RIDING ON HIS FATHER'S COATTAILS

Out Of Touch Political Heir

- Ashcroft benefited from a privileged upbringing as a result of his father's public positions and influence.
 - Ashcroft grew up in the Missouri Governor's Mansion, living there from the age of 11 to 19. (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 7/14/14)
 - In 1995, Ashcroft spent the summer living with his father in D.C. in a room above the garage of Sen.
 Mitch McConnell. (*The Springfield News-Leader*, 7/9/95)
- In the 1990's, Ashcroft attended the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy before dropping out in his third year.
 When asked if he repaid the taxes on his tuition after failing to serve in the military as required by law Ashcroft claimed he left the academy with no outstanding obligations and received no special treatment. To date, Ashcroft has refused to provide records that would clarify what exactly happened when he dropped out of the academy. - From 2000 to 2012, Ashcroft failed to vote in six major elections, including multiple presidential primaries, his father's 2000 U.S. Senate primary, a contentious 2008 Republican gubernatorial primary, and the 2004 ballot measure to preserve traditional marriage in Missouri. Working For His Father's Politically Connected Law Firm

- From 2009 to 2017, Ashcroft worked for his father's politically connected law firm, where he helped corporate clients facing government issues and SEC investigations. He did such work without registering as a lobbyist. - While at his father's law firm, Ashcroft also represented a venture capitalist charged with embezzling \$9.1 million from his clients, and a man accused of taking his mother's money and home after she was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. - The Ashcroft Law Firm's growing list of controversial clients has included the Russian "Merchant of Death" who
 was recently sent back to Russia in exchange for imprisoned WNBA star Brittney Griner; a Ukrainian oligarch
 accused of murder and financial crimes; the regime in Qatar that has long hosted exiled members of Hamas'
 leadership; the repressive Republic of Congo; and a corrupt former Indonesian prime minister. (Reuters, 12/5/14;

Running For Office On His Father's Name

 During Ashcroft's failed 2014 State Senate bid, he ran with establishment support, appeared on the ballot as "John R. Ashcroft," and he invoked his father's past work with Democrats. (St. Louis Public Radio, 7/24/14; St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 7/14/14)

Father's Gubernatorial Legacy Of Tax & Spending Hikes

- During his time as the governor of Missouri, Jay's father, John Ashcroft, repeatedly worked with the Democrat-controlled legislature to push tax and spending hikes.
 - During John Ashcroft's two terms as governor, he supported \$947.5 million in tax hikes, many of which were also backed by the Democrat-controlled legislature. (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 8/27/00)
 - During John Ashcroft's two terms as governor, Missouri's state budget increased from \$5.7 billion to \$10.2 billion, an increase of 79 percent. (The Kansas City Star, 11/3/94)

RUNNING AS A MODERATE IN 2014

- During Ashcroft's failed 2014 State Senate campaign in a moderate St. Louis County district, he said that he would compromise with Democrats, did not rule out a gas tax hike, and he was noncommittal on if he would support ObamaCare's Medicaid expansion in Missouri. POTENTIAL TRUMP VULNERABILITIES

Not An Early Supporter Of Trump's 2016 Presidential Campaign

In December 2015, Ashcroft declined to tell an interviewer if he had a "short list" of presidential favorites, and, in March 2016, he said that none of the Republican or Democrat presidential candidates "looked very presidential" during their debates. Having It Both Ways On The 2020 Election

- Despite calling the 2020 election a success in Missouri, Ashcroft questioned its legitimacy in other states. More recently, he met with election conspiracist Mike Lindell. (Democrat News, 11/11/20; The Griffon News, 11/14/20; <u>The Kansas City Star</u>, 1/5/23)
- In September 2020, Ashcroft encouraged Missouri voters to ignore then-President Donald Trump's claim that mail-in ballots would lead to fraud, but after the election he expressed a deep mistrust in such ballots. (The Griffon News, 11/14/20; St. Louis Public Radio, 9/24/20)
- In 2021, Ashcroft refused to say the election was stolen from Trump, and he later said "the right person [Biden] probably won the election." (The Kansas City Star, 1/11/21; "This Week In Missouri Politics – October 17, 2021," This Week In Missouri Politics, 10/17/21) Minute: 09:30 – 10:01

Dodging A Question About Trump's Georgia Indictment

 In August 2023, Ashcroft dodged a question about how he would have handled Trump's indictment for interfering in Georgia's 2020 election. (<u>The Kansas City Star</u>, 8/15/23)

SILENT DURING THE ERIC GREITENS SCANDAL

In 2018, Ashcroft refused to comment on the Greitens sex scandal that led to his resignation as governor. (The Kansas City Star, 5/30/18; The Kansas City Star, 2/23/18; Springfield News-Leader, 5/7/18)

POTENTIAL ISSUE VULNERABILITIES

State Spending

- While Ashcroft has campaigned as an outspoken critic of the recent growth of Missouri's state budget, a review of his own office budgets found that general revenue appropriations nearly doubled, while actual general revenue expenditures grew by a more modest 15 percent. (Missouri Office of Administration, Executive Budgets-FY2017 To FY 2023, Accessed 10/22/23)
 - NOTE: The client should consult with a pro-Kehoe state budget expert before using the budget data referenced above. In past campaigns, state budget debates have largely hinged on general revenue data.

Foreign Ownership Of Missouri Land

 In 2023, Ashcroft supported failed legislation to restrict, but not ban, the foreign ownership of land in Missouri. The Ashcroft-backed bill also faced questions about the removal of language to ban the foreign ownership of land near U.S. military bases. Crime

 In 2023, Ashcroft testified in support of a failed omnibus crime bill that featured several Republican-backed provisions, but also included language to provide taxpayer-funded health care to ex-prisoners. (*Jefferson City News* Tribune, 1/27/23)

Abortion

- In 2023, Ashcroft implied he would resign as governor, rather than push back, if abortion rights were passed in Missouri. (<u>CBS-4 KMOV</u>, 11/1/23)
- In 2023, Ashcroft opposed adding exceptions for rape and incest to Missouri's abortion ban. (<u>The Kansas City Star</u>, 7/27/23)

Transgender Rule

 In 2023, Ashcroft opposed Attorney General Andrew Bailey's rule to restrict hormone therapy and gender surgeries for adults. (<u>St. Louis Post-Dispatch</u>, 4/20/23)

The Influence Of Lobbyists

 While Ashcroft has railed against the influence of lobbyists in Jefferson City, his top fundraiser is a lobbyist (Steve Tilley), and his campaign committee and a supportive PAC have received over \$150,000 in donations from lobbyists and special interest groups. Indebted To Trial Lawyers

• To date, the pro-Ashcroft Committee for Liberty has received \$1 million or 65% of its donations from deeppocketed trial lawyers. (MEC, Ashcroft For Missouri & Committee For Liberty-Analysis, Updated 11/1/23)

FLAGGED TRAVEL

 During Ashcroft's time as Secretary of State, the Bill Gates-funded, pro-CRT Hunt Institute paid nearly \$5,000 for his lodging and travel; the left-leaning news website Axios paid \$1,211.57 for one of his trips, and the pro-ESG and -amnesty Bipartisan Policy Center paid \$882.74 for another trip. SECRETARY OF STATE ISSUES

Photo ID Failures

- In 2015, Ashcroft launched a high-profile amendment petition to implement photo ID requirements in Missouri, but he failed to submit any signatures. (The Missouri Times, 5/13/16)
- As Missouri's Secretary of State, Ashcroft repeatedly lost legal battles to uphold the state's photo ID law and was forced to campaign for reelection in 2020 on reviving the law. (Columbia Daily Tribune, 2/22/20)

"Zuckerbucks"

 In 2020, Ashcroft's office accepted a \$1.4 million grant from the Mark Zuckerberg-funded Center for Election Innovation & Research, which Trump supporters accused of being part of Zuckerberg's \$500 million effort to elect Joe Biden president. ERIC Program

In 2023, Ashcroft pulled Missouri out of the multi-state ERIC program, which ensures the accuracy of voter rolls, just five years after he touted the state's entry into it. He made the move shortly after Trump supporters attacked the program. (Bipartisan Policy Center, <u>Blog Post</u>, 2/1/18; <u>Missouri Independent</u>, 3/7/23)

Marijuana Ballot Initiative Petition

- In 2022, Ashcroft certified a ballot initiative petition to place a referendum on the 2022 ballot allowing voters to legalize recreational marijuana in Missouri. (Springfield News-Leader, 12/6/21; Kansas City Business Journal, 8/9/22)
- Ashcroft's office, in coordination with the campaign behind the ballot initiative, approved the petition via a secretive process, whereby it overruled the decisions of local election officials that had disqualified thousands of signatures. (Missouri Independent, 8/22/22)
 - Steve Tilley, a top Ashcroft fundraiser, has been a registered lobbyist for the group behind the petition since January 2022. (MEC, Lobbyist Database, Accessed 11/1/23)
- Opponents of legalizing drugs launched a failed legal challenge, claiming the petition was improperly certified by Ashcroft. (<u>Missouri Independent</u>, 8/22/22)
- Marijuana legalization in states such as California has led to increases in illegal marijuana production, increased criminal activity, and threats to police and civilians. (<u>The Los Angeles Times</u>, 9/8/22)

Ballot Language Challenges To Abortion-Related Initiative Petitions

- In 2023, Missouri judges rewrote Ashcroft's ballot language for six pro-abortion initiative petitions, stating they were biased, "misleading," and "replete with politically partisan language." (<u>The Joplin Globe</u>, 9/25/23; <u>Missouri</u> <u>Independent</u>, 10/31/23)
- In 2023, a group behind an initiative petition to add exceptions for rape and incest to Missouri's abortion ban filed a pending lawsuit against Ashcroft for writing unfair and inaccurate ballot language. (Missouri Independent, 10/27/23)

Potentially Expensive Anti-ESG Rule

 In 2023, Ashcroft clashed with business and trade groups over his issuance of an anti-ESG rule, which critics fear will increase fees on Missouri investors and financial firms. (The Kansas City Beacon, 8/3/23)

Taxpayer-Funded Work For A Campaign Donor

 In 2023, Ashcroft used tax dollars to hire a campaign donor to represent him in a legal challenge to his anti-ESG rule. (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 9/9/23)

\$9.7 Million Mistake

 In 2023, a state audit found that Ashcroft's office lacked "adequate controls and procedures over financial reporting" that could have resulted in an overstatement of at least \$9.7 million in financial statements. (Missouri State Auditor, Audit Report 2023-56, Filed 9/15/23)

Politicizing Local Elections

• In 2021, Ashcroft said he was considering a measure to turn local elections into partisan battles. (St. Louis Public Radio, 9/17/21)

State Referendums

• Ashcroft has supported making it harder for Missourians to place constitutional amendments on the statewide ballot. (St. Louis Public Radio, 3/27/19)

TOUTING A SHORT-LIVED ENGINEERING CAREER

 While Ashcroft has been touting the decade he spent "devoted to engineering," he flunked out of the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy's engineering program, and he later spent just 4 years working as an actual engineer and 6 years teaching about engineering at a community college. While it is unclear if Ashcroft was required to be licensed by the state for his work as an engineer, his name does not appear in the state's licensing database for professional engineers. In July 2016, Ashcroft's GOP Primary Opponent, State Sen. Will Kraus, Noted That He Dropped Out Of The Merchant Marine Academy After Just Three Years. "State Sen. Will Kraus of Lee's Summit ran a video ad wondering why Jay Ashcroft, his opponent in the primary for secretary of state, dropped out of the Merchant Marine Academy after just three years. YOUR SERVICE OBLIGATION

Upon entrance in USMMA or the SIP Program, you signed an agreement (the "Service Obligation Contract"), which is mandated by law. In the exchange for your education at USMMA or SIP funding, you committed to fulfill a maritime service obligation following graduation- an obligation that is restated in MARAD's regulations and in the Service Obligation Contract you signed.

What follows is a summary of the applicable laws and regulations governing your service obligation.

Having successfully completed the course of instructions at your Academy and received your U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) Merchant Mariner Credential (MMC) with an officer endorsement, your remaining service obligation covers the following four elements:

- 1. Service/employment in the maritime industry or U.S. Armed/Uniformed Services;
- 2. Maintaining your USCG credential;
- 3. Maintaining your Reserve commission; and
- 4. Annual compliance reporting.

Your obligation requires completion of every element listed above. The only exception to this is individuals who, for the five (5)- year period following graduation, serve as a commissioned officer on active duty in a branch of the U.S. Armed Forces or as a commissioned officer of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) or the U.S. Public Health Service (USPHS). Those graduates who provide five (5) years of honorable active duty service shall be excused from the licensure and reserve requirements of their obligation. Details are included below.

Failure to comply with your service obligation may lead to induction into the U.S. Armed Forces or repayment of (a) the cost of the education you received while enrolled at USMMS or (b) the amount of SIP funding you received from MARAD.

The Kraus ad also questioned Ashcroft's departure from the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy in the 1990s without serving in the military and asked if he had been dismissed or gotten special treatment because of his father. The Ashcroft campaign called the ad misleading and said he had left the academy without any outstanding obligation and wasn't given special treatment." (*St. Louis Post-Dispatch*, 7/11/16)

In 2023, Ashcroft Accused House Speaker Dean Plocher Of "Falsely Lashing" When He Renewed Questions About Ashcroft's Time At The Merchant Marine Academy. "...Ashcroft, the GOP front-runner for Missouri governor next year, posted on social media that the Legislature should investigate the matter and, if the allegations of wrongdoing are confirmed, 'take action to protect the integrity of the House of Representatives and the people's money.' Plocher responded by recycling an attack against Ashcroft from the 2016 GOP primary, asking Ashcroft on social media whether he will 'pay back taxpayers the tens of thousands of dollars you owe them after dropping out of the Merchant Marine Academy.' 'Last I checked all dropouts have to pay back the people's money,' he wrote, adding: 'Jay, don't throw rocks when you live in a glass house.' Ashcroft attended the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy but did not graduate. A spokesman for Ashcroft's gubernatorial campaign said in an email to the Independent that it is 'unfortunate that the speaker, caught with his hand in the cookie jar, is falsely lashing out at those who believe we have an obligation to protect, not abuse, taxpayer money.'' During Ashcroft's Time As Governor, Conservatives Complained That He Was Too Accommodating To The Democrat-Controlled Legislature. "Conservative Republicans used to grouse that during his years as governor from 1985 to 1993, John Ashcroft was too accommodating to the Democrats who controlled Missouri's Legislature. <u>As Governor, Ashcroft Supported \$947.5 Million In Tax Hikes, Many Of Which Were Also Backed By The</u> <u>Democrat-Controlled Legislature</u>

In 2000, The St. Louis Post-Dispatch Reported Ashcroft Supported \$947.5 Million In Tax Hikes During His Time As Governor. "Taxes went up \$562.5 million during his eight years as governor, because of two gas tax increases that Ashcroft backed. Voters approved one of them in 1987; the Legislature approved the other in 1992. In 1991, voters rejected an effort, which Ashcroft backed, to raise taxes \$385 million more for education programs." • During Ashcroft's Failed 2000 U.S. Senate Re-Election Campaign, Democrats Took Him To Task For Supporting Tax Hikes During His Time As Governor. "Carnahan, Ashcroft's lieutenant governor from 1989-93 and now his challenger, has put together a list of Ashcroft's tax increases, proposed and enacted. The total comes to \$ 895 million." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 1/3/99)

Ashcroft's Biggest Tax Hikes Included A Voter-Approved 4-Cent Gas Tax Hike In 1987, A Voter-Rejected Multi-Tax Hike Plan For Education In 1991, And A 6-Cent Gas Tax Hike In 1992. "Ashcroft took his two biggest tax initiatives to the voters: a gasoline tax increase to fund road and bridge repair, approved in 1987, and an assortment of taxes tied to education improvements that voters rejected in 1991. But there was no public



vote on the biggest single tax increase of his governorship, the road construction bond issue in 1992 that increased the gasoline tax by 6 cents a gallon." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 10/20/99)

- Ashcroft's 1987 Gas Tax Hike Increased The State's Rate From 7 To 11 Cents Per Gallon. "The biggest single event during Ashcroft's four-year term was passage last April of a 4-cent increase in the state's gasoline tax, raising the tax rate from 7 cents to 11 cents a gallon. The increase, which was approved by voters, was designed to raise money for maintenance and construction of bridges and highways." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 3/23/88)
- In 1991, Missouri Voters Overwhelmingly Rejected Ashcroft's \$385 Million Plan To Increase Sales, Income And Tobacco Taxes To Boost Education. "Missouri voters swept aside a plea for help from educators Tuesday, overwhelmingly killing the \$385 million Proposition B tax and education plan and handing a severe political setback to Gov. John Ashcroft. ... Proposition B would have produced \$190 million for public schools, \$190 million for colleges and universities and \$5 million for economic development. It would have increased sales, income and tobacco taxes and required a variety of education reforms. Some critics considered the reforms weak; others termed the sales tax jump unfair for lower-income people." (The Kansas City Star, 11/6/91)
- Ashcroft's 1992 Gas Tax Hike Increased The State's Rate From 11 To 17 Cents Per Gallon. "Missourians will start paying two cents more for a gallon of gasoline on April 1 under a motor fuel tax increase signed into law Thursday. The tax increase rolled out of the Senate shortly after noon, was passed by the House within half an hour, and signed by Gov. John Ashcroft at 3 p.m. Ashcroft approved the bill which will raise the gas tax 6 cents over the next four years. ... The tax will increase to 17 cents a gallon from 11 cents by April 1, 1996. ... The General Assembly's overwhelming support of the bill surprised its sponsors. The Senate approved it 30-4 on Thursday. It already had passed the House last week, but because the Senate made minor changes, the bill returned to the House before going to Ashcroft. The House approved the changes 117-28." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 2/21/92)

As Governor, Ashcroft Also Proposed Cigarette Tax Hikes On Four Separate Occasions. "He [Ashcroft] proposed four different times to raise Missouri's tax on cigarettes -- the same tax he assailed in Washington as an unconscionable levy on the working class." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 1/3/99)

As Governor, Ashcroft Also Signed Bills To Tax Catalog Purchases, Video Rentals, And To Impose A Temporary Sales Tax Hike. "Ashcroft also signed bills to create a local tax on catalog purchases that raised \$63.4 million a year, a sales tax on video rentals raising \$5.3 million a year and a temporary sales tax increase that raised \$135 million a year to meet a court order on pension reimbursements. All those tax bills were sent to Ashcroft by a Democrat-controlled General Assembly." (The Kansas City Star, 9/5/00)

As Governor, Ashcroft Enacted No Significant Tax Cuts

"Organized labor considers Ashcroft anathema, citing his opposition to increases in the minimum wage and his efforts to enact legislation giving companies the right to negotiate flexible work schedules with employees. Yet as governor Ashcroft made his peace with unions, vowing as early as 1986 that he would not try to enact a right-to-work law giving workers in union shops the right to opt out of union membership." Ashcroft Also Signed Legislation To Tie The State's Minimum Wage To The Federal Level. "He [Ashcroft] swore off any role in restoring Missouri's anti-union right-to-work law, declaring in 1986 that 'what we do not need right now are dead and divisive issues that pit employees vs. employers.' He signed the legislation that tied Missouri's minimum wage to the federal level." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 10/20/99)



FINAL JUDGMENT AS TO DEFENDANT BURTON DOUGLAS MORRISS

The Securities and Exchange Commission having filed a complaint, and Defendant Burton Douglas Morriss having: entered a general appearance; consented to the Court's jurisdiction over him and the subject matter of this action; consented to entry of this Judgment without admitting or denying the allegations of the complaint (except as to personal and subject matter jurisdiction, which Morriss admits); waived findings of fact and conclusions of law; and waived any right to appeal from this Judgment:

DISGORGEMENT AND PREJUDGMENT INTEREST

IT IS ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that Morriss is liable for disgorgement of \$9.1 million, representing profits gained as a result of the conduct alleged in the Complaint, together with prejudgment interest of \$416,090.71. Morriss shall satisfy this obligation by paying \$9,516,090.71 within 14 days after the entry of this Final Judgment.

According to his plea agreement, the tax liability Morriss attempted to evade in 2007 was \$2,888,483. The total tax due and owing by Morriss for all tax years is \$5,559,386. According to court documents, Morriss was a venture capitalist living in St. Louis County. Morriss admitted that, through his work, he was versed in tax laws. As a venture capitalist, he would discuss tax consequences of buying and selling investments to sophisticated investors. Moreover, he had been dealing with advisers and lawyers regarding his personal taxes for many years before 2006." In September 2013, Morriss Was Sentenced To Five Years In Prison. "Doug Morriss, the former chairman of the Acartha Group in Clayton who was sentenced in 2013 to five years in prison on tax evasion charges, is scheduled to be released Thursday. Morriss is currently located at the Federal Bureau of Prisons' residential reentry office at 1222 Spruce St. in downtown St. Louis, according to federal records. U.S. District Judge Rodney Sippel in April amended Morriss' prison sentence to three years, allowing for his early release. The new sentence stipulates that Morriss be on supervised release for three years and that he pay restitution of nearly \$5.6 million to the IRS. Morriss, now 53, in 2013 pleaded guilty to one felony count of tax evasion for the 2007 tax year; he claimed more than \$18 million in losses associated with a variety of entities, including Morriss Holdings, MIC Aircraft, Tech Aircraft and MIC Real Estate, though his tax liability was \$2.9 million." "Former U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft's law firm could earn \$52.2 million helping the U.S. attorney's office in New Jersey monitor a leading maker of knee and hip replacements, according to recent public filings. Ashcroft's firm is among five legal teams U.S. Attorney Christopher Christie hand-picked to watch the manufacturers, who agreed in September to pay \$311 million and hire monitors to settle allegations they paid surgeons to use and promote their devices. Christie, who took office in January 2002 and worked under Ashcroft until Ashcroft stepped down in 2005, denied any conflict Tuesday. ... The arrangement, disclosed in Oct. 31 filings with the Securities and Exchange Commission, was first reported Tuesday by The Star-Ledger of Newark. The deal calls for Zimmer Holdings of Indiana to pay Washington-based Ashcroft Group Consulting Services an average monthly fee between \$1.5 million and \$2.9 million. That includes a flat payment of \$750,000 to the firm's 'senior leadership group,' individual legal and consulting services at up to \$895 an hour and as much as \$250,000 in monthly expenses. Ashcroft's firm could make the full \$52.2 million, but it will earn less if Zimmer complies with the agreement, Christie said ... The agreements were made by Zimmer Holdings Inc., as well as Biomet Orthopedics Inc., DePuy Orthopaedics Inc., Smith & Nephew Inc. and Stryker Corp. The five companies account for nearly 95 percent of the market in hip and knee implants." (The Associated Press, 11/20/07)

<u>PokerStars</u>

In 2010, PokerStars Solicited Legal Advice From The Ashcroft Law Firm. "A 2006 law makes it a federal crime for gambling businesses to knowingly accept most forms of payment for illegal Internet gambling. Because of the law, Internet gambling companies based overseas have concocted schemes to use separate processing companies to hide payments, according to the indictment made public Friday. After many of those accounts were shut down, the companies allegedly found banks willing to take payments they knew were from gambling. A letter last year to SunFirst from a law firm led by former U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft says the firm believes it could be legal to process payments for peer-to-peer poker players, that is those who play against each other and not against a computer. 'If a case was taken all the way to a judge and/or jury, and a decision was made on the legality of these practices ... we believe the decision would be in favor of online poker as a game of skill being allowed under those laws,' said Catherine Hanaway, the attorney who wrote the letter. The letter dated July 26, 2010, was solicited on behalf of one of the poker companies, PokerStars, named in the indictment and addressed to SunFirst Bank. It came about seven months after the indictment says SunFirst began processing payments. But the letter makes clear that the Department of Justice 'takes a contrary position' and warns that 'the law in this area was unsettled.' Hanaway said given that warning, she was not surprised by the indictments. 'It is consistent with what we describe in the letter as to the DOJ position,' she said." <u>US Fidelis</u>

US Fidelis Was A Wentzville-Based Auto Warranty Company That Collapsed In 2009 Amidst Fraud Charges That Led To Two Top Executives Being Sentenced To Prison For Stealing From Customers. "Darain Atkinson, the co-founder and former president of US Fidelis, was sentenced Monday to eight years in prison on state charges. The action by Circuit Judge Jon Cunningham followed Atkinson's sentencing last week on federal charges; he got eight years and was ordered to pay \$4.5 million in back taxes. The federal and state sentences will run concurrently. In the state case, Atkinson previously pleaded guilty to stealing, insurance fraud and deceptive business practices. ... Wentzville-based US Fidelis, formerly known as National Auto Warranty Services, collapsed in 2009 amid fraud accusations. Officials said US Fidelis misled customers into thinking they were talking to auto dealers or manufacturers and were getting a comprehensive service warranty. Atkinson and his brother Cory Atkinson, the company's co-founder ,were accused of bleeding the company of more than \$100 million. ... Cory Atkinson, 42, of Chesterfield, pleaded guilty in June to federal and state charges. Silent During The Greitens Sex Scandal

In 2018, Ashcroft Refused To Comment On The Greitens Sex Scandal That Led To His Resignation As Governor

In 2018, Greitens Faced Corruption Allegations And A Sex Scandal That Culminated In A Felony Charge Of Invasion Of Privacy. "His first year in office was dominated by a steady stream of corruption allegations, most stemming from his reliance on anonymous campaign contributions routed through secretive nonprofits. On the night last January when he delivered his 2018 State of the State address to a joint session of the Legislature, the scandal that began his undoing became public. A woman with whom he had an affair in 2015 alleged that he took a nude photo without her consent to use as blackmail to keep her from talking about their relationship. Over the next five months, Greitens faced a barrage of accusations of criminal wrongdoing. Each time he remained defiant, shrugging off all allegations and vowing to remain in office. A St. Louis grand jury indicted him in February on one felony count of invasion of privacy, stemming from the woman's accusations. In March, a House committee investigating Greitens as a precursor to impeachment released a bombshell 25-page report of its findings. The woman with whom Greitens had the affair testified to the committee under oath that in March 2015 he had taped her hands to pull-up rings, blindfolded her, spit water into her mouth, ripped open her shirt, pulled down her pants and taken a photo of her. She said Greitens threatened to make the photo public if she ever told anyone about their encounter, and called her 'a little whore.' When she tried to leave the basement of his St. Louis home, she told the committee, Greitens grabbed her in a 'bear hug,' laid her on the floor, pulled out his penis and coerced her into oral sex while she wept 'uncontrollably."" "Witnesses disagreed about whether 'alien or foreign businesses' should be allowed to buy or transfer real estate and agricultural land in Missouri at a hearing Tuesday morning. The Senate Agriculture, Food Production and Outdoor Resources Committee heard testimony about three bills regarding the foreign ownership of real estate and agricultural land in Missouri. ... The second bill, SB 55 sponsored by Sen. Jason Bean, R-Butler, would reduce the amount of foreign-owned agricultural land in the state from 1 percent to 0.5 percent. 'Senate Bill 55 aims to set the record straight by making food security and national security a priority interest,' Bean said. Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft testified in favor of the bill, stating he had been working closely with Bean to ensure it was successful in protecting Missouri's security and protecting agricultural interests. 'This bill would just bring down that 1 percent under what is classified under the Missouri law,' he said. 'The reason why we wanted to go down to half a percent, is we wanted to make a difference. But we also wanted to make sure that we didn't do something that we regret two years later.' While Bean said the bill sought to deter foreign encroachment on Missouri land and the potential for foreign threats on military bases in the state, he said he didn't want to go as far as to deter foreign investment in the state that would benefit American farmers. ... Bean mentioned five nations that would be barred from owning any land in the state without exception: China, Russia, Iran, North Korea and Venezuela. 'The approach is to move us in the right direction,' Ashcroft said. 'But also be cognizant about potential unforeseen consequences and to make sure that we do it in a measured manner." The Ashcroft-Backed Bill Also Faced Questions About The Removal Of Language To Ban The Foreign Ownership Of Land Near Military Bases. "Bean stated language in the bill prohibiting foreign ownership of land within 30 miles of military installations would be amended, given that it might restrict development in other industries like aerospace or pharmaceuticals. Sen. Barbara Washington, D-Jackson County, expressed concern over this, and asked Ashcroft and Bean what protections would be in place to protect American military bases in case new or different countries needed to be added to the list. 'Who's going to monitor that change if the feds come down the line and say, 'We don't trust Britain anymore' or 'We don't trust Germany, and we don't want them around," Washington said. 'Who is going to monitor that to make sure that our military is protected?' 'Well, we've taken the military bases out of the bill. The reason we did that was when we realized, for example, our partners here in the state like Boeing, this would affect Boeing,' Bean said in an interview with the News Tribune after the hearing. Bean did not mention if language in the bill that restricts purchasing or leasing land within 30 miles of agricultural land would be removed." <u>State Sen. Bill Eigel Ran Digital Ads That Criticized Ashcroft For Not Favoring A Total Ban On The Foreign</u> <u>Ownership Of Missouri Land</u>

In February 2023, Ashcroft Defended His Support For The Bill After Eigel Ran Digital Ads Criticizing Him For Not Favoring A Total Ban On Foreign Ownership Of Land. "Eigel, a two-term GOP legislator from St. Charles County, began running ads on Facebook this month criticizing two of his fellow Republicans — Lt. Gov. Mike Kehoe and Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft. ... In four digital ads criticizing Ashcroft, Eigel argues the secretary of state is pushing legislation this year that doesn't go far enough to restrict foreign entities from acquiring real estate in Missouri. 'I am the only 2024 Missouri candidate that thinks there should be a 100% ban on foreign ownership of Missouri farmland,' Eigel said in one of the ads. ... In an interview Friday, Ashcroft said he's been working with Republican lawmakers to find a solution to an issue that's lingered for far too long. 'This has been something that hasn't been dealt with for several years by the legislature,' he said. Legislation sponsored by Sen. Jason Bean, R-Holcomb, and backed by Ashcroft would cut the limit on foreign-owned agriculture land from the current 1% to 0.5%. It would also bar ownership by individuals or businesses from certain countries, including China, Russia, North Korea and Venezuela. 'I don't think that what we're trying to do is the ultimate answer to where we need to be,' Ashcroft said. 'But what I wanted to do was take a measured approach so that we can actually fix a problem.' Eigel is sponsoring legislation that would ban all new foreign ownership of land in Missouri beginning Aug. 28. ... Ashcroft said he worries the more expansive legislation could have unintended consequences, such as interfering with companies like Boeing that work with foreign entities. ... 'My concern is historically, we talk about issues and we don't get stuff done,' he said. 'I don't want to be someone that's known for press conferences and press releases. I want to be someone that's known for getting policy accomplished.' ... Ashcroft said he worries the entire debate has become politicized. 'This is just one more issue where we're gonna sacrifice good policy on the altar of politics,' he said, later adding: 'I am going to continue to push to make progress on this issue. I don't want in any way to insinuate that I'm not going to continue to try to move the issue forward. But I am also not optimistic. I think the odds of nothing happening this year are unfortunately now better than the odds of something good happening."" (<u>Missouri Independent</u>, 2/20/23)

• Ashcroft Has Responded To Criticism By Knocking Eigel And Kehoe's Past Votes On The Issue And The Inaction Of The State Legislature. "...Kehoe was a state senator in 2013 and supported the veto override, but now backs new restrictions. Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and state Sen. Bill Eigel, neither of whom were in the legislature at the time, also support limits but have fought over who has staked out the most aggressive position. ... Ashcroft this spring has attacked both Kehoe and Eigel over the issue of foreign land ownership. Ashcroft began a late April column in *The Joplin Globe* by noting Kehoe's 2013 vote. And in another column on Tuesday, he wrote that the Senate with Eigel's help added a 'loophole' into legislation that would have allowed entities associated with China, Iran, Venezuela, Russia and North Korea to buy as much land as they want as long as it wasn't used for farming. 'Simply put there is one and only one reason why the legislature did not pass legislation prohibiting foreign ownership of Missouri land. They did not want to,' Ashcroft said in a statement to *The Star* on Thursday. 'They wanted to claim credit on Facebook and social media but not actually do anything about it and we know this because of what the senate did do.''' (*The Kanses City, Star, 5/19/23*)

In 2023, Ashcroft Testified In Support Of A Failed Omnibus Crime Bill (<u>HB 301</u>) That Included Provisions To Provide Taxpayer-Funded Health Care To Ex-Prisoners. "A bill in the Missouri Legislature could provide formerly incarcerated people who do not have access to health insurance with up to six months of MO HealthNet benefits. Rep. Kimberly-Ann Collins, D-St. Louis, supported provisions that allowed recently released convicts receive health services through the state's Medicaid program during a House Crime Prevention and Public Safety Committee meeting Thursday morning. She and others were behind some parts of the small public safety omnibus, but raised major concerns about other parts of the bill, namely a clause in the bill that would appoint a special prosecutor to serve in St. Louis. ... The Missouri House Committee on Crime Prevention and Public Safety heard testimony on House Bill 301, an omnibus bill to address policing concerns in Missouri during a hearing that lasted nearly four hours. ... The bill is sponsored by Rep. Lane Roberts, R-Joplin, and includes many provisions, including one that would allow for the appointment of a special prosecutor to handle special cases in St. Louis, an aspect of the bill that was criticized by many Democrats on the committee. Roberts said a special prosecutor was needed to address high crime rates in St. Louis. ... The bill also stipulates that former inmates would be provided with several forms of identification information upon release. It also establishes certain considerations for

allowing someone to post bail, like if they are a flight risk or had prior convictions. Other aspects of the bill would repeal minimum prison terms for certain crimes and change laws around the offense of 'unlawful possession of a firearm.' A clause in the bill would also provide a full tuition reimbursement for any police officer that trains to be a peace officer and gets full-time employment with a law enforcement agency for four years. ... I tend to take an all-of-the-above approach. The focus ought to be on whether kids are learning.' Pressed on whether that means he supports vouchers, he sighed and said: 'If there's no (accredited) public school, I guess we have to. The state's budget is what, \$27 billion? 'We're getting into real hypotheticals,' Ashcroft said. 'What I've told you is that I would do what I said I would do. In May 2021, Ashcroft Supported State Senate Republicans Who Tried To Shut Down Debate, If A Filibuster Blocked Them From Inserting A Pro-Life Provision Into A Medicaid Provider Tax Bill. "Republicans in the Missouri Senate should move to shut off debate if a filibuster blocks anti-abortion lawmakers from putting their stamp on provider taxes that fund Medicaid, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft said in an interview with The Independent this week. The advice was not, however, well received by the Senate's Republican or Democratic leaders. Lawmakers, who adjourned their annual session Friday, must return to Jefferson City sometime before Sept. 30 to extend a set of taxes on medical providers. Failure to do so would leave the state budget severely out of balance, with a shortage of more than \$2 billion for the state's share of the \$12 billion program. Renewal of the taxes failed for the first time in 30 years when it became entangled in abortion politics. Sen. Paul Wieland, R-Imperial, sought language to bar Medicaid from paying for certain types of contraceptives and Sen. Bob Onder, R-Lake St. Louis, wanted a provision prohibiting Planned Parenthood from being a Medicaid provider. 'You just have to have five people that are willing to sign a PQ form and then 18 people that are willing to vote for it,' Ashcroft said. 'And I think we saw that there were a clear majority of individuals that were in favor of the pro-life language. Now, it's easy for me to say. I'm not in the legislature.''' In a news release, Ashcroft said he is 'a champion for human life' and 'encourages the Missouri legislature to adopt strict language in legislation regarding the Federal Reimbursement Allowance - to ensure FRA monies would not be used to fund the killing of innocent human life.' Ashcroft's first political race was a failed bid for a state Senate seat, and in the interview, he said he was voicing the same abortion stance he promoted in that campaign. He said he's not trying to tell lawmakers what to include in the bill but that it should be as strong as possible. 'I don't want to be in the middle of anybody's bedroom,' Ashcroft said. 'All I want is to make sure that we're protecting those human lives.' The provider taxes became a target for the amendments because previous efforts to add language to budget bills barring Planned Parenthood from being a Medicaid provider were tossed out by the courts. 'All they're doing is taking language that's been approved in budgets for I don't know how many years and putting it off directly on the FRA,' Ashcroft said. In April 2023, Ashcroft Said He Opposed Hormone Therapy And Gender Surgeries For Children And Adults, But He Opposed Bailey's Rule To Restrict Such Treatments For Adults. "At least one top Missouri Republican isn't defending Attorney General Andrew Bailey's rules on transgender medical care, which advocates say would make Missouri the first state to restrict treatments for adults. Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft said in an interview he disagrees with Bailey's regulation even though he doesn't support hormone therapy and gender surgeries for children and adults. Ashcroft said adults should be able to make their own decisions and predicted the Republican attorney general's regulation won't actually take effect. 'I wouldn't want to be the attorney that was defending it,' Ashcroft, an attorney and engineer elected secretary of state in 2016, told the Post-Dispatch. 'If you're an adult, you have the capacity to make your own decisions,' Ashcroft said. 'It's a decision I would

disagree with, but I don't believe it's the role of government to forbid it.' He said the government had a responsibility to protect children who are too young to give consent, and supports legislation restricting genderrelated care for children. But Ashcroft said he wasn't confident the attorney general had the authority to limit such care himself." (St. Louis Post-Dispatch, 4/20/23)

Ashcroft Argued Adults Could Make Their Own Decisions Regarding Such Treatments. "The most prominent Missouri Republican voicing skepticism about Bailey's rule has been Ashcroft, who launched his campaign for governor earlier this month. Ashcroft, who has promised to make the state 'the front line of freedom' if elected, has said adults can make their own decisions about treatment. But he has also maintained that gender-affirming care cannot fundamentally change whether someone is a man or woman. 'I don't think anyone should go through this process because it's a lie to say that you can change from a man to a woman or a woman to a man through surgery... But if you have someone who is an adult, they can make their own decision as to what they want to do, and I support them,' Ashcroft said during a Tuesday appearance on CNN. Ashcroft's office didn't make him available for an interview with The Star. But in a Friday appearance on NewsTalkSTL, Ashcroft voiced concern the legislature would use Bailey's rule as an excuse not to pass legislation on transgender care. He said rulemaking authority is limited and said there 'are real questions about whether or not that rule will survive in the courts."" (The Kansac City Star, 4/26/23)

In the final hours before the vote, Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft urged Senator Roy Blunt, R-Mo., to 'use whatever means possible to stop the passage' of the Respect for Marriage Act. Blunt is one of 12 Republicans who joined Democrats in a procedural vote to advance the legislation earlier this month. In a letter to the Senator, Ashcroft wrote that the act, 'Specifically runs afoul traditional principles of federalism,' and that it will 'embolden an already weaponized U.S. Department of Justice.' Ashcroft also said the federal law isn't needed because Missouri voters have already voiced what they believe. 'Missourians have overwhelmingly approved marriage as a bond between one man and one woman. Over seventy percent of Missourians amended the Missouri Constitution stipulating that to be valid and recognized in this state, a marriage shall exist only between a man and a woman,' Ashcroft wrote in the letter. Ashcroft also wrote he believes the act is bad policy. 'I believe marriage is the exclusive, lifelong, conjugal union between one man and one woman, and any departure from that design hurts the indispensable goal of having every child raised in a stable home by a mother and a father,' Ashcroft wrote." 



Ashcroft, a Republican and the state's top election official, leveled the criticisms Wednesday in an address to the Missouri House on the first day of the General Assembly's annual session. Callahan scolded Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft's office for circulating misleading advertisements about the law. Callahan ordered Ashcroft to revamp how the office explains voting law requirements, because voters have other options they can use to vote without a picture ID. He said not only were voters confused, but also local election authorities offered voters differing interpretations of the law. 'No compelling state interest is served by misleading local election authorities and voters into believing a photo ID card is a requirement for voting,' Callahan said." Russell, the high court upheld a lower court's decision that forbade the secretary of state from publishing information indicating photo identification is required to vote. It also said Senior Cole County Judge Richard Callahan made the right decision in 2018 when he jettisoned a requirement that voters without photo IDs sign an affidavit attesting to their identities. At issue is a 2016 decision by Missouri voters to amend the state constitution to allow lawmakers to create requirements for voters to identify themselves at their polling place, including using photo IDs. The resulting law directed voters to present a valid photo ID, or to sign a sworn statement and present some other form of identification in order to cast a regular ballot." In 2020, Ashcroft's Office Accepted A \$1.4 Million Grant From The Mark Zuckerberg-Funded Center For Election Innovation & Research (CEIR). Most Of The Grant Was Used To Mail Information To Registered Voters In Missouri. "Election agencies in St. Charles and Lincoln counties have received grants from a national nonprofit group to help cover coronavirus-related expenses, officials said Friday. The grants from the Chicagobased Center for Tech and Civic Life, funded largely by Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg, are similar to those facing legal challenges from conservative groups in four other states. Meanwhile, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft, Missouri's chief election official, has accepted a \$1.4 million grant from a separate nonprofit that also got a big donation from Zuckerberg and his wife, Priscilla Chan. ... The separate grant of \$1.4 million to Ashcroft's office came from the Washington-based Center for Election Innovation and Research, which got a \$50 million contribution from Zuckerberg and Chan. Nationally, that group's grants are going for public information campaigns explaining mail voting and logistics. Maura Browning, a spokeswoman for Ashcroft, said about \$1 million from the grant was used to mail information on voting options during the pandemic to every household in the state with a registered voter. "A bombshell report that suggests Mark Zuckerberg effectively 'bought' the 2020 presidential election by funneling more than \$400 million to local boards of election under the guise of a 'non-partisan' effort has prompted outrage and calls from officials for reform. Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis blasted the billionaire Facebook founder during a news conference at which he said a recent election reform law had 'banned Zuckerbucks' in the Sunshine State. 'So, Zuckerberg, he spent over \$400 million through these, quote, nonprofits to, quote, help with election administration,' DeSantis said Tuesday. 'But what they would do is they would require certain things to be done like mass mail balloting, ballot harvesting, and they would focus on partisan voter turnout, basically. That was totally unacceptable.' Sen. Ron Johnson told The Post, 'I continue to question whether Mark Zuckerberg's highly partisan 2020 election spending was even legal.' ... On Wednesday, Sen. Rand Paul retweeted a report about the investigation, adding: 'Are our elections for sale? Did Mark Zuckerberg purchase the Wisconsin Presidential election?' Zuckerberg's money was supposed to augment government funding and 'promote safe and reliable voting' amid the COVID-19 pandemic so that 'every eligible voter can participate in a safe and timely way and that their vote is counted,' according to a September 2020 press release announcing the plan. ... Earlier this year, an analysis by the conservative Foundation for Government Accountability found that in the battleground state of Georgia, about \$29 million of Zuckerberg's money went to counties that President Biden later won, at a rate of \$7.13 per registered voter. By contrast, the Peach State counties that former President Donald Trump carried received a total of \$2.3 million — at a rate of just \$1.91 per voter, the FGA said. In a prepared statement, a Zuckerberg-Chan spokesman acknowledged the donations to the tune of \$350 million to the Center for Tech and Civic Life and \$69.5 million to the Center for Election Innovation and Research." Thursday with legal complaints alleging malfeasance related to activities surrounding the 2020 election. The Center for Renewing America (CRA) filed two complaints — the first against Zuckerberg and his wife Priscilla Chan and the second against the groups Center for Tech and Civic Life (CTCL), Center for Election Innovation and Research (CEIR) and National Vote at Home Institute (NVAHI) — Thursday morning with the Internal Revenue Service. The complaints, obtained by FOX Business, allege that Zuckerberg and the three groups were involved in a scheme to inject nearly \$500 million into the 2020 election in order to 'throw it' to President Biden. ... Zuckerberg hired former Obama campaign manager David Plouffe to spearhead the effort, according to the CRA. Plouffe allegedly funneled most of the hundred-million-dollar grants from the couple to Democratic-leaning jurisdictions in swing states via the three tax-exempt voting rights groups ahead of the November 2020 election. 'It is beyond disgraceful to imagine federal taxpayers subsidizing the partisan preferences of billionaires who easily could have given to a Democrat super PAC in 2020,' the CRA said in a statement shared with FOX Business. 'But, of course, then they would not have been able to take a tax deduction, so they disquised the political nature of their donations and shuffled them through 'charitable' intermediaries, making ordinary Americans foot the bill,' the CRA continued. The CRA noted that federal law prohibits individuals from making donations intended to illegitimately aid one political party over another. The complaints said the IRS must deny any personal income tax exemptions collected by Zuckerberg and Chan for their donations to the CTCL, CEIR, and NVAHI during the 2020 election cycle. The CRA also requested that the IRS terminate the tax exemptions of the three groups. ... The CRA is a conservative policy group headed by former senior Trump administration official Russ Vought." 'It's imperative that we as election officials do all we can to safeguard our elections, and to make certain that every registered voter can have their say on election day.' In March 2023, Ashcroft Pulled Missouri Out Of ERIC Following Increased Criticism Of The Program By Trump And His Supporters. "Missouri will no longer participate in a voluntary system aimed at helping states combat voter fraud by maintaining accurate lists of registered voters. Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft announced Monday afternoon that Missouri, along with Florida and West Virginia, were withdrawing from the Electronic

Registration Information Center, or ERIC. The system was established in 2012 by a bipartisan group of election officials in seven states. It is designed to help identify and remove people from voter rolls who have died or

moved to other states and prosecute people who vote in multiple states. Thirty-two states and the District of Columbia are members. In a letter to ERIC's executive director, Ashcroft noted Missouri joined 5 years ago 'to make elections better, voter rolls more accurate and bring greater trust to the election process.' Ashcroft cited several reasons pulling Missouri out of the group, including a requirement that member states send mailings to eligible but unregistered voters. 'ERIC focuses on adding names to voters rolls,' Ashcroft wrote, 'by requiring a solicitation to individuals who already had an opportunity to register to vote and made the conscious decision not to be registered.' Ashcroft guestioned the value of the system for Missouri, writing that 'only 3 of the 8 states that border Missouri are members.' He also alleged ERIC 'refuses to require member states to participate in addressing multi-state voter fraud.' ... The Associated Press reported last week that ERIC has faced increasing scrutiny of late, especially from allies of former President Donald Trump who worked to overturn the 2020 presidential election. Among the complaints is that ERIC was founded with help from the nonpartisan Pew Charitable Trusts, which receives money from liberal donor George Soros' organization. ERIC's leadership told the AP that it is funded through annual dues by member states and has never received funding from Soros. Critics have also complained about the involvement of David Becker, who helped found ERIC and now serves as a nonvoting member of the group's governing board while working for a nonprofit called Center for Election Innovation & Research. ... Ashcroft didn't name Becker in his letter, but did say a 'hyper-partisan individual' serving as a non-voting member of the governing board was part of his motivation for pulling Missouri out of the group." Ashcroft Downplayed The Fact There Was No Substitute For ERIC, Which Works To Ensure The Accuracy Of Voter Rolls. "When Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and officials in a handful of other Republicanleaning states left a national system designed to improve the accuracy of voting rolls last week, the likely GOP candidate for governor outlined his grievances. Ashcroft alleged the Electronic Information Registration Information Center, commonly called ERIC, had refused to require member states to participate in multi-state efforts to address voter fraud and had focused on adding names to voter rolls by requiring solicitations to individuals who had already had the opportunity to register, among other complaints. He has faced criticism from Democrats and election experts for his decision. But what comes after ERIC is less clear. In an interview with The Star, Ashcroft downplayed the possibility that he or election officials from the other breakaway states ... would move quickly to form an alternative program. He instead spoke broadly about how Missouri and other states are likely to focus on their own efforts while remaining in communication. ... The data is also used to identify individuals who are potentially eligible to vote but haven't registered. States retain control of their voter rolls, which are not connected to ERIC. ... Asked whether leaving ERIC increases the risk of voter fraud going undetected, Ashcroft said the risk already exists. He blamed the fact that five of eight states bordering Missouri aren't members and accused some member states of refusing to provide information needed to search for fraud. 'It was more aspirational to be able to do that well with ERIC,' Ashcroft said. 'And I had hoped to make that what it could be and states that were supposedly about running good, clean elections didn't want to be part of allowing us to find people that were intentionally cheating.' ... Fey also leads the Missouri Association of County Clerks and Election Authorities and said over the past two election cycles, the ERIC system actually helped catch multiple people who voted in two different states. 'We removed several thousand dead voters and people who had moved to other states,' Fey said. 'These are folks that we would not have caught as quickly had it not been for ERIC - and we also found a few folks that voted in St. Louis County and in another state in the same election and we were able to send that information to law enforcement. So, for us, it was a very good tool.' ... On Monday, Ashcroft defended his decision, saying it was due to requirements that ERIC had failed to demand of member states shared the data so that you could look for multiple people voting and multiple states in one.' Ashcroft was also critical of the center's requirement that member states send mailers to voters who are eligible, but not registered to vote, arguing that it's not the role of the state government. 'I really feel like it's best if we just make sure the administration runs well, and leave the rest of it to the partisans,' Ashcroft said. ... 'Marijuana is a \$400 million-a-year industry in Missouri this year, and if this measure passes, it's projected to grow to \$1.5 billion in the next five years,' said Michael Wilson, founder and CEO of Franklin's Stash House. 'So it's a really fast, upward-moving trajectory. That will generate a lot more taxes, and it will also provide revenue to better build out the industry infrastructure in the state, which at the end of the day allows patients to get a more affordable product.''' In August 2022, The Missouri Independent Reported Ashcroft's Office, In Coordination With The Campaign Behind The Petition, Approved The Petition Via A Secretive Process, Whereby It Overruled The Decisions Of Local Election Officials That Had Disgualified Thousands Of Signatures. "In a span of a little over two weeks, an initiative petition to legalize recreational marijuana in Missouri made an unexpected comeback. In late July, unofficial tallies showed the Legal Missouri campaign 2,275 signatures short of the threshold for getting on the ballot, leading many to believe its hopes were dashed. By Aug. 9, the deficit was gone, and Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft announced he had certified the marijuana petition to appear on the November ballot. During that window, the campaign behind the initiative petition deployed a novel strategy. Instead of waiting for certification and turning to the courts, as outlined in state law, it asked the Secretary of State's Office to do its own review of signatures. The campaign even provided a list of signatures it felt were incorrectly disqualified. And the maneuver, which surprised veterans of the initiative petition process, worked. ...But even those who agree with the outcome say the process wasn't transparent and risks undermining confidence in the system. ... In an Aug. 1 letter obtained by The Independent through an open records request, Marc Ellinger, an attorney for Legal Missouri, detailed errors the campaign believed local election authorities had made in their certification of signatures. Altogether across Congressional Districts 6 and 7, there were over 4,800 signatures that the campaign believed had been denied in error, and that if certified, would give the campaign a surplus of signatures it needed to be listed on the Nov. 8 ballot. Ellinger requested Ashcroft's director of elections conduct

an independent review, noting that the campaign had discussed the alleged issues with the Secretary of State's Office on July 25. Details on how the review was conducted are scarce. The Secretary of State's Office declined to answer a list of questions about the steps it took and the review's scope. Reports detailing counties' final totals for the marijuana initiative petition obtained by The Independent indicate that the Secretary of State's Office signed off on over 50 counties' reports, rather than the local election official — suggesting a review that was not limited to just the 14 counties identified in Legal Missouri's Aug. 1 letter. Over 40 counties' reports were signed off on by the Secretary of State's Office for county totals for a ranked-choice voting initiative petition that was also aiming to make the ballot this year. A majority of the reports signed 'SOS-CP' were dated Aug. 5. In a statement, JoDonn Chaney, a spokesman for the Secretary of State statute. Anti-Drug Legalization Activist Joy Sweeney Filed A Failed Lawsuit Claiming The Ashcroft-Approved Petition Was Improperly Certified

In August 2022, Sweeney Filed A Lawsuit Claiming The Recreational Marijuana Petition Was Improperly Certified By Ashcroft. "An anti-drug legalization activist has filed a lawsuit arguing a recreational marijuana initiative petition was improperly certified by Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft and should not appear on the November ballot. The lawsuit was filed Friday in Cole County Circuit Court — the final day within the 10-day window outlined under state law for challenges to be brought to initiative petitions once they're certified. It did not appear in the online court docket until Monday morning. It argues that the petition changes multiple sections of the Missouri Constitution in violation of single-subject rules and its backers did not secure the minimum number of signatures to warrant its inclusion on the November ballot. The lawsuit was filed on behalf of Joy Sweeney, a Jefferson City resident, who also serves as the deputy director of training, technical assistance and



community outreach for Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America, a group of community coalitions that aim to prevent substance use and abuse." (<u>Missouri Independent</u>, 8/22/22)

In Her Suit, Sweeney Claimed Ashcroft "Certified And Counted Signatures That Were Marked Through By The Local Election Authorities And, Absent This Action, The Marijuana Initiative Petition Would Not Have Had A Sufficient Number Of Valid Signatures In Six Of Eight Congressional Districts." "If the petition's certification had been based on just the signatures that were verified by local election authorities, then it would not have had enough valid signatures to make the ballot, the lawsuit argues. The lawsuit asserts that Ashcroft 'certified and counted signatures that were marked through by the local election authorities and, absent this action, the marijuana initiative petition would not have had a sufficient number of valid signatures in six of eight congressional districts.' Sweeney's Suit Also Claimed The Ashcroft-Approved Petition Amended Multiple Subjects In Violation Of State Law. "Additionally, the lawsuit contends the marijuana petition violates the single-subject rule by containing multiple subjects and unrelated matters. Under the Missouri Constitution, initiative petitions amending the constitution, 'shall not contain more than one amended and revised article of this constitution, or one new article which shall not contain more than one subject and matters properly connected therewith...' The lawsuit argues the measure not only would legalize recreational marijuana, but it would also criminalize possession of certain amounts, create a process for licensing and growing marijuana, establish taxing guidelines, create a new position to oversee licensure 'on a preferential basis,' and create a system to expunge nonviolent marijuana offenses from criminal records." In September 2022, A Judge Dismissed Sweeney's Lawsuit. "A Missouri judge on Friday tossed out a lawsuit that sought to knock a recreational marijuana proposal off the Nov. 8 ballot. ... Cole County Circuit Judge Cotton Walker ruled that the plaintiff, Joy Sweeney, did not prove she's a Missouri resident, which would have been required for her lawsuit to continue. Sweeney on Thursday testified remotely from her second home in Alexandria, Virginia, that she still owns property in Missouri and is registered to vote in Missouri. Walker said her testimony came too late because her lawyers had already finished submitting evidence in the case. But Walker noted that he would have ruled against Sweeney's lawsuit even if she had proven her Missouri residency. ... Sweeney claimed that the secretary of state's office overstepped its bounds by re-checking voter signatures, which is typically done by local election officials to make sure signees are properly registered to vote. Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft's office re-checked petition signatures for the recreational marijuana proposal last month

after a lawyer for the pro-pot campaign raised concerns that some signatures from registered voters had been incorrectly tossed out as invalid, which the office confirmed after a review. In his ruling, Walker wrote that Ashcroft's review of the signatures was legal and that he was right to confirm that the campaign gathered enough valid signatures for the measure to be put on the ballot." A Few Days Later, An Appellate Court Rejected Sweeney's Appeal. "An initiative petition to legalize recreational marijuana in Missouri will remain on the ballot after a panel of judges on the Missouri Western District Court of Appeals affirmed that the steps Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft took to certify the petition were proper. A three-judge panel heard arguments Monday afternoon in Kansas City and ruled shortly after that the lower court committed a legal error by refusing to reopen evidence regarding whether Joy Sweeney, an anti-drug legalization activist, had standing to pursue the case. However, the court of appeals said the lower court was correct in finding that Ashcroft properly certified the initiative petition to appear on the November ballot and that it does not violate the Missouri Constitution's single-subject rules. ... Luke Niforatos, the CEO of Protect Our Kids PAC, a Colorado-based super PAC launched earlier this year that opposes the legalization of drugs and is supporting Sweeney's lawsuit, said they are requesting the case be transferred to the Missouri Supreme Court for review. 'We feel like it's a very cut-and-dry point of law,' Niforatos said, 'where these clerks have a statutory authority to disqualify these signatures, but they do not have the authority to requalify them. BALLOT LANGUAGE CHALLENGES TO ABORTION-RELATED INITIATIVE PETITIONS

<u>In 2023, Missouri Judges Rewrote Ashcroft's Ballot Language For Six Pro-Abortion Initiative Petitions,</u> <u>Stating They Were Biased, "Misleading," And "Replete With Politically Partisan Language"</u>

In September 2023, A Cole County Judge Rewrote Ashcroft's Ballot Language For Six Pro-Abortion Initiative Petitions, Ruling They Were Biased. "A Cole County judge rewrote the ballot titles for six initiative petitions seeking to enshrine the right to abortion in the Missouri Constitution, ruling that 13 phrases in the summaries written by Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft are 'argumentative' or unfairly biased. In a ruling issued Monday morning, Circuit Judge Jon Beetem wrote that the summaries crafted by Ashcroft completely ignored the initiative proposals' protections for contraceptives and other reproductive health needs. ... Beetem's ruling comes two weeks after he heard arguments from ACLU of Missouri attorneys representing Dr. Anna Fitz-James, the physician who is the named sponsor of the initiatives, challenging Ashcroft's ballot titles. 'The court finds that certain phrases included in the secretary's summary are problematic in that they are argumentative or do not fairly describe the purposes or probable effect of the initiative,' Beetem wrote. ... In his ruling, Beetem wrote that the initiative and unrestricted abortions,' that abortion would be allowed 'from conception to live birth" and could be performed by anyone 'without requiring a medical license'



or 'potentially being subject to medical malpractice.' ... Beetem rewrote each of six ballot summaries, making them different based on the contents." (<u>The Joplin Globe</u>, 9/25/23)

In October 2023, Ashcroft Joined His Office's Legal Team Defending The Ballot Language In An Appeal Of The Lower Court Ruling. "There is a new member of the legal team defending the ballot language Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft wrote for proposed initiatives that would add abortion rights to the Missouri Constitution -Ashcroft himself. Ashcroft, who was an engineer by trade until earning his law degree in 2008, rarely appeared in court on behalf of clients, he said in an interview Wednesday with the Independent. He will be in court Oct. 30, when the Western District Court of Appeals in Kansas City hears arguments in the case, but said he won't disclose whether he will take an active role in the hearing. ... Ashcroft is appealing the Sept. 25 ruling that the ballot language he wrote for six proposed constitutional amendments was biased. ... In the decision that rewrote the ballot language, Cole County Circuit Judge Jon Beetem concluded 'certain phrases included in the secretary's summary are problematic in that they are argumentative or do not fairly describe the purposes or probable effect of the initiative." Later In October 2023, The Appellate Court Upheld The Lower Court Ruling And Found Ashcroft's Ballot Language For The Six Pro-Abortion Initiative Petitions Were "Misleading" And "Replete With Politically Partisan Language." Ashcroft Responded By Appealing To The Missouri Supreme Court. "...Ashcroft wrote ballot titles for six proposals to restore abortion rights that were 'replete with politically partisan language,' a Missouri appeals court unanimously ruled Tuesday. In an expedited decision issued a day after hearing arguments, a 3-judge panel of the Western District Court of Appeals upheld, with only minor revisions, the revised ballot titles written by Cole County Circuit Judge Jon Beetem. ... Ashcroft issued a statement that he would appeal the decision to the Missouri Supreme Court, a process likely to take several weeks. ... A key error in Ashcroft's ballot titles, states the opinion signed by Judge Thomas Chapman, was its single-minded focus on how it would affect the legality of abortion. The proposed constitutional amendments, he wrote, cover all aspects of reproductive health care. 'The absence of any reference to a right to reproductive health care beyond abortion in the summary statements is misleading,' Chapman wrote. There was little to be saved from Ashcroft's summaries, he wrote. 'The secretary's summary statements do not fairly describe the purposes and probable effects of the initiatives,' he wrote. 'The secretary's summary statements are replete with politically partisan language.' ... In its ruling, the court of appeals upheld only one aspect of Ashcroft's original ballot title — that the proposals would bar the government from discriminating against individuals or organizations that support reproductive rights or provide reproductive services. The court restored the language, substituting 'reproductive services' for 'abortion' in Ashcroft's sentence because 'the secretary's singular focus on abortion in addressing the nondiscrimination provisions is, as previously noted, misleading.' In upholding Beetem's decision to rewrite all the ballot titles, Chapman said he had no choice. 'After removal of the inaccurate and partisan language of the secretary's summary statements, the circuit court was left with largely unworkable summary statements,' Chapman wrote. 'The circuit court was authorized to write alternative language to fulfill its responsibility that a fair and sufficient summary statement be certified."" (Missouri Independent, 10/31/23)

<u>In 2023, A Group Behind An Initiative Petition To Add Exceptions For Rape And Incest To The State's</u> Abortion Ban Filed A Pending Lawsuit Against Ashcroft For Writing Unfair And Inaccurate Ballot Language

In October 2023, A Group Behind An Initiative Petition To Add Exceptions For Rape And Incest To The State's Abortion Ban Sued Ashcroft For Writing Unfair And Inaccurate Ballot Language. "A group seeking to add exceptions to the state's abortion ban for rape and incest filed a lawsuit Thursday arguing the ballot summary and fiscal note are unfair and inaccurate. Filed in August by Republican political operative Jamie Corley with assistance from Democratic attorney Chuck Hatfield, the initiative petitions are being pitched as a middle ground between the ban currently in place and more expansive proposals filed earlier this year by abortion-rights supporters. Last week, ... Ashcroft released his summary of the proposals that will appear on the ballot, writing that the petitions would either 'allow no-excuse abortions' for up to 12 weeks or 'nullify Missouri laws protecting the right to life.' ... Corley argues Ashcroft used 'blatantly false information' in the summaries, as well as phrases like 'until live birth,' making the summaries 'intentionally argumentative, insufficient and unfair.' Ashcroft described certain provisions of the initiative petitions in 'antagonistic and blatantly incorrect terms likely to prejudice voters against the measures,' the lawsuit states. 'Voters should heed these political moves as a

canary in the coal mine for the lengths some politicians will take to keep the government involved in a woman – or child's — pregnancy, even if that pregnancy is a result of rape,' Corley said. In a statement released by his office, Ashcroft said Corley's lawsuit is 'another example of individuals trying to mask the truth to mislead voters. The secretary of state's office will always fight to protect the right of Missourians to make their own decision on how to vote.' ... All versions of the amendments Corley submitted enshrine 'exceptions and immunity' clauses into Missouri's abortion law, and three versions include language prohibiting the government from interfering with a woman's access to an abortion in the first 12 weeks of pregnancy. The rape exception would only apply to victims who have reported the rape or sexual assault to a crisis hotline. Three of the six initiative petitions would also legalize abortion in the first 12 weeks of pregnancy. Each version also states that the rights guaranteed in the amendment 'are subject to strict scrutiny,' meaning any restrictions to abortion enacted by the Legislature must further a 'compelling governmental interest' and must be narrowly tailored to achieve that interest. Anyone seeking an abortion outside of Missouri could not be subject to criminal prosecution or civil penalty. The same immunity applies to health professionals or anyone assisting in seeking an abortion. Some versions also contain provisions prohibiting use of taxpayer funds to be used 'in support of the provision of abortion in this state.' However, in those versions, the Legislature would not be permitted to cut off funding for health care providers who perform abortions." (Missouri Independent, 10/27/23)

POLITICIZING LOCAL ELECTIONS

In September 2021, Ashcroft Said He Was Considering A Measure To Make Local Elections Partisan In Missouri. "... Ashcroft thinks voter turnout in Missouri's local elections would be better if they were partisan. In the 2020 presidential election, voter turnout in Missouri was 70%, a stark contrast to nonpartisan municipal elections in the state that can see as few as 10% of voters going to the polls. That's why Ashcroft is considering a measure to narrow that gap, by having candidates for local offices pick a party. 'Local government may be more important to people's day-to-day lives than at the state and federal levels,' Ashcroft said, adding that it's not good for big decisions about people's everyday lives to be determined by the outcome of elections with so few people showing up to the polls. 'If we were to make some of those partisan, we're not trying to make them more combative, would that help more people to come out? Does calling them nonpartisan make people think they are not important?' Such a move would require legislation and likely be the subject of fierce debate. ...Rolla City Councilwoman Jody Eberly is an example of a candidate who would be turned off by the prospect of being forced to choose a party. 'I can tell you that I would probably not be running,' Eberly said. 'With the last couple of years, things have become so rancorous and so bitter and polarized that I think there are a lot of good people out there who just would not want to be involved in that.' ... Ashcroft's idea is far from reality, as it can't even be introduced as a possible law change until the legislature convenes in January. He said that it's worth considering, and that it could be a way to encourage diversity of political thought instead of just another race between Republicans and Democrats. 'You can run as a Green candidate, a Libertarian, you can be a Constitutional Candidate. People of all of those have run. Especially in local races, individuals and smaller parties have a greater chance of being successful,' Ashcroft said." (St. Louis Public Radio, 9/17/21)

"INDEPENDENT STATE LEGISLATURE" DOCTRINE

In September 2022, Ashcroft Said His Amicus Brief In A U.S. Supreme Court Case (Moore v. Harper) Was Not An Endorsement Of The Controversial "Independent State Legislature" Theory. He Also Refused To Denounce The Theory. "...Ashcroft wants to be clear that his amicus brief in a high-profile U.S. Supreme Court case is not an endorsement of the so-called 'independent state legislature' doctrine. He's not denouncing it, either. Instead, Ashcroft is floating a theory of his own: That Congressional redistricting is a duty reserved solely for the states under the 10th Amendment, with no role whatsoever for Congress. Ashcroft says many, including The Independent, initially misinterpreted his position when he filed the amicus brief. His brief dovetails with the issues at the heart of the Supreme Court case — whether state legislatures alone have authority over redistricting. But Ashcroft says his take is more nuanced. The state legislature controls redistricting in Missouri, Ashcroft said, but that doesn't mean it has to in every state. 'It's reserved to the states, and the states themselves, in their constitution,' he said, 'and laws should define it. So it could be different in Missouri than Kansas than Oklahoma than Nebraska.' ... Most of the briefs filed in the Supreme Court case 'assume that Congress could

override state legislatures on setting rules for congressional redistricting,' Hasen said. But Missouri contends Congress can't say anything about how states redistrict for congressional elections. 'We need to keep the federal government out of Missouri elections,' Ashcroft said. ... Proponents of the independent state legislature doctrine argue the Election Clause gives legislatures sole responsibility for drawing congressional districts — and state courts have no role to play. Ashcroft contends redistricting doesn't fall under the Elections Clause at all. Drawing new congressional districts doesn't fall under 'time, places and manner,' Ashcroft says. Therefore, redistricting is a power of the states under Tenth Amendment, which says 'powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.' 'I'm not saying that means the legislature controls redistricting in every state,' Ashcroft said. 'We're saying that whatever the state Constitution says should control how that state does congressional redistricting since it's through the 10th Amendment.' ... As to the question of whether state courts could review a map considered a partisan gerrymander, Ashcroft said if Missourians were concerned that the legislature was engaging in partisan

gerrymandering they could turn to the initiative petition process to change the state Constitution and outlaw it. 'The state could have restrictions on partisan gerrymandering if the state wants to,' Ashcroft said. 'The people would have to make that decision. The crux is, it goes back to the people. In June 2023, The U.S. Supreme Court Rejected The Theory By A 6-To-3 Vote. "The U.S. Supreme Court on Tuesday repudiated the most extreme form of a controversial legal theory that, if adopted, would have radically reshaped the way elections are conducted, giving state legislatures virtually unchecked power to decide election rules. By a 6-to-3 vote, the court rejected the so-called Independent State Legislature theory advanced by the Republican-dominated North Carolina state legislature. Writing for the court majority, Chief Justice John Roberts said that the U.S. Constitution does not, as the lawmakers had claimed, insulate their actions from review by the state courts. To the contrary, he said, state legislative power is constrained by the federal and state constitutions, as well as ordinary state laws. At the same time, however, Roberts said that in overseeing election provisions, state courts 'do not have free rein' to exceed "the ordinary bounds of judicial review.' How to know when courts do exceed that power? The court majority didn't say, leaving for another day the task of articulating a standard for determining when federal courts may tell a state court that it has gone too far in interpreting state law. Joining Roberts in the majority were conservative Justices Brett Kavanaugh and Amy Coney Barrett and the court's three liberals, Justices Sonia Sotomayor, Elena Kagan and Ketanji Brown Jackson." In 2023, Ashcroft Clashed With The Missouri Chamber Of Commerce Over His Issuance Of An ESG Rule, Which Critics Fear Will Increase Fees On Missouri Investors And Financial Firms. "After the General Assembly failed to pass any legislation related to reining in ESG practices, Ashcroft said, he used his authority to set the new rule. But the business groups that opposed the legislature's moves in the 2023 session voice the same objections to Ashcroft's rule. They say it will create an unneeded burden on banks that operate in Missouri. The rule, which took effect at the end of July, requires financial advisers and institutions to have clients sign disclosure forms when an investment may consider ESG scores or prioritize elements that may not yield maximum profit. Ashcroft, a Republican running for governor, said his rule is directed at investors who are 'going to make a discretionary trade recommendation, and that recommendation is wholly or in part based on something other than getting the maximum financial return. They need to disclose that and get approval,' he told The Beacon. ... Ashcroft said his rule gives people a choice of pursuing investments for maximum profit, or potentially compromising some of that profit to invest in companies that align with their values. ... But the state Chamber of Commerce says the language is vague and its attempts to address it with Ashcroft's office seemed to go unheard. 'We've had pretty extensive conversations with the secretary of state's office,' said Phillip Arnzen, head of governmental affairs for the chamber. 'And they did a slight revision, but it did not address the concerns.' 'This rule, it's so vague that you could look at it and almost every single transaction, you could say, theoretically,

you're going to need this consent form,' he said. Fischer, the former SEC prosecutor, said part of the complication is that securities rules are most often set at the federal level. For financial institutions, which are typically riskaverse, Ashcroft's rule could lead to higher fees and labor costs if disclosures are required on many transactions, or if they have different requirements to meet for different states. 'It's a lot easier for firms to operate with a federal standard,' Fischer said. 'It could mean putting additional expenses on companies' backs.' The Missouri Chamber of Commerce made the same criticism. 'This is more burdensome than federal regulations,' Arnzen said. Taxpayer-Funded Work For A Campaign Donor

In September 2023, Ashcroft Used Tax Dollars To Hire A Campaign Donor To Represent Him In A Legal Challenge To His ESG Rule. "...Ashcroft, who is running for governor, is using taxpayer funds to pay a campaign donor to represent him in a high-profile lawsuit. Instead of using the Missouri attorney general's office to fight a challenge to new investment rules being pushed by Ashcroft, the Republican hired the politically connected Kansas City law firm of Graves Garrett to represent his office. Among a trio of Graves Garrett lawyers on the case is Edward Greim, who contributed the maximum amount of \$2,825 to Ashcroft's gubernatorial campaign in June. The Securities Industry & Financial Markets Association sued Ashcroft in August arguing that a new state rule designed to limit the impact of environmental, social and governance factors in investment decisions conflicts with federal securities laws. ... Ashcroft issued the rules — the first in the nation — after a similar 'anti-woke' investing proposal died in the Legislature this spring. Ashcroft, who is facing Lt. Gov. Mike Kehoe and Sen. Bill Eigel in the August 2024 GOP primary, is using the lawsuit to raise money for his gubernatorial campaign. 'I implemented new rules requiring Wall Street bankers and money managers to notify their customers when they choose to invest their retirement savings in woke ESG investments, rather than investments that generate the best return,' Ashcroft said in a campaign memo to supporters earlier this month." Flagged Securities Commissioner Hire

In 2017, Ashcroft Named David Minnick As His Securities Commissioner, Despite Minnick's Past Work For A Firm That Was Investigated By The State And Accused Of Selling Bad Investments To Schools

In January 2017, Ashcroft Named Minnick As His Commissioner Of Securities For The Secretary Of State's Office. "The man chosen by Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft to lead the agency that protects consumers from securities fraud is a former executive of a company currently under investigation by the state. David Minnick served as general counsel and senior vice president of St. Louis-based Stifel Financial Corp. from 2004 until this week, when Jay Ashcroft took over for outgoing Secretary of State Jason Kander. Now, Minnick is the commissioner of securities, a job that puts him in charge of the division responsible for protecting Missouri investors from fraud and ensuring that companies comply with state securities law." Minnick Previously Worked As Senior Vice President Of Stifel Financial, Which Had Been Repeatedly Investigated By The State For Securities Issues. "A spokeswoman for Kander told The Star last week that Stifel



is under investigation by the securities division, although she couldn't provide details because the investigation is ongoing. Since 2010, Stifel Financial has been investigated by the securities division at least three other times. Minnick's long ties to the industry he's now responsible for regulating, as well as to a company currently under investigation by the agency he now leads, have raised concerns about the division's commitment to protecting Missouri investors. 'The fox is guarding the henhouse,' said Rep. Tracy McCreery, a St. Louis County Democrat who sits on the board of the Consumers Council of Missouri. 'And that should be alarming.' A spokesman for Ashcroft said Minnick has severed all formal ties with his former company. Two weeks before his hire became public, Minnick sold 10,000 shares of Stifel Financial stock, valued at more than \$500,000. He sold an additional 3,400 shares, valued at \$174,000, two weeks after his new job was announced. He appears to have sold his remaining \$90,000 in stock shortly before the new year." \$200 million in dubious investments. The firm in 2006 sold the school districts 'unsuitable' securities tied to
synthetic collateralized debt obligations that were 'far more risky' than advertised and mostly purchased
with borrowed funds, according to a complaint filed in federal court in Milwaukee. Stifel and one of its
former top executives, David W. Noack, concealed the perils of investing 'through a series of falsehoods and

In 2022, A Pro-Ashcroft PAC Hired Lobbyist Steve Tilley, Who Has Been The Subject Of FBI Scrutiny

It is being aided in fundraising by lobbyist Steve Tilley, a former lawmaker whose activity over the years has drawn scrutiny from the FBI. Ashcroft Was Criticized For His Office's Investigation Of Then-AG Josh Hawley's Use Of State Funds To Pursue His Political Ambitions

In 2018, Ashcroft Began Investigating If Then-AG Josh Hawley Used State Resources To Pay Consultants And To Support His 2018 U.S. Senate Campaign

In 2018, Hawley Was Accused Of Using State Resources To Push His Personal Ambitions Via Political Consultants. As A Result, Lawyers Left Hawley's Office, Which Resulted In Court Losses That Cost Missourians \$35 Million. "The most recent example is Josh Hawley, Missouri's pro-Trump Christian nationalist senator-elect (and current state attorney general) who has written that a politician's job is to advance Christ's kingdom and that Christians should be helping bring about End Times and the Second Coming. ... Thanks to dogged reporting by the Kansas City Star, we know that a pair of Washington D.C. political consultants – Timmy Teepell and Gail Gitcho – along with two lobbying firms called OnMessage, Inc. and First Tuesday, basically ran the Missouri Attorney General's office starting right after Hawley was sworn in as AG in January 2017. The two used state tax dollars and state resources to frame and help design Hawley's anti-opioid and anti-human trafficking initiatives as a way to raise Hawley's national profile and position him for a U.S. Senate run, even though Hawley had campaigned for AG criticizing politicos who used their offices to campaign for even higher office. Pot, meet kettle. The political consultants pushed Hawley's ambition using state employees. Hawley refused to use his official state email account and instead communicated with them via private email. The interference by the consultants and Hawley's rigid right-wing ideology led to an exodus of state civil litigation lawyers. And that meant Hawley's office was short-staffed when it came to defending the state against civil claims. Both the Post-Dispatch and New York Times reported that a combination of inexperienced lawyers and

lack of staff in Hawley's office meant Missouri taxpayers lost several civil suits in court, causing the state to cough up \$35 million in fiscal year 2018. And that doesn't count the judgment against the state for \$113 million in back pay for prison guards. Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft, a Republican, has finally launched an investigation into Hawley's use of the big money D.C. consultants to interfere in his office's work. Hawley's office,

Thursday morning, Ashcroft provided copies of the report to the complainant as well as the governor, former and current attorneys general, and the state auditor. 'Based on the documents my office reviewed, and the interviews conducted, I cannot say that there is reasonable trustworthy information that an offense has been committed,' Ashcroft stated in his report. In March 2019, John Sauer, A "Top Lieutenant And Campaign Donor" Of Hawley Was Allowed To Sit In On Interviews Conducted By Ashcroft's Office As Part Of The Investigation. "A top lieutenant and campaign donor to Josh Hawley was allowed to sit in on interviews conducted as part of the investigation into whether Hawley illegally used government resources to support his successful bid for U.S. Senate. The arrangement,

detailed in documents obtained by *The Kansas City Star* under Missouri's open records laws, has drawn criticism from some legal experts, who say it compromises the legitimacy of Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft's conclusions. 'As a general rule, no serious investigator, civil or criminal, would voluntarily invite representatives of the party being investigated to sit in on initial witness interviews,' said Frank Bowman, a professor at the University of Missouri School of Law. 'Not only is there an intimidation factor, particularly where the target is a sitting U.S. senator, but letting the target be represented in the interviews allows the target to shape his own response and to coach potential witnesses.''' In March 2023, Harry Cooper, A Columbia Resident, Sued Ashcroft For Unlawfully Rejecting His Petition To Modify Term Limits And Prevent Lawmakers From Making It Harder For Voters To Approve Constitutional Changes. "A Columbia man filed a lawsuit Thursday against Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft for allegedly violating initiative petition laws. The suit, filed in Cole County on behalf of Harry Cooper, alleges Ashcroft violated the law by unlawfully rejecting Cooper's petition, doing so past the rejection deadline and refusing to provide a reason for its rejection. The proposed petition would have modified legislative term limits and prohibit the General Assembly from making an initiative petition's path to the ballot more difficult, said a news release from Respect Voters, a coalition dedicated to the initiative petition ballot measure. Cooper alleged he filed two versions of the petition Feb. 16, and exhibits submitted with the suit show the Secretary of State's Office responded with notification that both submissions had been received and had received 'final approval as to form.' Other letters from Ashcroft's office dated March 9 stated the sample sheets were rejected after further review but did not include further reasoning. Cooper alleged he repeatedly asked the office for the reason they were rejected, but said the office 'refused to provide, violating the law.' A letter from Ashcroft's office submitted as evidence says, 'The Secretary of State has twenty-three days after the approval to the form of the petition to prepare and transmit to the Attorney General a summary statement of the measure,' giving the attorney general 10 days to review the legal content and form of the proposal. The suit asks the court to require Ashcroft to approve the forms or to provide reasons for rejecting it. A spokeswoman for Ashcroft said the office had received the court documents and were reviewing them." (Jefferson City News Tribune, 3/25/23)

In May 2023, Ashcroft Allowed Cooper's Proposal To Move Forward. "After being sued for illegally blocking a proposed citizen-driven ballot question that would prevent lawmakers from making it harder for voters to amend the state constitution, Missouri Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft has allowed the proposal to move forward. Columbia resident Harry Cooper in Cole County dropped his lawsuit against Ashcroft, a candidate for governor in 2024, last month after Ashcroft relented and allowed Cooper to begin gathering signatures to put his proposal on the 2024 ballot. ... Ashcroft's office did not immediately respond to a request for comment Wednesday. Cooper's ballot question is in response to Missouri Republican lawmakers proposing a flurry of proposals this year that would make it harder for voters across the state to approve amendments to the state constitution. If certified for the ballot, Cooper's plan would ask voters in 2024 to approve a measure preventing state lawmakers from passing laws that make it harder for citizens to amend the state's initiative petition process. It also would prevent lawmakers from changing voter-approved laws for seven years unless receiving 75% approval from both chambers of the Missouri General Assembly. And it would allow lawmakers to serve 16 years in either chamber instead of the current eight year per chamber cap. The ballot measure would have reduced the legislative term limit to 12 years if lawmakers pass any laws that restrict the public's ability to amend the state constitution. ... The lawsuit filed by Cooper in March accused Ashcroft of initially approving his proposal and then reversing course and rejecting it after a 15-day deadline, in violation of state law. It further alleged that Ashcroft had rejected 'a number of" other ballot initiatives this year through a similar process." (The Kansas City Star, 5/3/23)

In August 2019, Ashcroft Was Sued By A St. Louis Resident Who Accused Him Of Writing "Biased And Inflammatory" Summaries Of State Petitions. "A St. Louis woman looking to make voting more convenient in Missouri says Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft is sabotaging her efforts. In a lawsuit filed Friday in Cole County Circuit Court, attorneys for Mary Anne Sedey accused Ashcroft of writing 'biased and inflammatory' summaries of petitions that could harm their chances with voters if they qualify for the 2020 ballot. The initiatives propose a number of changes to the Missouri Constitution, including requirements for six weeks of early and mail-in voting



and automatic registration of eligible voters when they come into contact with government agencies. Promotional materials from Vote 2020, a campaign committee for which Sedey serves as treasurer, said the 'common-sense updates' would make it easier for eligible voters to 'have their voices heard, while also safeguarding our elections with mandatory audits to protect against hacking and tampering.' But the lawsuit says Ashcroft, a Republican, paints a more sinister and unfair picture in his summary, which would appear on the ballot should backers of the petitions gather the more than 150,000 signatures required to qualify. In one instance, for example, Ashcroft describes a change designed to ensure certain provisional ballots are counted as allowing 'voters on election day to appear at the wrong polling place, vote on a wrong ballot, and have election judges later transfer the votes to the right ballot.'" \$9.7 MILLION MISTAKE

In 2023, A State Audit Found That Ashcroft's Office Lacked "Adequate Controls And Procedures Over Financial Reporting" That Could Have Resulted In An Overstatement Of At Least \$9.7 Million In Financial Statements. (Missouri State Auditor, <u>Audit Report 2023-56</u>, Filed 9/15/23) We reported an audit finding related to the SOS's internal controls over financial reporting.

• Office of Secretary of State Financial Reporting Controls (Finding No. FS2022-006) - The SOS did not have adequate controls and procedures over financial reporting of accounts receivable. As a result, civil penalty accounts receivable data submitted to the OA for inclusion in the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2022, was misstated. If the resulting misstatements had not been identified during the audit, Government Wide - Governmental Activities and Public Education Fund net accounts receivable and related liability balances would have been overstated by at least \$9.7 million in the financial statements.

The SOS disagreed with the audit finding. The audit finding and the SOS's response, including explanation and specific reasons for disagreement, are included in our Annual Comprehensive Financial Report - Report on Internal Control, Compliance, and Other Matters (Report No. 2023-022) and the SOS's Corrective Action Plan is included in the Single Audit Report (Report No. 2023-030).

2022 REDISTRICING FIGHT

In February 2022, Ashcroft Sided With State Sen. Bill Eigel In His Push To Redraw The State's Congressional Map For Seven Republicans Seats Rather Than Six. "Ahead of an anticipated Senate debate on the proposed Missouri Congressional map, several GOP officials urged over 100 supporters gathered Monday in the Capitol to continue to press for a redrawn map that would add an additional seat in Republicans' favor. The House guickly sent the proposed Congressional map to the Senate in the first two weeks of the legislative session. That version, which was passed out of the Senate Redistricting Committee late last month, maintains the current partisan balance of the state's Congressional delegation — six Republican seats and two Democratic seats. Yet while the Senate has been mired in disagreement over the map, it has yet to be formally brought to the Senate floor for discussion. Senators said they expect that to change Monday, with Sen. Bill Eigel, R-Weldon Spring, telling supporters holding signs that read '7:1' and 'Missouri is a red state' to prepare for an 'extended debate' come Monday afternoon. ... Republican leaders have raised concerns that a 7-1 map may be challenged in the courts, and that even if it did remain intact, a seat may swing in Democrats' favor in a competitive election year. Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft, who has lobbied for a 7-1 map, called those legal concerns 'balderdash' Monday. Missouri is required to maintain a minority-majority district in the 1st Congressional District, which encompasses St. Louis, under the Voting Rights Act, Ashcroft noted. But he argued a majority-minority district didn't exist across the state in Kansas City and Jackson County, and thus cracking that district to bring in more Republican voters would not be in danger of being tossed by the courts." CONTROVERSIAL LIBRARY RULE

In 2022 And 2023, Ashcroft Made Headlines When He Issued A Rule To Prohibit Missouri Libraries From Buying Obscene And Pornographic Materials. Per the rule, libraries were required to submit a copy of their written policies to the state librarian by July 31. Among other stipulations, the rule prohibits libraries from buying materials that are 'child pornography,' 'pornographic for minors' or 'obscene,' as defined by Missouri law. … In a 2022 news release, Ashcroft said the rule is about protecting children. 'Yes, we want to make sure libraries have the resources and materials they need for their constituents, but we also want our children to be 'children' a little longer than a pervasive culture may often dictate,' he said." 'We won't be requiring anyone to wear a mask, nor are we supplying them, but please feel free to wear one, in whatever form you may choose.' In a tweet Thursday, the secretary of state's office said: 'We want everyone to be safe and healthy, and we also need to continue doing work for the people of Missouri!'" In May 2020, Ashcroft Opposed State Legislation To Allow For Increased Absentee Voting By Mail In Response To COVID-19 Without Photo ID Requirements. "Missouri lawmakers were pushing to allow everyone to vote by mail if they so choose in the upcoming August and November elections because of the coronavirus pandemic. In the waning hours of the 2020 Missouri Legislative Session, state lawmakers approved a plan to

allow those with COVID-19 or those at a high risk of being infected to vote by mail. Other eligible voters who want to vote by mail would be able to do so but only with a notary. Republicans agreed to drop efforts to include a requirement that voters show a photo ID. The state's top election official, Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft, has paned the latest version of the bill." When The Bipartisan Legislation Passed, Ashcroft Said He Did Not Support It Due To The Removal Of Photo ID Language. "Lawmakers from the Missouri Senate and the Missouri House of Representatives have approved a bill that would allow absentee voting to be expanded during the coronavirus pandemic. The bill passed the Senate, 25-5, and the House, 121-24. It now heads to Gov. Mike Parson's desk. The bill would allow those who have contracted, or those who are in the at-risk category of contracting COVID-19 to vote absentee in the 2020 elections. It would expire in December 2020. Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft released a statement Friday saying he did not support the bill. 'Without the agreed-upon safeguards, I have grave concerns that this bill will make voting less secure and jeopardize the integrity of our elections,' Ashcroft said in a statement. 'I call on legislators to either add the original language back to the bill or vote the current version down. No bill at all is better than passing bad legislation with permanent consequences.'"
