Page, Accessed 9/22/16)

In May 2022, Quade And Other Democrats Called On Gov. Parson To Halt The Execution Of A Double Murderer. "A double murderer has been executed by lethal injection on Tuesday despite having had the decision overturned on three occasions. Carman Deck, 56, who was first sentenced to death in 1998 was executed after the Missouri governor decided against granting him clemency. ... Democratic lawmakers sent a letter to the Missouri governor on Monday asking him to halt the execution. 'Our state has a responsibility to rise above those impulses and uphold moral and spiritual fortitude in the face of evil,' wrote Ingrid Burnett, a Kansas City Democrat. 'We believe that a failure to do so degrades our institutions, threatens our character, and grants too much authority to a state apparatus that could utilize that power flagrantly in the future.' The letter was signed by over 20 other House Democrats, including Minority Leader Crystal Quade of Springfield." (Mirror, 5/4/22)

In July 2024, Quade Reiterated Her Opposition To The Death Penalty. "Quade said that she doesn't support the death penalty. 'What I think we need to be doing is having conversations around supporting our jurors who, more often than not, do not say that folks need the death penalty and our judges are overruling that,' Quade said." Race-Related Riots

In May 2020, Quade Responded To A Fellow Legislator's Statement That Looters In Minneapolis Should Be Shot By Calling Him Unfit For Office. "A Missouri state representative attracted criticism online Friday afternoon when he tweeted that 'Looters deserve to be shot. ... But not by the government' and referenced the Second Amendment. The post from Rep. Tony Lovasco, R-O'Fallon, came amid riots and looting in Minneapolis sparked by the death of George Floyd, a black man who died after a white police officer named Derek Chauvin pinned his knee on Floyd's neck for eight minutes. ... Quade, a Democrat from Springfield, released a statement calling Lovasco unfit for office. 'Anyone who commits a crime should prosecuted and punished appropriately,' she said. 'But



an elected official who advocates for extrajudicial murder is just as lawless as those he condemns and is unfit to hold public office.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 5/31/20)

Furloughing Prisoners During The COVID-19 Pandemic

In March 2020, Quade And House Democrats Supported Furloughing Non-Violent Prisoners During The COVID-19 Pandemic. "Quade, D-Springfield, urged Parson and GOP leaders to pull out the stops on a sweeping response. 'We need to be, as state government, taking the role of leaders,' Quade said. In a briefing with reporters, Quade said Parson should declare a state of emergency to open access to a pool of state and federal funding that could be used to reimburse health care providers for testing of uninsured people. The state also needs to authorize paid sick leave for companies with more than 50 employees, she said. 'If there has never been a time in my life to talk about paid sick leave, now is it,' Quade said. Democrats also want the Department of Corrections to furlough nonviolent prisoners to lessen the number of people who might catch the virus while behind bars." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 3/13/20)

Flagged Soft On Crime Votes

In February 2019, Quade Voted For A Bill (HB 113) To Eliminate Mandatory Minimum Sentences For Non-Violent Crimes. "The Missouri House has voted to eliminate mandatory minimum sentences for non-violent crimes. Missouri law requires that offenders with one prior conviction must serve at least 40-percent of a prison term. Those with two prior convictions must serve 50-percent, and those with three or more must serve 80-percent. House Bill 113 would allow judges to make exceptions to those mandates if, based on certain criteria, those minimums would be unjust to the defendant or unnecessary to protect the public. 'This enables us to, as someone said, differentiate between the folks that we're scared of and the folks that we're mad at,' said bill sponsor Cody Smith. ... The bill drew broad bipartisan support, passing out of the House 140-17." (Missouri Times, 2/21/19; Missouri State House Journal, HB 113, 2/21/19, Overall Vote: 140-17, Quade Voted Yes)

In February 2020, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1873) To Criminalize Carjacking. "HB 1873 This bill creates the offense of vehicle hijacking, which is committed when an individual knowingly uses or threatens the use of physical force upon another individual to seize or attempt to seize possession or control of a vehicle. This offense is punished as a class B felony unless one of the aggravating circumstances listed in the bill was present during the commission of the offense, in which case it is punished as a Class A felony." (Farmington Press, 3/5/20; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1873, 2/24/20, Overall Vote: 123-33, Quade Voted No)

In May 2020, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1450) To Criminalize Fentanyl Trafficking. "Legislation that would criminalize fentanyl trafficking was endorsed by the Missouri House on Tuesday. The measure is part of a larger omnibus package that would also impose stiffer penalties for some gun-related crimes, create a state-level witness protection program and prohibit drone flights near prisons and sports stadiums. The chamber voted 101-50 to approve the package with most Democrats and a handful of Republicans voting against it. ... Schroer, R-O'Fallon, sponsored the legislation approved Tuesday. 'If we're going to get serious on opioids, fentanyl, carfentanil, and crime in our state, vote in favor of House Bill 1450,' he told the House." In August 2020, Quade Voted Against Bills (HB 11, HB 16) To Increase Penalties For Endangering The Welfare Of A Child And Unlawfully Transferring A Weapon To A Minor. "Schroer's other bills, HBs 11 and 16, made it through as drafted. HB 11 would elevate the crime of endangering the welfare of a child from a misdemeanor to a first-degree felony. ... Other bills, including the unlawful



transfer of a weapon to a minor (HB 16), creation of a witness protection fund (HB 66), and ending residency requirements for safety officials in St. Louis (HB 46) were perfected without amendments attached." In April 2022, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 2127) To Increase Penalties For Smash-And-Grab Crimes Involving ATMs. (Missouri State House, HB 2127, 2022 Legislative Session; Missouri State House Journal, HB 2127, 4/4/22, Overall Vote: 112-27, Quade Voted No)

HCS HB 2127 -- OFFENSES INVOLVING TELLER MACHINES (Francis)

COMMITTEE OF ORIGIN: Standing Committee on Financial Institutions

This bill adds damaging or making a "teller machine", as defined in the bill, inoperable to the offense of property damage in the first degree. This offense is a class D felony; a class C felony if committed for the purpose of executing any scheme or artifice to defraud or obtain any property that exceeds \$750 or the damage to the teller machine exceeds \$750; and a class B felony if the damage committed was to obtain the personal financial credentials of another person

This bill describes the offense of tampering with a teller machine and makes it a class D felony, unless the offense is for the purpose of executing any scheme to defraud or obtain any property valued at \$1000 or more or damage to the teller machine of \$1000 or more, in which case it is a class C felony.

The bill also provides that the offense of stealing is a Class C felony if the property is a teller machine or the contents of a "teller machine regardless of the value or amount of cash.


In April 2022, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1954) To Require People Convicted Of DWI That Resulted In The Death Of A Parent To Pay Child Support To The Victim's Children. "Missouri lawmakers are considering a bill requiring someone convicted of DWI that caused a crash killing a parent to pay child support to the victim's children. It is House Bill 1954, sponsored by Mike Henderson, R-Bonne Terre. If passed, the bill would tell a judge to consider future financial needs of children left behind, their caregivers, the children's physical and emotional needs, and any future child care needs." In May 2023, Quade Voted "Present" On A Parson-Vetoed Bill (SB 189) That Threatened To Allow Convicted Sex Offenders To Expunge Their Records. "...Parson vetoed Senate Bill 189, which included a law that would have increased the punishment for celebratory gunfire. Parson said two amendments added to Senate Bill 189 led to the veto. ... Parson said one of the amendments, Section 610.140, 'could allow criminals convicted of sexual offenses, including sexual exploitation of a minor or the promotion of child pornography, to have their records expunged and be removed from the sex offender registry.'" 

<u>Defunding The Police</u>

In May 2021, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (SB 26) To Allow Residents To Sue Local Officials Who Slashed Police Budgets By More Than 12%. "Senate Bill 26, sometimes referred to as the police 'bill of rights,' was approved by Missouri lawmakers in May and is awaiting the signature of Republican Gov. Mike Parson, a former sheriff. ... The Missouri bill's sponsor, Republican state Sen. Bill Eigel of St. Charles County, said it takes necessary steps to protect police and the public. One provision addresses the so-called 'defund the police' movement. It prohibits decreasing the budget for a policing agency by more than 12% compared to the jurisdiction's other departments over a 5-year period. The bill comes as some progressives in St. Louis and Kansas City want to reduce police budgets and use the money for things such as mental health services and addiction treatment. ... Another provision spells out procedures for disciplining police, which Eigel calls the police bill of rights. Among other things, it requires records of any administrative investigation to be 'confidential and not subject to disclosure under Sunshine Law,' except by subpoena or court order. ... The Missouri bill also puts limits on investigations of officers and provides protection against civil claims unless the officer is criminally convicted. 'This gives due process rights for discipline, which



was sorely needed,' said Kevin Ahlbrand, legislative director for the Missouri Fraternal Order of Police. 'There is still a process for disciplining an officer. It doesn't protect bad officers.' The bill upgrades the charge from a misdemeanor to a felony if someone vandalizes 'any public monument or structure on public property.' Public structures such as police stations have sometimes been targeted by racial injustice protesters, as have monuments including those honoring the Confederacy. The upgraded charge means, potentially, more jail time and a higher fine. Another provision creates a new class D misdemeanor for anyone who 'willfully or recklessly' interferes with an ambulance. Racial injustice protesters often march or gather on streets, roads and highways, which authorities say risks blocking access for ambulances and other first responders." In May 2022, Quade Voted Against Two Measures (SJR 38, SB 678) To Prevent Liberal Politicians In Kansas City From Defunding The Police. Voters Later Approved SJR 38 (Amendment 4). "Senate Joint Resolution 38 would require voters in November to approve or reject a constitutional amendment giving the General Assembly the ability to increase minimum funding for a police force established by a state board of police commissioners. Currently, only one police force meets that criterion-Kansas City. The legislature also passed Senate Bill 678, increasing Kansas City's required portion of general revenue for the police department from 20% to 25%. Republicans throughout this year's legislative session stated Kansas City was part of the national 'defund the police' movement. Last year, Kansas City Mayor Quinton Lucas and the city council attempted to transfer \$42.3 million of the police department's \$239 million budget to community services and engagement initiatives. ... Quade, D-Springfield, said Senate Bill 678 was an overreach. 'I didn't realize I was such an advocate for local control until I got to the Legislature and was just blown away with the amount of legislation we see where the Republicans come after municipalities,' Quade said. 'Let those locally elected folks dictate how they spend their money and what they spend it on.'" During Quade's Time As House Minority Leader, She Appointed Pro-Defund The Police Rep. Rasheen Aldridge To A Public Safety Committee. "'Defunding the police has been used in a political way and as a scare tactic. With all the unrest right now, it's been used to say there will be angry mobs at your doorstep with no one to protect you. But that's not what we mean,' state Rep. Rasheen Aldridge said. 'Defunding — or reallocating — is about how we move dollars and reimagine what public safety could be. In August 2020, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 46) To Allow St. Louis Police Officers To Live Outside The City. "...Parson signed into law a bill to protect witnesses of crimes on Monday. ... He also signed House Bill 46 which allows police in St. Louis City to live outside city limits." (KY3, 9/21/20; Missouri State House Journal, HB 46, 8/25/20, Overall Vote: 117-35, Quade Voted No)



State v. Local Control Of The Police Departments In St. Louis And Kansas City

In March 2023, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 702) To Give The State Control Of The St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. "State control over the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department is one step closer to becoming a reality. Missouri House members passed the bill, and it is now in the hands of state senators. As HB 702 passed through the house in Jefferson City, some people in St. Louis are hoping the bill fails in the Senate." In March 2024, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1481) To Give The State Control Of The St. Louis Police Metropolitan Department. "The State of Missouri took a big step toward taking control of the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department. The House of Representatives approved a 'state control' bill in a landslide 109-36 vote." (Fox 2, 3/28/24; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1481, 3/28/24, Overall Vote: 109-36, Quade Voted No)

In June 2024, Quade Reiterated Her Opposition To State Control Of The St. Louis Police Metropolitan Department. "Another area where she diverges with Republicans is her opposition to having a state board oversee the St. Louis police department. ... Quade said removing local control of the department is disrespectful to city residents. 'The one thing that I would add to that is we know Kansas City has been under state control for quite some time, and their crime rates are rising. So it's not working there,' said Quade, who added she would be in favor of ending state control of that police department." (KSMU, 6/18/24)

In July 2024, Quade Stated Her Support For Local Control Of The Kansas City Police Department. "Missouri's Republican candidates for governor all support continued state control of the Kansas City Police Department, another obstacle in the long-term quest of Mayor Quinton Lucas and other city leaders for local authority. ... Quade and Springfield businessman Mike Hamra - both support local control. ... 'Throughout my career, I've been an outspoken advocate of local control for municipal governments in a wide variety of issues, including restoring local control of the Kansas City Police Department's board of commissioners,' Quade, of Springfield, said in a statement. 'I believe that locally elected officials often know the unique problems their communities face and are better equipped to work with local community leaders on how to address those problems.'" "Systemic" Issues And New Police Regulations

In A June 2020 Letter To Gov. Parson, Quade Called On Him To Impose New Regulations On Police. "Dear Governor Parson, The continuing protests across the nation sparked by the May 25 murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer mark at least the third time since 2014 that Missourians have taken to the streets to demand an end to the unjustified killings of African Americans by law enforcement and police brutality in general. In every round of protest, Missourians have only asked that the theory of American criminal justice – one set of laws that applies equally and fairly to all regardless of race or status – becomes actual practice and that law enforcement officers be held accountable for their crimes and abuses, just like everyone else. Your two immediate predecessors as Missouri governor failed to take the lead in advocating for systemic changes following protests over police brutality that occurred during their terms. We strongly urge you not to repeat their mistakes. As a former sheriff, we believe you are uniquely positioned to advocate for long-overdue reforms that are essential to rebuilding a trust and confidence in law enforcement that many Missourians no longer have. The list of proposals for restoring police accountability is long, and dozens of those ideas have been filed as bills by several of our legislative colleagues in recent years. Although we



encourage you to consider any and all of them, there is a particular issue we want to focus on today. One way to produce better outcomes in interactions between law enforcement and citizens is to train officers to make different decisions. To that end, we request you work with the Missouri Peace Officer Standards & Training Commission to overhaul training requirements to deemphasize the use of force, including prohibiting the use of chokeholds and other dangerous techniques known to kill even when done correctly. Training changes also must address eliminating racial profiling in police stops and other steps to ensure police conduct their duties free of bias. According to the POST Commission's website, there currently are 3 vacancies on the 11-member panel, with another 4 members serving on long-expired terms, including one that ended nearly 10 years ago. A commission this important to public safety in Missouri cannot be allowed to operate on autopilot. Therefore, we request you immediately make the necessary appointments to ensure the POST Commission is at full strength and consists of members of diverse backgrounds who are committed to a new era of reform and accountability. If you choose not to make police reform a priority of your administration, when the inevitable next round of protests erupt over another questionable killing of an African American at the hands of police, you will share some culpability with your predecessors for failing to take action when you had the opportunity and authority to do so." • Quade Also Called For "End[ing] Systemic Failures In Our Criminal Justice System." "On Friday, Quade said Parson still has work to do. She said he should replace members of the board who are serving on expired terms. 'With eight of its 11 slots either vacant or held by people serving on long-expired terms, the POST Commission has been on autopilot for years. This is not acceptable. With the governor's appointments today, it's two down, six to go,' Quade said. 'He must now move quickly to fill the remaining slots and take other the decisive actions needed to end systemic failures in our criminal justice system. In June 2020, Quade Supported A Failed Democrat Bill To Make It Easier To Charge Police With Abuse Of Force. Some In Law Enforcement Feared The Bill Was Too Broad. "That's why he [Rep. Hicks] is proposing a law that would give Missouri prosecutors the ability to charge an officer with 'abuse of force' if that officer hurts someone. ... If passed, a guilty officer could face a year in jail with a \$2,000 fine for a Class A Misdemeanor, or even spend life in prison if the situation rose to a Class A Felony. Lake Ozark Police Chief Gary Launderville said the proposal is too broad and open to a lot of interpretation. 'As the one working the front line, having to make split second decisions instead of arm chair quarterbacking later, that just makes me a little nervous,' Launderville said. ... Quade, the House Minority Leader, supports it. She and her party's Black Caucus sent a letter to Governor Mike Parson last week urging him to add police reform to any special session he calls this year. 'I was thankful to see Representative Hicks put that out there,' Quade said." (KSPR, 6/29/20)

In August 2020, Quade Called For Providing Funding So Social Workers Could Tag Along With Police. Q: "Do you think calls for changes to the state's criminal justice system are justified? If so, why, and which changes do you support? If not, why not?" ... Quade: "Yes. We don't have to look much further than the state attorney general's own annual report analyzing racial demographics in traffic stops issued May 29 to see a problem. African American motorists were 94.6% more likely to be pulled over by Missouri police than white drivers in 2019. The 2019 report marks the worst racial disparity since the state began collecting the data in 2000 and also is the third consecutive year in which the disparity worsened compared to the previous year. I believe we need to be having discussions around: funding social workers to partner with law enforcement; modifying existing laws



which will provide citizens the opportunity for redress when a police officer violates their constitutional rights; banning the use of all chokeholds and carotid holds as well as the practice of placing the knee or body weight on the neck or head of a suspect, which are unduly excessive and brutal tactics that can lead to unnecessary and serious injury or death during routine arrests; and establishing a legal duty for police officers to report and intervene when they are witness to excessive force used by a fellow officer and add that failing to report such instances will be considered an act of complicity." (Springfield News-Leader, 8/25/20)

Increased Protections For Police And First Responders

In February 2017, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 57) To Include Police And First Responders Under Hate Crime Statutes. "Rep. Marsha Haefner's bill, HB 57, began as an attempt to include law enforcement and first responders as a protected group under the current hate crime statutes. Haefner, R-St. Louis, urged the House to vote in favor of the bill, saying that state statutes already include law enforcement officers under the list of protected groups. 'This bill adds additional crimes with enhanced penalties for law enforcement officers,' she said. 'It is intended to show meaningful support for our officers across the state, and to express the level of intolerance Missourians have for those who commit crimes against the very people who have taken an oath to protect and serve us.'" In May 2017, Quade Voted Against A Greitens-Signed Bill (SB 34) To Create A Blue Alert System To Notify The Public When A Police Officer Was Injured Or Killed. "...Greitens and the General Assembly have delivered the Blue Alert system. With a recent increase in violence against police officers, Greitens signed SB 34, which would establish the Blue Alert system, similar to the Amber Alert system used for missing children. ... The Blue Alert system would notify the public in the event of a law enforcement officer being injured or killed." Increased Authority For Missouri Sheriffs

In April 2023, Quade Blasted Republicans For Pushing Legislation To Grant More Authority To Sheriffs Over Federal And State Investigations In Their Counties. "Missouri Republicans are pushing a proposal to give local sheriffs sweeping power, including over federal investigations in their counties, just weeks after a federal judge struck down a state law that tried to nullify some federal gun laws. The proposed constitutional amendment would enshrine the office of county sheriff in the Missouri Constitution, and require the sheriff to oversee all federal and state investigations in their particular county. ... Democrats told *The Star* that the Republican-led proposal would give county sheriffs vast and unwarranted levels of power. 'The primary duties of sheriffs are to enforce the law and maintain the county jail. Sheriffs don't get to decide what the law is and unilaterally determine who is guilty of violating it...And sheriffs don't get to violate the U.S. Constitution and take control of federal investigations in their jurisdictions,' House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, a Springfield Democrat, said in a statement. 'If you want to turn Missouri counties into dictatorships controlled by the local sheriff, (this legislation) is exactly how you do it.'" (Kansas City Star, 4/5/23)

The decision by Republican Gov. Mike Parson to free Eric DeValkenaere came after months of public debate about the case, which had fueled both racial justice protests and impassioned pleas for mercy from DeValkenaere's supporters who asserted he had been unjustly convicted. DeValkenaere was serving a six-year prison sentence. He was convicted in 2021 of killing 26-year-old Cameron Lamb as he backed into his garage. ... Parson did not pardon DeValkenaere but rather shortened his sentence to parole, subject to normal restrictions against possessing firearms, traveling out of state without permission and other items. ... Jason Johnson, president of the Law Enforcement Legal Defense Fund, which supports DeValkenaere, said they 'will continue to fight to completely clear' his name. Johnson said in a statement that DeValkenaere had an outstanding record of service, adding: 'While we strongly maintain that Eric is completely innocent, even those who do not must recognize that the ends of justice are not served by his incarceration.'" Flagged Anti-Israel Votes

In May 2019, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1006) To Ban The State From Contracting With Businesses Involved In The Anti-Israel BDS Movement. The proposed legislation, HB 1006, was perfected Wednesday, moving forward in the House. House Bill 1006, sponsored by Rep. Holly Rehder, R-Sikeston, amends current law to add a section titled the 'Anti-Discrimination Against Israel Act' and would prohibit public entities from entering into contracts with companies that are boycotting Israeli companies." In May 2020, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (SB 739) To Ban The State From Contracting With Businesses Involved In The Anti-Israel BDS Movement. "The American Jewish Committee, a Jewish advocacy group based in New York City, applauded the decision of the Missouri General Assembly, representing the State Senate and House of Representatives, on its bipartisan passage of SB 739, or the 'Anti-Discrimination Against Israel Act,' in a press release on Thursday. The new bill will prohibit Missouri and its associate subdivisions from forming contracts worth over \$100,000 with companies that employ more than 10 employees and engage in the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions movement against Israel. The stated nature of the bill follows the State of Missouri's public policy against discrimination in business partnerships with private companies." (The Jerusalem Post, 5/15/20; Missouri State House Journal, SB 739, 5/14/20, Overall Vote: 95-40 Quade Voted No)

U.S. Support For Ukraine

In March 2022, Quade Touted President Joe Biden's Support For Ukraine. "In his first State of the Union, the President spoke directly to the American people about his vision to build a better America. He reminded the country that our best days lie ahead, and that his President is about



giving everyone a fair shot -- because when given half a shot, ordinary people can do extraordinary things. The Biden-Harris Administration's domestic agenda represents an historic shift from the old, outdated trickle-down approach to one that puts workers, families, and small businesses first. ... State and elected officials as well as tribal and territory leaders championed the President's remarks. Here's what they are saying: ... House Bill 1606 was passed last summer amidst many questions and concerns. ... Second Amendment Preservation Act

In May 2021, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 85) To Ban State And Local Law Enforcement From Enforcing The Biden Administration's Gun Control Policies. She Condemned The Bill As "Radical" And "Dangerous." "...Parson on Saturday signed a bill banning local police from enforcing federal gun rules, a change Democrats have predicted will be shot down in the courts. Parson signed the measure, which will penalize local police departments if their officers enforce federal gun laws, during a ceremony at a Kansas City-area shooting range and firearms store. The governor, a former sheriff, said in a statement Saturday that the law 'draws a line in the sand and demonstrates our commitment to reject any attempt by the federal government to circumvent the fundamental right Missourians have to keep and bear arms to protect themselves and their property.' Under the bill, Missouri agencies with police who knowingly enforce any federal laws could be sued and fined \$50,000 per violating officer. ... Quade in a statement described the law as 'radical, dangerous and obviously unconstitutional.' 'The new law even allows criminals who violate federal gun law to sue our local law enforcement officers for a minimum \$50,000 fine if they in any way assist with federal investigations,' Quade said. 'It quite literally defunds the police and gives that taxpayer money to convicted criminals." The group suggests three specific courses of action in the letter to prevent tragedies like last week in Missouri: Universal background checks, strengthened extreme-risk protection orders and repealing the Second Amendment Preservation Act. 'Contrary to the governor's assertion in media interviews after this tragedy, strong state laws could have made a difference and even prevented it from taking place,' the letter states." In March 2023, Quade Praised A Judicial Ruling To Overturn The Second Amendment Preservation Act. "Quade said she would have voted to sustain Gov. Jay Nixon's veto of a controversial bill [SB 656] that changed Missouri's gun laws but stressed that she wasn't anti-gun. 'When it comes to guns, I am a very moderate Democrat compared to most of my colleagues,' she said. 'I grew up eating deer and all those things. ... I grew up with loaded guns on the wall' 'I am a huge proponent of families being able to protect themselves, feed their family, all those things. I am also a huge proponent of background checks.'" Concealed Carry

In April 2019, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 575) To Allow Concealed Carry On College Campuses. Rep. Dean Dohrman, authorizes colleges and universities to designate faculty or staff members as campus protection officers. Amendments added during the perfection process included opt-outs for campus health care and limitations for on-campus living requirements." In March 2022, Quade Voted Against a Bill (HB 1462) To Allow People To Carry Concealed Firearms On Public Transportation. "William Bland, a member of the Western Missouri Shooters Alliance, frequently testifies in support of bills he feels further the right to bear arms. He supported HB 1462, which would have allowed people with a concealed carry weapons permit to bring their firearms onto public transportation. The sponsor of the bill, Rep. Adam Schnelting, R-St. Charles, noted prior bipartisan support for the bill at its January hearing. The bill is substantially similar to legislation proposed in every session since 2015. ... The bill passed the House with a 101-40 vote, but it didn't make it out of the Senate. (Fulton Sun, 5/20/22; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1462, 3/9/22, Overall Vote: 101-40, Quade Voted No)

In April 2023, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 282) To Lower The Age Required To Get A Concealed Carry Permit. "HB 282 — Various Measures to Improve Missourians' Second Amendment Freedoms ... This bill lowers the age at which an individual may be issued a concealed carry permit by one year. It also removes a prohibition that prevented permitholders from carrying a concealed firearm into a place of worship. CPAC supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on April 17, 2023 by a vote of 105-41 but the bill stalled in the Senate." Arming School Teachers

In 2023, Quade Touted Planned Parenthood's Endorsement Of Her Failed Gubernatorial Bid. "Crystal Quade gained a notable endorsement from Planned Parenthood Great Plains Votes in her 2024 bid for Missouri governor. ... 'It's an honor to receive Planned Parenthood Great Plains Votes' endorsement,' Quade said in a release. 'At a time when Missourians have had their rights and liberties taken away, Planned Parenthood Great Plains Votes has been a champion of restoring those rights and ensuring Missourians are able to access quality, affordable reproductive healthcare. Together, we are going to bring desperately needed change to the Show-Me State.'" (Springfield News-Leader, 12/11/23)

"Stop Protecting A Fertilized Egg Over Breathing Children"

In May 2022, Quade Said To Pro-Life Republicans, "Stop Protecting A Fertilized Egg Over Breathing Children." "Missouri lawmakers are sharing their reactions after 15 people, 14 of them children, were shot and killed at an elementary school 85 miles west of San Antonio Monday afternoon. ... Quade, of Springfield, tweeted, 'I'm ready for the Republicans who want to have an actual conversation about kids dying. Stop protecting a fertilized egg over breathing children.'" (KTVI, 5/24/22)

If Quade Was Elected Governor...

In July 2023, Quade Said As Governor She Would Veto Pro-Life Legislation. "If elected governor, she [Quade] said she expects Republicans in the General Assembly to 'continue to try to attack our freedoms in the doctor's office.' Her job would be to veto those proposals, she said." (Kansas City Star, 7/11/23)

In July 2024, The Kansas City Star Reported Quade Made A "Not-Too-Subtle Reference To Vetoing Anti-Abortion Legislation" If She Was Elected Governor. "Quade was asked directly during a TV debate last month what steps she would take as governor to protect abortion access if the amendment passed. She also largely steered clear of specifics in her answer. 'I deeply understand how important this is for folks and I am so excited that we're going to have the opportunity in November to take the rights back that we absolutely need to have in our state,' Quade said. Quade said she will ensure as governor the General Assembly 'will listen to the voices of Missourians and what happens on Election Day will be upheld.' That appeared to be a not-too-subtle reference to



vetoing anti-abortion legislation. If the amendment passes, the Republican-controlled legislature would almost certainly attempt to pass bills designed to test the limits of the new constitutional rights in court." (Kansas City Star, 8/7/24)

Quade-Sponsored Abortion Legislation

In 2022, Quade Sponsored A Failed Bill (HB 11) To Normalize Late-Term Abortions, Deny Parental Consent, And Allow Abortions Based On The Race Or Sex Of A Fetus. "...Quade filed a bill Tuesday that would repeal the state's near-total ban on abortion. The Springfield Democrat's bill is largely symbolic and unlikely to pass during the Republican-dominated General Assembly's special session on tax cuts. It represents a lawmaker's first attempt to nullify the ban since it went into effect in June minutes after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade. ... Rep. Mary Elizabeth Coleman, an Arnold Republican and ardent anti-abortion advocate, on Tuesday criticized Quade in a text message. ... 'Rep. Quade has filed a pro-abortion measure that is so extreme that it would give permission to doctors to abort unborn children because of their race or sex, or because they might have Down syndrome. It would deny both parents the right to know when their daughter is considering abortion. Her radical bill would normalize late-term abortions when the unborn baby can feel pain. This bill is going nowhere and is a political publicity stunt which will backfire.' Samuel Lee, a Jefferson City anti-abortion lobbyist, in a text message to *The Star*, painted Quade's bill as extreme legislation that would allow doctors to perform abortions for various reasons like race or sex. 'It would deny both parents the right to know when their daughter is considering abortion,' the text message said. 'Her radical bill would normalize late-term abortions when the unborn baby can feel pain. This bill is going nowhere and is a political publicity stunt which will backfire." In January 2023, Quade Filed Failed Legislation (HB 544) To Repeal Missouri's Abortion Ban And Allow Abortions Up To 22 Weeks. "A state lawmaker has filed a new bill, calling on Missouri to repeal its abortion ban in connection with a 2019 statute. ... Quade sponsored House Bill 544 to repeal a Missouri bill that took effect in 2019 and outlawed abortion in the state after 6 weeks of fetal development. Quade's bill, if passed, would allow abortions up to 22 weeks. ... 'People will die if we continue to allow this horrific law to stand,' Quade said. 'My bill will save lives and return dignity and freedom to reproductive health care in Missouri.'" (WDAF, 1/3/23)

In December 2023, Quade Announced She Would File Legislation To Give Voters The Chance To Strike Down Missouri's Abortion Ban With No Limits On When Women Could Get Abortions. "Meanwhile, Quade said she soon plans to file legislation seeking to put the most expansive version of the 11 initiative petitions filed by Missourians for Constitutional Freedom on the 2024 ballot. The language would give voters the option of taking down Missouri's abortion ban with no gestational limits, and it would protect patients and medical providers from prosecution. Quade knows passing her proposal through the Republican-dominated legislature is unlikely, but said she wants to keep the discussion alive in the upcoming legislative session. If Missourians for Constitutional Freedom decides to move forward with a more restrictive initiative petition, Quade said she would still support its campaign. As for Corley, Quade said she understands the desire for a more moderate version, but she is confident a more expansive version would pass 'overwhelmingly.' Quade said she would not comment on whether she would support Corley's initiative until after the ballot language was done being litigated. 'If we are going to put something to the vote of the people, I would like it to be just the basics: Let folks have access to care, and we don't need to get into the nitty gritty of how many weeks that is and what that language looks like.' she said." Section 10.1100. To the Department of Mental Health and the Department of Health and Senior Services In reference to all sections in Part 1 and Part 2 of this act:

No funds shall be expended to any abortion facility as defined in Section 188.015, RSMo, or any affiliate or associate thereof."; and

Further amend said bill by adjusting section and bill totals accordingly.

In March 2018, Quade Voted Against An Amendment To A Separate Spending Bill To Ban The Missouri Department Of Social Services From Directing Tax Dollars To Abortion Facilities. (Missouri State House Journal, HA 4 to HB 2011, 3/27/18, Overall Vote: 103-30, Quade Voted No)

"PART 3

Section 11.800. To the Department of Social Services In reference to all sections in Part 1 and Part 2 of this act: No funds shall be expended to any abortion facility as defined in Section 188.015, RSMo, or any affiliate or associate thereof."; and

Further amend said bill by adjusting section and bill totals accordingly.

In June 2021, Quade Called A Failed Attempt To Strip Tax Dollars For Planned Parenthood A "Political Stunt." "House lawmakers on Wednesday also passed a longshot bill that included language stripping Planned Parenthood funding, but by then senators had already left the Capitol after passing the tax renewal last week. Senate GOP leaders on Wednesday ended the special legislative session without taking up the measure, effectively killing it. ... Quade called the House bill a 'political stunt' to help Republican lawmakers win primaries and a waste of time for legislation that she had predicted 'is not going to cross the finish line.' She said debate on the House bill Wednesday was 'simply talking points for folks to cut commercials.'" In March 2022, Quade Rooted For Planned Parenthood In Its Legal Challenge To The Parson Administration's Decision To Defund The Group. "Planned Parenthood sued the Missouri Department of Social Services on Thursday, alleging Gov. Mike Parson is only a day away from unlawfully defunding the organization. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat, said House Democrats are hopeful Planned Parenthood is successful in its legal challenge. 'I'm thankful they have filed a suit today. I'm hopeful that they'll be able to continue to provide those services to Missourians who need it,' Quade said." (Kansas City Star, 3/10/22)

In August 2022, Quade Requested That Democrat Governors In Illinois And Kansas Help Pay For Abortions For Missouri's Medicaid Beneficiaries. "A top Democratic state lawmaker from Republican-led Missouri on Wednesday wrote to the Democratic Illinois and Kansas governors asking for help paying for abortions for out-of-state Medicaid patients. ... Quade called on Illinois and Kansas to apply for Medicaid waivers to cover abortions for out-of-state patients. Her request came after Democratic President Joe Biden signed an executive order Wednesday aimed in part at making it easier for women seeking abortions to travel between states to obtain access to the procedure. The directives will allow states that have not outlawed abortion to apply for Medicaid waivers that would help them treat women who've traveled from out of state. The waivers only apply in cases of rape, incest and medical emergencies. 'Though these exceptions are narrow, we believe that this executive order is still meaningful for Missouri patients who are experiencing a life-threatening healthcare situation or whose pregnancy was forced by the violence of rape or



incest,' Quade wrote in a letter to Kansas Gov. Laura Kelly and Kansas legislative leaders." (The Associated Press, 8/4/22)

In April 2024, Quade Voted Against A Parson-Signed Bill (HB 2634) To Ban Abortion Providers From Receiving Medicaid Reimbursements. "Parson has signed a bill that bans abortion providers and their affiliates from receiving Medicaid reimbursements. This bill is aimed at defunding Planned Parenthood, a major priority for Republicans in this legislative session. Parson officially signed HB 2634 into law on Thursday. While public funds are already prohibited from funding abortions in Missouri, the new law will now prevent any taxpayer money from supporting abortion providers or affiliates in the state." Mobile Abortion Clinic

In October 2022, Quade Praised Planned Parenthood's Plan To Deploy A Mobile Abortion Clinic In Illinois To Provide Access To Missouri Women. "Planned Parenthood will soon open a mobile abortion clinic in southern Illinois to provide greater access to abortion for Missourians after the state outlawed the procedure in nearly all cases in June. The mobile clinic will be able to travel along the border with Missouri and will be part of Planned Parenthood of the St. Louis Region and Southwest Missouri. The clinic will provide medication abortions, and eventually procedural abortions, and is expected to launch by the end of the year, the organization announced Monday. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat, contrasted the abortion rights laws in Illinois with those in Missouri. She said Missouri treats women like second-class citizens. 'Could it be any clearer that women have rights and exist as full citizens in the state of Illinois while here on our side of the river we continue to treat women and all marginalized communities as second class citizens?' Quade said in a statement. 'I'm grateful our neighboring states are taking steps to protect their people.'" (Kansas City Star, 10/3/22)

Providing Care To Children Born Alive After A Failed Abortion

In April 2022, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 2012) To Require That Children Born Alive After A Failed Abortion Be Provided With Proper Care And Granted The Rights Of A Person. "House Bill 2012 would enact a Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act, under which a health care provider would be required to offer the same degree of life-saving care following an attempted abortion that a provider would offer a baby otherwise born at the same gestational age. Other states including Kentucky and Ohio have enacted similar legislation. According to the bill, a person who commits sexual assault or domestic violence would not be permitted to file such lawsuits or be awarded damages, and neither would that person's household or family members. The legislative package passed in a 91-37 vote without discussion on Wednesday, and now heads to the state Senate. (CNN, 4/9/22; Missouri State House Journal, HB 2012, 4/6/22, Overall Vote: 91-37, Quade Voted No)

Fetal Heartbeat Legislation

In February 2019, Quade Spoke And Voted Against A Fetal Heartbeat Bill (HB 126) That Included Parental Notification Provisions And Banned Abortions Based On The Race Or Sex Of The Fetus. "The Missouri House on Tuesday bundled nearly every significant anti-abortion law proposed this session into one bill and gave it tentative approval. The measure, which Speaker Elijah Haahr called 'the strongest pro-life bill in the country,' will almost certainly be given final passage later this week. ... Republicans used the 'heartbeat' bill, which bans abortion as soon as a fetal heartbeat can be



heard, as the vehicle for a series of additional restrictions that each drew vigorous objections from Democrats. Republicans had already been extremely active this session proposing and advancing anti-abortion legislation, and it now appears their hopes will lie in this bill, House Bill 126. ... The House voted several times to stifle discussion on various amendments and pass them without delay, until finally they did so for the original bill and voted for it 110 to 37. The heartbeat bill expanded through the afternoon to accommodate provisions declaring 'that God is the author of life' and further limitations on abortion. They include requiring that both parents be notified before a minor's abortion; banning abortions on the basis of race, sex or whether or not the baby has down syndrome, and establishing a so-called 'trigger clause' that would completely ban abortion, except in the case of a medical emergency, if Missouri if *Roe v Wade* is overturned by the Supreme Court. Rep. Crystal Quade, D-Springfield and Rep. Keri Ingle, D-Lee's Summit, each told personal stories about how abortion restrictions can place domestic violence victims at further risk. Quade said she was sexually abused by her father as a child and that she would have been in danger if she'd been pregnant and had to reach back out to him." (Kansas City Star, 2/26/19)

In May 2019, Quade Criticized And Voted Against The Parson-Signed Version Of The Bill. "The Missouri House gave final approval to one of the most restrictive abortion laws in the country Friday morning. On a 110-44 vote, the Republican-dominated chamber moved to ban the procedure at 8 weeks into a pregnancy, when supporters say a heartbeat is regularly detectable and before opponents say many women even know they're pregnant. The only exception to the new rule would be if a mother is in danger of dying or suffering irreversible impairment of bodily function. Doctors who give abortions anyway could lose their medical licenses and go to prison for up to 15 years; there is no legal penalty prescribed for patients. ... Quade, D-Springfield, castigated the majority for the bill's lack of exceptions for rape and incest, ignoring her and other young people who are and have been sexually abused. 'When you see me in this hallway, remember what you're doing to good girls who were like me, because that abuse is me and you simply don't care,' she said." (Springfield News-Leader, 5/18/19)

Quade Said The Parson-Signed Bill Treated Women "As Little More Than Fetal Incubators."
 "...Parson on Friday signed a bill that bans abortions on or beyond the eighth week of pregnancy without exceptions for cases of rape or incest, making it among the most restrictive abortion policies in the nation. ... Quade said in a written statement the new law treats women 'as little more than fetal incubators with no rights or role in the decision, even in cases of rape and incest.'" 20-Week Abortion Ban

In April 2018, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1266) To Ban Abortions At 20 Weeks When A Fetus Can Feel Pain. "On Tuesday, April 3rd, the Missouri House passed HB 1266, the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act by a vote of 117 to 31. This important bill will provide protection from abortion for unborn children who are capable of feeling pain, beginning at 20 weeks fetal age. (Missouri Right To Life, Press Release, 4/4/18; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1266, 4/3/18, Overall Vote: 117-31, Quade Voted No)

Strengthening Parental Consent

In February 2018, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 1383) To Strengthen Missouri's Parental Consent Laws. "HB 1383 — Strengthening Informed Consent for Parents of a Minor Seeking Abortion ... This bill expands the state's parental consent law to require that before minors may seek an abortion, they must obtain the written consent of at least one parent. Under the bill, parents or guardians are also required to be informed in writing before consent is valid. These requirements are void in cases



of a medical emergency. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and educating patients and supported this bill. The House passed the bill February 26, 2018 by a vote of 113-37." (ACU, Flagged Votes-Missouri, Accessed 1/6/25; Missouri State House Journal, HB 1383, 2/26/18, Overall Vote: 113-37, Quade Voted No)

Regulating Crisis Pregnancy Centers

In March 2017, Quade Voted Against A Bill (HB 174) To Shield Crisis Pregnancy Centers And Other Abortion Alternatives From A St. Louis Discrimination Ordinance. "House Bill 174 – would shield crisis pregnancy centers and other abortion alternative businesses from a recently-passed city ordinance in St. Louis. Board Bill 203 adds pregnancy and reproductive health decisions to the city's anti-discrimination definition." (St. Louis Public Radio, 3/10/17; Missouri State House Journal, HB 174, 3/30/17, Overall Vote: 118-36, Quade Voted No)

In March 2019, Quade Voted For An Amendment To Impose Regulations On Crisis Pregnancy Centers That Provide Abortion Alternatives. "HB 10 — Weakening the Ability of Crisis Pregnancy Centers to Protect Life by Imposing Unnecessary Mandates ... The Unsicker amendment to the health appropriations bill would weaken the ability of crisis pregnancy centers to protect life and provide mothers an alternative to abortion by imposing unnecessary mandates. Specifically, the amendment would eliminate funding for any crisis pregnancy center that does not also provide services for smoking cessation. ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports efforts to end the practice, opposes excessive mandates designed to eliminate the ability of crisis pregnancy centers to provide alternatives to abortion and opposed this amendment. The House rejected the amendment on March 26, 2019 by a vote of 42-93. Regulating Abortion Clinics

In 2017, Quade Voted Against A Greitens-Signed Bill (SB 5) To Impose New Regulations On Abortion Clinics. "Planned Parenthood affiliates in Missouri have launched another lawsuit over new abortion restrictions slated they say will cause 'extreme delays' upon taking effect in a few weeks. The suit challenges a slew of rules passed by the Republican-dominated Missouri legislature this summer in a special session called by Gov. Eric Greitens. The manner of passing Senate Bill 5, as the new abortion law is known, also is being questioned. ... The new requirements include: Mandating that medication abortion providers shall compile and submit plans for handling complications that may arise from terminating pregnancies; Requiring women seeking abortions to specifically discuss medical risks with the physician who will perform the termination; Specifying that the Department of Health & Senior Services shall report to lawmakers annually about tissue samples extracted during abortion procedures; Allowing Attorney General Josh Hawley's office to investigate any violations of Missouri abortion law; Blocking local ordinances believed to affect pregnancy care centers, like the one in St. Louis that Greitens campaigned against after calling the session; Requiring the health department to conduct annual, unannounced inspections of abortion facilities; Creating a misdemeanor for abortion providers who interfere with medical personnel Instructing abortion providers to enact whistleblower-protection policies. ... The only Springfield lawmaker to oppose the new regulations was Rep. Crystal Quade." Roe v. Wade

In May 2022, Quade Responded To News Of SCOTUS' Decision To Overturn *Roe v. Wade* By Claiming, "We Knew This Was The Plan All Along." "News that the U.S. Supreme Court may be poised to overturn the landmark 1973 decision *Roe v. Wade*, which established a woman's constitutional right to an abortion, sent waves across Missouri. ... Quade: 'We knew this was the plan all along. In MO We knew this was the plan all along. In Missouri, when *Roe* is overturned, there will be a complete ban on abortion access. Missouri allows the (governor) or AG to ban it completely. As written, bans access past 8 (weeks). Even in cases of RAPE and INCEST. The fight is and has always been at home.'" (*Springfield News-Leader*, 5/4/22)

In June 2022, Quade Charged Republicans Would Follow The SCOTUS Ruling By Trying To Strip Access To Birth Control, In Vitro Fertilization And Same-Sex Marriage. "Legal abortion came to an end in Missouri on Friday with the activation of the state's 'trigger law,' banning the procedure minutes after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned its federal constitutionality. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat, said in a statement that 'Republicans will not stop with abortion. They will begin stripping away access to birth control and contraception, in vitro fertilization and marriage equality.' 'With *Roe* overturned, Missouri now requires people to remain pregnant against their will, treating them as little more than fetal incubators with no rights or role in the decision, even in cases of rape and incest,' Quade said." Amendment 3

In 2024, Quade Endorsed Amendment 3, Which Was Narrowly Approved By Missouri Voters. "...Quade supports the measure. LGBTQ+

Reportedly "Was Able To Identify As Part Of The [LGBTQ+] Community" In College

In February 2024, The *Springfield News-Leader* Reported "LGBTQ+ Issues Weren't A Big Part Of Her [Quade] Life Until College, When She Was Able To Identify As Part Of The Community." "Quade ... said that LGBTQ+ issues weren't a big part of her life until college, when she was able to identify as part of the community. As she got involved with politics, she started to understand what



was happening in her home state. She realized that Missourians could still be fired for being gay, or even denied housing. Now, she thinks about what it means to be an LGBTQ+ ally: offering a safe, compassionate and loving space to individuals who need it." (Springfield News-Leader, 2/2/24)

"Proud" To Be Endorsed By A Prominent LGBTQ+ Group

In February 2024, Quade Said It Was An "Honor" To Be Endorsed By PROMO. "Crystal Quade has earned another influential endorsement in her 2024 bid for Missouri governor. The political action committee of Missouri's state LGBTQ+ advocacy organization, PROMO, announced its endorsement of the Springfield legislator during a Thursday fundraising event at Q Enoteca. PROMO PAC endorses candidates who demonstrate a track record of supporting equal rights and legal protections for LGBTQ+ Missourians. ... 'It's an honor to be endorsed by PROMO PAC. The work they do will make Missouri a better, more inclusive, place for LGBTQ+ Missourians is inspiring,' Quade said in a statement ahead of the fundraiser. 'In the face of a never-ending onslaught of legislation attacking the rights of LGBTQ+ Missourians, I'm proud to stand alongside them.' ... Quade said since her first run for state Representative in 2016, each year has become more divisive, more harmful and more ridiculous. She said PROMO's presence and support at the Capitol is the only reason she can continue to do the work. Banning Gender-Affirming Care For Minors And Transgender Girls In Female Sports

In May 2023, Quade Voted Against Parson-Signed Bills (SB 39, SB 49) To Ban Gender-Affirming Care For Minors And Block Transgender Girls From Competing In Female Sports. "...Parson on Wednesday signed two of the more controversial pieces of legislation from the just-concluded session into law, bills that ban gender-affirming health care for minors and prevents transgender girls and women from playing on female sports teams. The Missouri House and Senate passed dueling bills on transgender health care for minors, but as the session grew closer to an end, neither chamber seemed willing to take up the product of the other. ... Ultimately the Senate versions of both bills for transgender health care (SB 49) and transgender athletes (SB 39) passed through the House." - Quade Accused Parson Of Embracing Bigotry And Hate When He Signed The Bill To Ban Gender-Affirming Care For Minors. "One of the laws bars transgender youth under the age of 18 from accessing certain gender-affirming care like puberty blockers, hormone therapy and gender transition surgery. Gender-affirming care includes medical and mental health care treatments as well as social support. ... Opponents, who included transgender minors, say that decision should be left to trans youth, their guardians and their doctors. 'The governor had a chance to protect innocent families who are just trying to live their lives in peace. Instead he chose to persecute them. The governor could have said 'no' to bigotry and hate. Instead he embraced it,' said House Minority Leader Crystal Quade, D-Springfield. 'History tends to reflect poorly on oppression and the oppressors, and the stain of this action will not wash away.'" But she told the crowd that their joy and fun at Pride makes those opposed to their rights very angry. 'This year was tough. It was the hardest year in my 7 years that I've been there. But you guys kept showing up. You kept giving hugs. You kept making phone calls and you kept giving us the strength to continue. And I want to say to you I have to continue for you and to never stop showing up for the LGBTQI community. And we are not going to stop until everyone feels welcome in the state of Missouri. In February 2020, Quade Blasted A Proposed Constitutional Amendment (SJR 50) To Ban Transgender Girls From Competing In Female Sports. "...O'Laughlin, R-Shelbina, said she proposed the measure because of what she described as men beating women in sports. ... There already are restrictions on transgender athletes in Missouri high school sports, but O'Laughlin's legislation would outlaw entirely their participation on the team of their preferred gender. In April 2021, Quade Criticized And Voted Against An Amendment To Ban Transgender Girls From Competing In Female Sports. "The House dove into the contentious debate over the rights of transgender athletes Wednesday in the process of moving forward an amendment to limit their inclusion in sports. The amendment, which Rep. Chuck Basye, R-Rocheport, added onto an unrelated education bill, HB 1141, would prevent any student assigned male at birth from participating in women's sports. Those assigned female at birth who are transitioning could only participate in co-ed sports or those only offered for male students, such as football. ... Quade, D-Springfield, took a different angle, speaking to the motivation of the amendment. 'This bill is not necessarily about the policy,' Quade said. 'It's about primaries.' Preliminary approval on a 106-45 vote followed Senate passage in March of compromise legislation on transgender health care. ... That measure still must receive another affirmative vote before advancing to the Senate for consideration - and there is no guarantee the Senate would consider it. The Senate compromise allows current patients to continue with treatment, and contains a four-year expiration date on prohibitions of puberty blockers and hormone therapy, which would apply to future patients. HB 376 -- BIRTH CERTIFICATES

SPONSOR: Quade

This bill modifies provisions relating to issuing a certificate of birth by allowing any parent to be designated as the parent on the birth certificate without a gender designation. A parent who makes such choice shall be identified by the term "parent" on the birth certificate and shall not be identified by the use of the term "mother" or "father".

Missouri Non-Discrimination Act (MONA)

In November 2016, Quade Said She Voted Against Repealing A MONA-Like Ordinance In Springfield. "Candidates were asked to state how they voted in 2015 when Springfield residents repealed a city ordinance banning discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity and what they believe Missouri law should be regarding whether transgender people should be able to use the restroom of their choice. Only two candidates said how they cast their ballots, with Democrats Alberhasky and Quade both saying they voted against the repeal." (Springfield News-Leader, 11/4/16)






In September 2021, Quade Called For The Enactment Of MONA In Response To A Controversy In Neosho Related To A Pride Flag In A Classroom. She Repeatedly Co-Sponsored Failed MONA Bills During Her Time In The State House. "A Neosho teacher resigned last week after parents complained about a Pride flag in his classroom and the district told him to take it down. John M. Wallis, a graduate of Neosho High School and Webster University in St. Louis, was recently hired to teach speech, theatre and world mythology at Neosho Junior High School. ... Quade, a Democrat from Springfield, was one of many who responded to Wallis on Twitter. She reiterated her support for the Missouri Nondiscrimination Act, or MONA, proposed legislation repeatedly filed in the Missouri General Assembly. Quade tweeted to Wallis: 'Thank you for your dedication to our kids. I am ashamed this happened and continues to happen in our state. In September 2021, Quade Took Gov. Parson To Task For His Decision To Remove A Controversial LGBTQ+ Exhibit From The Missouri Capitol. "If an LGBTQ history exhibit was removed from the Missouri Capitol because it didn't get pre-approval from a specific board, then every exhibit on display that didn't get approved must also be removed, House Minority Leader Crystal Quade argued in a letter to state officials on Wednesday. That would mean, she said, that there would be no exhibits on display. In the letter addressed to Dru Buntin, director of the Department of Natural Resources, Quade says Gov. Mike Parson's explanation for why the display was removed was a lie. Parson said the exhibit was taken down after he received complaints and because it wasn't approved for display by the board of public buildings. However, the board's meeting minutes going back five years show it has never discussed museum exhibits, and the former museum director said in 24 years he never had to seek approval from the board regarding exhibits. Quade, a Springfield Democrat, wrote that Buntin and Parson fabricated a reason for why the exhibit was removed to avoid being accused of 'homophobia and content-based discrimination.' 'If you stick to your story that the LBGTQ exhibit had to come down because the board of public buildings didn't approve it,' Quade wrote, 'then to be consistent you must immediately remove all exhibits the board hasn't approved. Since this is a function the board has never performed, that means stripping the Missouri State Museum bare.' Failure to do so, Quade wrote, would be a 'tacit admission that you and the governor have caved to homophobia and engaged in content-based discrimination — the very thing your lie was intended to avoid.' Quade urged Buntin and Parson instead to simply return the LGBTQ exhibit to the Capitol." (Missouri Independent, 9/8/21)

The Richey amendment #1 to a multi-agency appropriations bill. This amendment cuts roughly \$17 million in spending for the 'Stronger Connections Grant Program' and the 'Project Extended Impact Program,' with the latter an initiative created due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the amendment prohibits funds within the appropriation bill from being used for purposes of 'Diversity, Equity or Inclusion.' Support is the Limited Government Position as these spending programs cut are unnecessary initiatives which primarily enrich government-favored non-profits. Additionally, this measure helps protect taxpayer funds from being utilized to promote politicized DEI efforts which sow division amongst Americans and are intended to further grow the role of government. HB 524 -- DEATH WITH DIGNITY ACT

This bill establishes the Missouri Death With Dignity Act that allows a qualified person to request and obtain a prescription for medication to end his or her life.

Legalizing Marijuana

In August 2022, Quade Said She Supported Legalizing Marijuana, But Expressed Concerns About Amendment 3, Which She Viewed As "A Starting Point." "...Quade is hoping to help her party put a dent in the GOP supermajority that's dominated the state legislature for more than a decade. And when she heard the news earlier this month that a proposed constitutional amendment legalizing marijuana would appear on the November ballot, she thought her job might have just gotten a little easier. 'I definitely think that it will bring out more voters,' Quade said of the marijuana proposal, which will appear on the ballot as Amendment 3. 'It will bring out younger voters, and traditionally, younger voters tend to vote Democratic. So that is looking like good news for us.' But asked what she thinks of the policy laid out in Amendment 3, Quade's enthusiasm dims. 'I'm in support of legalization,' she said. 'I wish the initiative was better, but it is what we're given to work with right now.' Quade has concerns about the expungement provisions laid out in the amendment, as well as the fact that it will continue to allow the state to cap business licenses to grow and sell marijuana - a system she believes led to potential corruption in the medical marijuana program. But even with those caveats, she's a yes on Amendment 3. 'It's a starting point,' Quade said. 'We definitely will have to make improvements if this passes.'" (Missouri Independent, 8/25/22)

In November 2022, Quade Was Listed Among The Supporters Of Amendment 3, Which Was Approved By Missouri Voters. Parent's Bill Of Rights

In April 2022, Quade Voted Against A "Parent's Bill Of Rights" Bill (HB 1858) That Included Provisions To Increase School Transparency And Give Parents Access To Teaching Materials. "A 'Parent's Bill of Rights' education measure is awaiting action in the upper chamber after narrowly passing the House last week. HB 1858 passed the House 85-59 with some Republicans voting against the bill. ... The controversial bill is a wide-encompassing piece of legislation that would, among other things, require schools receiving funding from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education to be more transparent. Other provisions include a requirement for schools to give parents access to teaching materials, give access to information regarding guest lectures and speakers, and allow parents to visit their child during school hours on the school's campus. Parents



would be able to receive the relevant information from an online portal managed by DESE, as the bill is currently written. Still other provisions would require schools to receive a parent's written permission before the child can participate in any extracurricular activities or assemblies and regulate how school board meetings are conducted. Schools found to have violated any of the rules could potentially lose funding from DESE until the issue is remedied. Parents and the Missouri attorney general would also be able to sue schools believed to be in violation of any of the regulations. Republican Rep. Ben Baker, who is championing the bill, said it's about 'transparency in schools and empowering parents.' Baker told The Missouri Times the bill would be a tool to combat the teaching of so-called critical race theory in public schools." Public Library Rule

In May 2023, Quade Criticized SOS Jay Ashcroft's Rule To Ban Public Libraries From Providing Minors Books Deemed Pornographic Or Obscene. "...Ashcroft's new rule governing libraries went into effect Tuesday, threatening to pull public libraries' state funding over providing minors with books considered pornographic or obscene. ... Ashcroft, a Republican who is running for governor in 2024, last fall proposed the rule, which prohibits public library employees from giving minors access to materials without first receiving parental permission. ... Quade, a Springfield Democrat who is weighing a run for governor in 2024, told *The Star* on Tuesday that Ashcroft's rule was pandering to a small group of people. She said it has led to 'headaches about books being banned' and 'has made Missouri a punching bag for news outlets across the world.' 'Our libraries should be a beacon of education full of resources for the entire community to learn and improve their lives, not political casualties at the hands of far-right extremists,' she said." Legalizing Sports Betting

In March 2022, Quade Voted For A Bill (HB 2502) To Legalize Sports Betting In Missouri. "While its ultimate fate remains unclear, the Missouri House of Representatives voted Thursday to advance a measure to legalize sports betting in the state. The Missouri House of Representatives passed HB 2502, known as the sports wagering bill, Thursday, by a 115-33 vote." In March 2023, Quade Voted For A Bill (HB 556) To Legalize Sports Betting In Missouri. "House Bill 556, which would allow for retail and online sports wagering in Missouri, is being co-sponsored by Republicans Dave Hinman and Adam Schwadron, as well as Democrats Keri Ingle and Ashley Bland Manlove." (IGB, 3/21/23; Missouri State House Journal, HB 556, 3/22/23, Overall Vote: 118-35, Quade Voted Yes)

In October 2024, Quade Endorsed A Voter-Approved Ballot Measure (Amendment 2) To Legalize Sports Betting In Missouri. "Republican Mike Kehoe, Democrat Crystal Quade and Libertarian Bill Slantz voiced support of Amendment 2 during a gubernatorial debate hosted by the Missouri Press Association. Amendment 2, approved by Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft, is a ballot referendum that allows voters to decide in November whether to approve sports betting." (SBC Americas, 10/29/24)
